LOS AND WHEELER

To Truly Before the Commission. Reception by Hon. Spain East Quis Philippines.

Washington, October 3. Nothing startling and little that was interesting has yet occurred in connection with the investigation of the war, started a week ago, but something may be turned up during the coming week. Gen. Fitzhugh Lee and Joe Wheeler are among the witnesses who have been invited to testify. Although several editors have been asked by the Commission to furnish the names of witnesses willing to testify to statements made in their papers, none have yet done so, although an article of a New York paper has filed a long statement concerning Camp Wikeff. There is some objection because the Commission decided to allow only Representatives of the Press Association to be present while testimony is being taken, but it is confined to those representing papers not served by either of the Press Associations. It must be perfectly plain to anybody who will think a moment that the army of Washington correspondents could not be admitted, unless the commission conducted the investigation in one of the largest halls in town. No one need fear that any important evidence taken by the Commission will fall to get publicity.

Secretary Hay held his first reception to the Diplomatic Corps, today, in the Diplomatic room, in the Department of State. It was attended by representatives of all the countries with which we maintain diplomatic relations, although several of the ambassadors were represented by subordinates, owing to the absence of the ambassadors—the French and German ambassadors are in Europe.

Senator Hanna's statement in a published interview that the United States would not possibly consent to allowing the Spanish government to retain control of any portion of the Philippine islands, has attracted much attention in Washington, where it is generally regarded as a statement of the President's position, and as an indication of the nature of the instructions given our peace commissioners.

INTERESTED IN CHINA.

Crisler Baltimore Stranded to Protest American Property. A Long Trip. New York, October 3.—Instructions have been sent by Secretary Long to Admiral Dewey directing him to send the protected cruiser Baltimore at once to Tien Tsin, China.

This action shows conclusively the concern felt by the administration at the existing condition of affairs in the Celestial Empire. It would seem to indicate that more sensational information had been received from Minister Conger than the authorities have made public. It was stated, however, that the advice from the minister at Peking simply show a turbulent condition of affairs existing throughout the empire.

In view of the prospect of trouble in Peking over the death of the Emperor, and the efforts which will probably be made by his adherents to seek revenge, or, at least secure safety for themselves, the authorities deemed it wise to place a ship as near the capital as possible, where the members of the American legation and the consulates near the capital may find refuge in case of need. After a consultation with the President Secretary Long directed Capt. A. S. Crowinshield, chief of the bureau of navigation, to prepare instructions to Admiral Dewey to send the Baltimore to Tien Tsin without delay. These orders were signed and called yesterday afternoon, and it is believed the ship is now on her way to her destination.

The Baltimore has a long trip before her. The distance between Manila and Tien Tsin is 1,200 miles, which she will cover under the "heavy orders" given her within seven days at the utmost. The instructions to Capt. N. M. Dyer require him immediately upon his arrival to communicate with Minister Conger and take every step possible to protect American interests.

PROCESSED NOVEMBER.

HAYASHI, Ok., Oct. 3.—A month's continued rain has driven away the dry dust which had been blowing, causing much damage to shipping and to houses and villages all along the coast. The wind blew from the sea to the southward, but the rain was so heavy that the water in the bay was raised to a level which was reported as being a record.

Heavy loss of life is also feared on the coast of California and Mexico, where much damage is reported during the great rain storm of last year. The authorities are endeavoring to have the coast guard vessels in the neighborhood ready to take the necessary steps to save the lives of the people who are now in the lowlands.

Taking Havana.

HAVANA, October 3.—Though it is a hazardous venture to make predictions in the face of Spanish procrastination, it may reasonably be predicted that the American flag will be flying over Morris and Cabanis fortresses within three weeks. There are a number of reasons why the American evacuation commissioners wish to see the occupation begun as soon as possible.

The first is, on the arrival of the first American troops here, to take possession of Morris and Cabanis simultaneously and hold the American flag over both. This is advised as making a permanent display of American sovereignty and also giving possession of the harbor entrance, thus obviating possible submarine interference against warships.

As soon as possible afterward the Americans are to take control of the city of Havana and extend their authority until it includes the whole territorial and provincial government.

UPROAR IN PARIS.

Revolutionary Action Causes Angry Crowds, Violence Outside.

Paris, October 3.—There was a decidedly ugly split abroad here today. Revolutionists and anti-revolutionists seemed to be spilling for a fight.

Captain Dreyfus, whether guilty or innocent, has certainly caused a cyclone of passion. Crowds, scuffles, uproars and arrests have formed the programme of the last twelve hours. At this moment the mounted republican guard is patrolling parts of the city and all of the police force is on the alert.

About a score of persons are said to have been seriously wounded in the free fights that have broken the monotony of the Parisian Sunday. In one quarter alone, over forty arrests were made. Of the prisoners thirteen were kept, and the others liberated.

All over the city groups of wildly excited men are marching about. When one band meets another there is a conflict of cries, "Vive La Revolution" warring with "Vive L'Armee." Then sticks fly about and the least offensive looking person handy has a bad time for a few minutes.

The editorial rooms of Libre Parole, Drumont's paper, of the Intransigent, Rochefort's organ, and some other journals are being guarded by strong bodies of police.

Out of Porto Rico.

SAN JUAN DE PORTO RICO, Oct. 2.—The Spanish transport Isla de Panay arrived here yesterday and a second transport is expected Monday. These, with a hospital ship, which will come from Havana to remove a number of sick troops, will carry away about 8,000 Spanish soldiers. Sufficient vessels are said to be now on their way here to remove the remainder of the troops.

It is Admiral Schley's opinion that the evacuation by the Spaniards and the official delivery of the island to the American authorities will be completed by October 6.
