WASHINGTON, September 1.—Secretary Alger received a cablegram from General Miles saying that he would sail for home today.

**Builders Drowned at Tybee.**

Reports from Savannah just received state that Lieut. Morgan of the United States Marine Corps was drowned off Tybee Island, during the storm of yesterday.

Morgan with six of the regulars, went in a yawl boat to rescue the sailors on an Italian bark, which had gone ashore.

**Camp Wicket Breaking Up.**

The breaking up of Camp Wicket at Montauk Point has begun in earnest. Orders were issued today for the departure of four regiments and others will follow.

The men will be sent home on ferries as soon as possible.

**General Shafter Home.**

Camp Wicket, September 1.—The City of Mexico, bringing Gen. Shafter and his staff and a company of the first infantry, arrived this morning. He will relieve Gen. Wheeler of the command here.

**Spanish Prisoners Released.**

ANAPOLIS, Md., August 31.—Admiral Cervera and the other Spanish prisoners of war who have been confined in comfortable quarters at the Naval Academy nearly two months were given their freedom today. A number of the Spanish prisoners expressed a desire to visit certain cities in the United States before returning to Spain, and some said they would like to live in this country.

**Alger and Miles.**

WASHINGTON, August 31.—No disposition to discuss the relation between Secretary Alger and General Miles was manifested by the officials of the War Department today, and unless additional developments are presented in some other interview the situation will probably remain unchanged until the arrival of General Miles in Washington.

The Secretary, however, continues to feel deeply the reflection that is cast upon him in the published interview and show a disposition to resent imputations that he will not hold the General strictly accountable if he affirms the authenticity of the statements attributed to him.

**HIS SUICIDE ORDERED.**

Colonel Henry was Ordered to Kill Himself by his Superior.

LATE, September 1.—It is now stated on good authority that Colonel Henry's suicide was ordered by his superior officers.

A general staff officer of the army remained with Henry for long time, and upon leaving him, ordered the sentry at the door not to disturb the Colonel, as he had much work to do.

**HOPE FOR CAPTAIN DREYFUS.**

Important Letter by Which he was convicted a Forgery, Sailed at the Quilty Man.

PARIS, August 31.—France has a new sensation—one that is shaking the nation to the core. The arrest of Colonel Henry, who confesses the forgery of one of the documents that led to the conviction of Capt. Alfred Dreyfus, has been followed by his suicide, and it seems probable that the whole Dreyfus case will be reopened.

Captain Dreyfus, it will be remembered, was an officer in the French army who was convicted of betraying military secrets to a foreign government. He was sentenced to solitary imprisonment for life on Devil's Island, a small strip of land off the coast of French Guiana, where he now is.

Even the Czar's disarmament proposition is forgotten. In fact war, not peace, is in the air. So much ink has been used, so much passion let loose over the Dreyfus affair that even the warmest partisans on each side seemed about tired of the whole affair. And just when things reached this stage a bombshell has burst.

M. Cassaigne, Minister of War, is said to be prostrated by this discovery. It is not astonishing in view of the attitude which he has taken in the case and of the denials he made no longer ago than July of this year, when he said he was absolutely convinced of the guilt of Captain Dreyfus. One of the things which led him to this conviction was the very letter which Col. Henry now admits he forged.

Every time M. Cassaigne has made a demand for the reopening of the case it has been pointed out to him that the confession of Colonel Henry that he forged one of the most important documents will serve to prove sufficiently strong to wear down the case for Dreyfus. The figure says it has not heart to comment on the case. The only thing, in fact, it can do is to sympathize with the army in the case, as it is by one of its officers, who has so shamelessly deceived his chiefs.

## NOT SUSTAINED.

### Judge Clark's Charges Against President Kilgo.

Text of Specifications and Verdict. Jury Commissioner Appointed. Convict Pardoned. School Treasurer for Each District. Storm at Tybee.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., September 1.

Much interest centered in the trial between President Kilgo and trustee Clark of Trinity College. The majority of the people here and elsewhere will be glad to know that the board of trustees in the form of a jury over ruled by a solid vote the charges made by Judge Clark. The following is the verdict:

In the matter of Dr. John C. Kilgo, President of Trinity College.

Charge:

That he, John C. Kilgo, is unfit to be president of Trinity College.

Specifications:

1st. That Dr. Kilgo's reputation in South Carolina is that of a wire-puller of the ward politician type.

We find this specification not sustained.

2d. That Dr. Kilgo was in Tennessee and was known there as a scrub politician.

We find this specification not sustained.

3d. Sycophancy to Mr. Washington Duke, in that he recently led a procession to Mr. Duke's house and extolled him as the greatest man this State has ever produced.

We find this specification not sustained.

4th. That Dr. Kilgo has received personal gratuity from Mr. Duke.

We find this specification not sustained.

5th. That Dr. Kilgo intended to prevent Judge Clark from having an opportunity to produce evidence before a former meeting of the trustees.

We find this specification not sustained.

Charge:

That Dr. Kilgo is unfit to be President of Trinity College.

We find the charge not sustained.

(Signed by the Trustees.)

As the jury could not pass resolutions they then resolved themselves into a board of trustees and passed the following:

"Your committee to whom was referred Judge Clark's paper, 'challenge to the jury,' would respectfully report that they have carefully examined the same and find it to be a libelous, drawn, either to thwart and stop further investigation or for publication in the newspapers for the purpose of making political capital. Judge Clark so drafted his paper, as to include nearly every trustee, so that none would be left to sit as jurors. At the July meeting when Judge Clark earnestly begged for further time to prepare his evidence, did he not know that the trustees must act as jurors? He says he knew they were all against him. When Judge Clark feelingly announced that 'if the trustees would give him the information refused to testify he would say they had lied to him and would withdraw the charges against Dr. Kilgo.'

Judge Clark, instead of withdrawing his charges, challenges the jury when he knew they were the only ones to investigate them. Besides Judge Clark's statement has many inaccuracies.

Judge Clark wanted to make a 50-minute speech as a juror. This was granted him but he was reminded that nothing that occurs in the jury room could be divulged under the rules governing juries, so he withdrew his request as he desired the speech published, and will use the document as he sees best later on.

Judge Parnell has made Mr. Willis G. Belege jury commissioner for this district of the Federal court. Before Judge Parnell went on the bench he held the position, then Mr. C. T. Bailey succeeded him. Now since Mr. Bailey is postmaster the vacant place is filled by Mr. Belege's appointment.

Many of the accounts of the State, and of individuals sent to Washington to be settled by the government, were in such bad shape that Major Davis at the Adjutant General's office is busy correcting these returns. These are the bills made for the regiments while here.

Governor Russell yesterday pardoned a convict from Burke county for manslaughter. He had served part of his term and his wife and children were in a destitute condition and needed his support.

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction says that there should be a school treasurer in each district to prosecute the school fund.

At Tybee Island during the hurricane Tuesday night companies A and B of the

2nd N. C. Regiment had a frightful time, and lost much property. Major Wilder refused before the storm broke to allow them to leave the island.

In the 2nd Congressional district the Democrats will vote for Lloyd, the Populist nominee for Congress, so as to be sure to beat White, the Republican negro nominee.
