### ANOTHER CHANCE.

Captain Dreyfus to be Given Another Trial. A Great Sensation. Clemenceau's Opinion. Special to Journal.

Paris, September 2.—At a meeting of the French Cabinet today it was decided that there should be a revision of the Dreyfus trial, on account of the sensational developments ending in the suicide of Colonel Henry after acknowledging forgery of a letter by which Captain Dreyfus was convicted by court martial.

Paris, September 1.—Never since the Dreyfus case existed has a keener, more passionate interest been shown in it than at present. The party in favor of its revision has been enormously swollen by the confession of forgery made by Colonel Henry. His suicide has given rise to a sort of suspicion that he sacrificed himself to cover his superiors and has won over many who were hesitating.

Three fourths of the French press is now in favor of revision of the trial. M. Clemenceau devotes over two columns to a leader in the Aurore this morning, with the heading, "A Crumbling Edifice." This expresses the general feeling.

It is certain already that the old general staff of the army is in a state of great uneasiness. General Boubouffere has resigned. It is also stated that many chiefs of the different departments have requested to be allowed to retire from active service.

M. Clemenceau, in the Aurore, says: "M. Zola's condemnation has no longer raison d'être, seeing it was inflicted upon the evidence of forged documents. The acquittal of Major Esterhazy signifies nothing, seeing it was a forgery which prevented the judges from recognizing the authenticity of one of the principal papers produced. Colonel Picquard, who has been dismissed from the army upon the evidence of a forgery, ought to be reinstated in his rank."

As for the Dreyfus case, it is very simple. He was convicted upon a bordereau which was written by Commandant Esterhazy and upon documents of which the principal one is now recognized to have been a forgery. Revision is, therefore, obligatory, and the judgment must be public.

### The Flag at Havana.

Washington, September 2.—The general opinion about the War Department is that the evacuation will not begin before November 1, and that it may be January 1 before the flag of the United States is hoisted over the government buildings in Havana and formal control of Cuba is assumed by this country. In the meantime it is also understood the authority of the Spaniards is to be recognized on the island.

One of the members of the commission said today that so far they had received no instructions regarding the methods to be followed in enforcing the terms of evacuation, and of supplying the place of the Spanish soldiers with an American force large enough to maintain order, and to prevent conflicts between the retreating Spaniards and the Cubans.

Major-General Butler is of the opinion that a large army will be required for this purpose, and that such an army should be sent to Cuba as soon as the evacuation begins. It is said to be the intention of the President and the War Department to have the Spanish troops from the interior towns and provinces of Cuba withdrawn first, the stronger garrisons in Havana and other coast cities to be the last to leave. It is believed that such a plan will be less likely to result in friction with the Cubans than if the Spaniards were to attempt to maintain control of the interior while forces were being sent from Havana to Spain.

### Master Out.

Special to Journal. Washington, September 2.—The Second Regiment North Carolina Volunteers have been ordered mustered out of the service.

The regiment is now at Stinson Island, Ga., and are ordered to Raleigh where the discharge will take place.

### International Yacht Race.

### The Peace Conference.

Special to Journal. New York, September 2.—It is reported from Berlin that it is the intention of Russia to convene the peace conference in that city one month after the adjournment of the Spanish-American peace commission.

It is declared by the Westminster Gazette of London that the British ambassador at St. Petersburg has communicated to Czar Nicholas an expression of the feelings of hearty sympathy and appreciation with which Secretary Balfour read the imperial rescript proposing universal disarmament.

## ANYTHING TO BEAT.

Union of Republicans and Populists to Defeat White Supremacy.

But the Democracy is up and Doing. The Instructions in the Rankruptcy Law. Plans for Fair Week. A Populist Expects to Defeat White.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., September 2.

The result of the meeting of the Executive committees of the Republican and Populist parties was not obtainable last night until after 12 o'clock. Each committee met and appointed a sub-committee to meet with each other, and arrange fusion. This was done. The details of this co-operation to be arranged in deference to the expression of the various conventions of the two parties. It was recommended that the counties and districts proceed to nominate cooperative tickets on mutually agreeable conditions, and the assurance is authorized by the committees, and these committees promise to do all necessary to effect the co-operation recommended.

Thus at this stage of the game the Republicans and Populists are bound to do something to try to beat the Democrats. It is terrible to realize that the times are such, that the Democrats are compelled to use such material for Campaign Literature as is being used, but it is a case of "fight the devil with fire."

The scholarship for Dingham's school was won by Master Louis Groves of Chapel Hill.

In some counties in the State much interest is being taken in getting up a county exhibit for the State Fair. This should be more general.

The Wilber Opera House company will be at the Academy of Music all during Fair week. This company is a favorite here, having appeared here several nights twice last winter.

Judge Parnell gives the following instructions in the bankruptcy law:

"Petitioners must in addition to the fees required (\$25) deposit or furnish as needed a sufficient amount in cash to defray actual expenses. Referees cannot be required to attend a meeting of creditors in other than the county in which they reside unless their actual expenses are paid. The same rules applicable to other officers of the United States courts in regard to the payment of fees and expenses apply to officers of the court of bankruptcy clerks, referees and messengers. No final discharge in bankruptcy will be granted until all the costs and expenses are paid.

"In allotting the homestead and personal property exemptions of a bankrupt the State law will be followed as near as may be. The trustee will recommend and the referee designate commissioners for this purpose. Objections to the allotment will be heard before the referee within twenty days from the filing of the report, but may be adjourned from time to time not exceeding thirty days. At the end of thirty days, if there be no objection sustained, the allotment will be confirmed.

"Petitions in bankruptcy may be filed in the office of the Clerk of the District court at Elizabeth City, New Berne, Wilmington or Raleigh as most convenient to the petitioners.

### Cannot Save the Ships.

Washington, September 2.—After expending over \$50,000 in making preparations to save the Spanish cruiser Colon, now on her beam and forty miles west of Santiago, the government has decided to abandon the plan and will direct the return north of Constructor Hobson, who has been awaiting the arrival of his pontoons and air-bags before beginning the work.

Commodore Watson, who was directed to examine the condition of the Colon and the Maria Teresa, has reported to the Navy Department that, in his opinion, the Colon cannot possibly be saved, and he questions whether the Teresa can, although the wrecking company expresses hope that with a week's additional work the ship may be floated.
