ENGLAND AND FRANCE.

The Egyptian Dispute May Bring on War. France is Angry. London, October 20.—The speech of Sir Michael Hicks-Beach at North Shields last evening, has deeply impressed England and the utmost concern is felt as to how France will receive it. The idea has been prevalent that the French have not realized how seriously England felt on the Fashoda question, which has been coupled with a desire that France would not force England to an armed support of Lord Salisbury's stand. Most of the morning papers elaborate some of the excited descriptions of the belligerent preparations of France. The Paris correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "In Toulon and Brest every nerve is strained to get ready for war which may break out on short notice. The Paris press is growing more and more determined to back up extreme measures, even a resort to arms. The French have been exceedingly plied by the threatening tone of the English papers, which is a more likely cause belli than the mere question of Fashoda. Consequently, the outlook here is grave. There are reports of troops hurrying from Paris to Brest and Toulon. The artillery in the batteries and at the various ports have been confidentially instructed for any emergency, and the cannon at all the forts and batteries are kept ready for action at any moment.

Chicago's Big Day. CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—Today was the big day of the peace jubilee. In the daytime there was a parade of 30 000 men and at night a splendid banquet at the Auditorium, at which speeches were made by many distinguished men. President McKinley was the central figure in both celebrations. He reviewed the parade from a stand in front of the Union League clubhouse, on Jackson street, and at a slight made a speech on the occasion, "Our Country."

ANOTHER INCUBUS.

The Second Regiment Strictly a Russell Affair.

Figures on Gas and Electricity. Convict Escapes. Judicial Ticks of Fusionists Not Settled. Old Age to Marry. Other News.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., October 20. Postmaster Bailey here has gotten a department at Washington to allow Thursday of Fair week to be observed here as a holiday thus giving the employees in the office an opportunity to attend the Fair. A special agent of the Labor Bureau of Washington is here getting up figures as to the cost of producing gas and electricity by the plants here. He will visit many of the larger cities. There are 127 insurance companies licensed to do business in the State. Fifty-one of the general agents of all these companies have their headquarters in Raleigh. Thus it will be seen that Raleigh has three times as many agencies as any of the other towns in the State. Fire insurance companies have not, as yet, renewed their licenses which expired in April.

Another convict escaped from the penitentiary yesterday. That is three this week. The penitentiary here is making a name for itself for insecurity. It will indeed be a fine thing for Raleigh when the disorderly, uncontrolled Second Regiment takes its departure. It is rather a hard thing to say, but it has become a question as to which is the greatest incubus upon the State, the present administration, or the Second Regiment. It is a political affair, created as to the officers, by the lovely administration under which North Carolina is now buried.

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THE REPUBLICANS and Populists have not as yet settled on their judicial tickets. There is still a hitch in the first district. There is no doubt but what Col. C. D. Cowles will remain with the First Regiment. He has never really cared to return to the regular army.

New York, October 19.—Major-General O'Rourke, commanding the military forces of the United States at Manila, called to the War Department today a review of the situation in the Philippines, showing that Aguinaldo's influence is on the wane. General O'Rourke's dispatch stated that Aguinaldo's forces are being rapidly displaced as a result of the disarmament of many of the leaders, and his

influence decreases with each desertion. Many of the deserters are joining the Spanish party, apparently because of the belief in the possibility, though General Otis does not say so, that the islands may be returned to Spain. The situation is peaceful and there is little danger of trouble between the natives and Americans, and General Otis expressed confidence in his ability to fully cope with any developments. Secretary Alger late this afternoon sent a copy of the dispatch to the State Department, and it is expected that it will be called to the attention of the American commissioners in Paris for their information in connection with the consideration of the subject of the Philippines.
