**PORTO RICANS.**

Question of Citizenship. They are Americans. Silver Question on a Small Scale.

WASHINGTON, October 23.—The latest move next discovered by the seekers after the unusual is that residents of Porto Rico, which this week came permanently under the American flag, had lost their Spanish citizenship without acquiring American citizenship, and there being no United States courts on the island, for them to make application for citizenship to, they must remain without citizenship in any country for an indefinite period. This sort of talk is amusing to international lawyers, who know that, while it is usual to provide for a change of citizenship in treaty transferring territory, it is not at all necessary, owing to the generally recognized principle of international law that citizenship changes with ownership of the soil, unless otherwise provided. There would be no necessity for Porto Ricans to take individual action, no matter how many United States courts might be on the island, to get American citizenship. It was conferred upon them when the flag was raised over the island.

It is already apparent that legislation regulating the financial system of Porto Rico is going to be a very troublesome question in Congress. It has already caused a strike of laborers employed by the U. S. States, on the island. Practically all the money in general circulation in Porto Rico is silver of Spanish coinage. Congress must provide some way of putting United States money in circulation there that will be just to the holders of that Spanish silver, and to do so will be certain to cause a lot of financial wrangling.

**The Episcopal Convention.**

WASHINGTON, October 21.—The increased responsibilities of the Episcopal Church, arising through the changed conditions of Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Philippines was presented to the general convention today in the report of a special committee appointed to consider the condition of affairs in those outlying islands.

The committee proposed a resolution that missionary work begin in Porto Rico after conference with the Bishop Antigua.

The committee recommended a joint committee to consider the work in Cuba. The committee also pointed out that attention must be given to Cuba, not only as a possession of the United States, but as possibly an independent self-governing country.

**Central American Republics.**

WASHINGTON, October 22.—Official information has reached this government that Honduras, Nicaragua and Salvador, the States which a year or so ago made a combination under the name of the Greater Republic of Central America, which this government refused to recognize, have agreed to a new deal whereby the combination is to be known as the United States of Central America. A constitution has been adopted and a Presidential and Congressional election is to take place in time to get the new government under way by next March. If there isn't another new deal before that time. The title of the new combination is too near an infringement upon our own to be well thought of in this country.

CONSTANTINOPLE, October 21.—The Emperor and Empress of Germany, with the Sultan, reviewed 18,000 Turkish troops today from a window in the Yildiz Kiosk. Their German Majesty saluted the flag of each regiment.

Emperor William wore the uniform of a German general with several Turkish orders. Empress Augusta Victoria wore the Order of the Black Eagle.

After the review the Sultan escorted the Empress to lunch, taking her on his arm.

An immense crowd of Turks surrounded the palace and cheered until Emperor William appeared upon the balcony.

Later in the day the Emperor and Empress visited the mosque of St. Sophia and the museum, as well as many bazaars.

**THE STATE CAPITAL.**

English Talk Beginning to Make Trouble.

PARIS, Oct. 21.—What is here called "English yellow journalism" is beginning to bear fruit. There is no question that the relations of England and France are becoming extremely strained. This is chiefly due to the blustering attitude of the London papers over the Fashoda question.

So far the French press has been calm. Irritation, however, has begun to show itself. Temps tonight has a bitter comment on a cartoon in Punch, which Franco as an organ-grinder, with a monkey on his barrel organ, which is labeled Fashoda. John Bull is saying, "Go away." The organ-grinder replies, "What you give me?" Then John says, "Nothing, but what will I give you if you don't?" This is not calculated to promote a pleasant understanding.

Liberte asked last night if England really wished to provoke war. Tonight it dwells upon Sir Michael Hicks-Beach's recent warlike speech, and says: "We cannot, will not consent to a recall, pure and simple, of Major Marchand and to the humiliation of the French flag, which he planted at Fashoda under express orders from the government. If England persists in maintaining her indefensible demand we are ready to run the risk of refusal as she is to support the consequences of the attitude she has taken."

It would be a mistake to look upon this as bluster. Liberte only reflects the firm determination of the nation. The people want peace but not at any price.

**GOVERNOR RUSSELL FEARS STATE LEGISLATURE.**

Big Tobacco Breaks, High Prices. Large School Attendance. Prisoners Captured. Second Regiment Soldiers Seek Other Quarters.

Raleigh, N. C., October 23.

The "breaks" at the tobacco warehouses here on yesterday were the biggest of the season and the prices were the highest. The warehouses were filled to overflowing.

The attendance at the white graded schools, has become so large, that the school board have rented a large building with nice grounds, and by the 1st of November will have it in order for the opening of another school.

It seems strange, that in the face of the present political situation, that any white man who can possibly register has not done so. Today is the last day of registration, and yet last night the books showed 389 names unregistered. Of course many of these will register today, but still there was a risk run to put it off. The Republicans and Populists will be nothing neglected that will risk a vote.

The next legislature is the thing that Governor Russell fears. If the Democrats get the majority, Russell may be impeached and if the Republicans have control they will make it hot for him also. He is now kept busy courting friendship with many leading Republicans.

In July one of the privates of the Second Regiment became violently insane, and was placed in the Asylum here. Dr. Kirby at the time gave no hope of his recovery. Yesterday he died, and has been buried in the Federal Cemetery here. Nothing seems to have been known of his people. He came here and enlisted. His name is Kennedy and he was an Irishman and a Roman Catholic.

The two Federal prisoners who escaped from the penitentiary on Monday have been captured and returned to the prison.

The Seaboard Air Line Railroad on yesterday paid its county taxes here for 1898. The amount was \$3,376.73.

Chaplain Osborne of the Second Regiment was called to Lincolnton yesterday to attend the funeral of Rev. W. S. Bynum, who died there.

Today all tents, camp equipage, etc., pertaining to the Second Regiment camp will be put in the government store here and the few remaining soldiers will have to seek other quarters. Most of them will go to their homes.

Rev. Julius M. Horner who has been made Bishop of the Episcopal Missionary district of Asheville, is from Oxford, and a son of Mr. Horner who for so many years was head of the well known "Horner School."

The State Board of Pharmacy will on next Tuesday examine 12 applicants for license here.
