## STATE NEWS.

### The Fourteenth Soldier Dies at Raleigh.

Chapel Inside Penitentiary Walls. Populists Name Candidates. Judge Adams Said to Have Resigned. Cattle With Fever.

Raleigh, N. C., September 29.  
Another soldier of the Second Regt died at the camp here yesterday. This is the 14th one that has died out there and most of them have been buried in the Federal cemetery.

Mrs. Meredith, the woman evangelist who is here at one of the Methodist churches, is preaching to crowded houses. She held quite a big revival here many years ago when she was Mrs. Moonand. She made many friends here.

The privates in the Second Regiment say that their officers are working to keep them in office against their will. That almost all of them are anxious to be mustered out of service as soon as possible. They do not even want the proposed extended 90 days of their furlough.

The penitentiary trustees have decided to erect a chapel within the prison walls for the use of the convicts. Mr. John T. Pallen who interests himself in the religious training of the convicts as well as of the poorer class has donated \$100 to the proposed chapel. There are several gentlemen here who for years have conducted a Sunday School out at the prison, in connection with the regular services held there by the different ministers of the city.

It is again proposed that an electric plant be put in at the penitentiary for lighting there, and also for lighting all the State buildings in the city. The directors all favor the idea.
