### THE CONVENTION.

Success in the Local Democratic Gathering at Syracuse.

ALBANY, Sept. 21.—A poll of the delegates before the convention opened this morning showed for Roosevelt 738 delegates, for Black 216. This means that Roosevelt will be nominated on the first ballot unless something unforeseen occurs.

Some of Black's friends say that after an all night's conference many withdrew and are in a mood to have him withdrawn and not to permit his name to go before the convention.

New York, Sept. 27.—Fifteen hundred Tammanyites went by special train to the Syracuse Democratic State convention.

One hundred and seventy "Chicago platform" Democrats started for Syracuse today over the West Shore. They expect every county in the state to be represented at tonight's meeting. They also expect to take radical action if the Chicago platform is not endorsed.

SYRACUSE, Sept. 27.—The attitude of delegates to the Democratic convention is the same as yesterday—waiting. No body pretends to have any notion what's going to happen in the convention. Nothing will occur until Croker arrives late this afternoon. Murphy, Hill and other well-known leaders are on hand, but are not announcing plans.

### The Peace Commission.

Paris, September 25.—The members of the United States commission to negotiate conditions of peace with the commissioners of the Spanish government arrived in Paris this evening from London.

The commissioners were met at the depot by the United States ambassador and the entire staff of the embassy. Without being demonstrative, their reception was cordial, thoroughly American in character, and from the grouping of the important personages on the platform of the railway station was almost imposing.

The Spanish peace commissioners arrived here at 7:30 p.m. They were received by members of the Spanish embassy. Montero Rios brings the declaration of the golden lance for M. Faure. The date of the signature cannot be fixed till M. Faure has selected a sponsor.

### Col. Bryan Has Fever.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Colonel Wm. J. Bryan, of the Third Nebraska Regiment, was unable to leave Washington today for Jacksonville.

"I have a touch of malaria," he said this evening, "and my physician told me today that I would have to remain here for two or three days."

Colonel Bryan was in bed where he passed most of the day. His face was flushed with fever and he remarked that he guessed he was a little tired out.

"I have been delaying my return to Jacksonville," he added, "for three or four days in the hope that I would feel better the next day and be able to undertake the journey."

Colonel Bryan expressed the reluctance with which he had admitted his illness. While he is disposed to look upon his illness as trifling, it is not at all improbable that he will have to remain in Washington longer than he had calculated on, to enable the fever to run its course.

### THE STATE CAPITAL.

#### Immense Damage Done by Last Week's Cyclone.

Large Enrollment in Public Schools. Judge Bryan. Two Many Negro Nominees. Lloyd Waits for Gov.

Newborne's Excuse.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., September 27.

The public schools of this city have opened, and the enrollment of children is so large that the present accommodations are inadequate.

Judge H. R. Bryan is again here, having conveyed Wake county Superior court. Judge Bryan is always liked for his business and dispatch in court matters. He lets nothing drag nor keeps any cases over which can possibly receive attention.

Col. Jim Young with his military swagger and political cunning is here. He reports the Governor's "Braves" as in fine condition. From his public talk and private inclinations it looks as if Young might take down, or attempt it, some of the negro nominees on some of the eastern county tickets. Young says "there are too many negroes in nomination."

J. B. Lloyd, Populist Congressional nominee for Second district has not declared himself yet. He gives some excuses for this delay, but it is understood that he is waiting for Marlon Butler to say what he must do.

The cyclone that last week swept the course of the Yadkin river, in Wilkes county, and the Piedmont section did damage to the extent of \$300,000. This is the finest corn section in the State and the farmers suffered severely. Many miles along the course of the river were washed away.

Superintendent Newborne, of the State penitentiary, declares that the crops on the State farms were never so good as this year. He asserts, however, that the penitentiary will not be able to make any money because of the low price at which cotton is selling.

There will be a meeting of the Railroad Commission on next Friday. The Commission will consider the cotton rate, also the matter of joint local rates on the Seaboard Air Line.

Rev. Mr. Loveless, the beloved rector of the Episcopal church at Goldsboro died Sunday night from typhoid fever. He was a young man of deep piety and earnest conviction and his death is a loss to his church throughout the State.

St. Mary's school opened with a larger attendance this year than it has for years. The increase in the number of boarding pupils is very large. More than 170 students are already enrolled.

There was a report current that the sermons of the Second North Carolina Regiment would be extended 30 days. No one at camp Philip-Bagley had official confirmation of the report. The report was attributed to a matter of politics.

### The Resurrection of Columbus.

HAYATA, Sept. 25.—The official inauguration of the bones of Christopher Columbus took place at 9 a. m. today in the presence of General Blanco, Secretary Guein, the civil governor, the bishop, the dean of the Cathedral and other authorities.

The general public was ordered out of the Cathedral at 8 o'clock. The entrance to the Cathedral was guarded by a force of public guards, who kept back the crowds which assembled in front of the edifice while the ceremony was in progress.

The bones of the great discoverer are to be returned to Spain. They had lain in a niche of the Havana Cathedral since January 15, 1795, when they were brought from Santa Domingo that island having been ceded to France by Spain.

### New Ships for Spain.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—News has come to Washington of a meeting of representatives of all of the provinces of Spain in Madrid, for the purpose of discussing peace and devising means to build a navy. The meeting was an official one, but there were present many leading citizens and supporters of the present dynasty. While peace is in all the discussions in purchasing and building warships. Some policy remains the French Spanish mission to Washington, centered each of the meeting here was suspended.

The Filipino gunboat San Francisco, which was alongside the captured steamer, followed the McCulloch to Manila, her captain saying that he must report to his chief the fate of the steamer. He would not give the name of his chief.

Admiral Dewey sent a crew on the San Francisco, which raised the American flag. Subsequently the flag was taken down, but the vessel is being watched, as the warning of the Abble expedition came from Hong Kong too late for the Americans to secure the vessel's entire cargo.

### Another Vessel for Dewey.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Orders have been issued to Commander Hemphill, of the cruiser Buffalo, to sail for the Asiatic station on October 10, where he will join Admiral Dewey at Manila and deliver a large draft of men for the ships under his command. The Buffalo has been overhauled at the New York navy yard and converted into a fine cruiser, mounting modern six-inch guns and a formidable secondary battery of six-pounders and machine guns. She was at one time the Brazilian dynamite vessel Nietheroy and was purchased in the United States and fitted out during the insurgent war a number of years ago by the American minister to that government.
