THE STATE CAPITAL.

Damages For an Accident. Schreiner for Election. Negro Will Buy. News Items.

RALEIGH, N. C., October, 26.

It will be recalled that some time ago a Miss Dillon was thrown from a buggy here, and struck a post that stood in the street to support a bridge. She sued the city for \$4,000 damages, and on yesterday the court gave her a verdict of \$4,000. The city will appeal.

There are many Republican and Populist leaders gathering here, to scheme for securing the election. They are evidently rather worked up on the outlook for Democratic success on the 8th of November.

This morning a heavy rain has set in that considerably effects the fair. The weather promised to be perfect, which meant much. The lady Marshals were quite a feature yesterday in the parade.

The news of Pritchard's letter to the President regarding the sending of federal troops here in North Carolina to control the election was the general topic of conversation here on yesterday.

Booker a negro, who two years ago murdered a negro woman here, has been tried and the verdict was murder. He appealed to the Supreme Court for a new trial. This court has refused to grant, so he will hang.

Governor Russell has issued his proclamation to the people of the State for law and order to prevail at the coming election.

Today the Confederate Veterans meet, and they will compose the biggest part of the Marshals in the parade.

Major Guthrie, the Populist nominee for Governor two years ago, has accepted the honor of presiding over the White Man's convention at Goldsboro on the 28th. He comes out in a card against the use of any military interference during the election.

The Morning Post here has cut an extra with a flattering history of the Second Regiment.

PARIS IS WILD.

Troops Clear the Streets. The Dryfus Matter Breaks Loose.

PARIS, October 25.—Few persons here have thought of Fashoda today. There has been a more immediately exciting affair on hand.

As the result of an adverse vote in the Chamber of Deputies the entire cabinet resigned. The vote was 245 for the government to 296 against it. The session was the opening one of the Chamber and was marked by wild disorder.

This crisis, coming at the time of the dispute with Great Britain about Fashoda, is regarded as particularly grave.

All the afternoon the centre of the city was in ferment. It is computed that more than ten thousand persons were massed in the Rue Royale alone from the Madeline to the Place de la Concorde. Favorite Deputies were wildly cheered; unpopular ones were frantically howled down. About 100 arrests were made.

It is not yet clear how many persons have been injured. Among them are three police agents. Several mild charges of cavalry were made. The crowd as far as possible was kept on the move or broken up by flank movements of the police, cuirassiers and mounted municipal guards.

Hundreds of copies of Dreyfus papers were piled up and burned as an expression of disapproval. In short, the volcanoes upon which Paris has been standing for some time seems to have begun to grumble ominously.

EVERYBODY COME!

Major Guthrie Will Preside at the Great Goldsboro Meeting.

Guthrie is For White Rule. Letter From Chairman Simmons. Russell's Proclamation. Negrolism on the run Everywhere.

DURHAM, N. C., October, 25th.

Hon. F. M. Simmons, Chairman, Raleigh, N. C.

Dear Sir—Your invitation tendering to me the honor of presiding over the White Man's Convention at Goldsboro on the 28th inst. has been received, and under the circumstances, I accept the same with pleasure.

Up to the present time I have not taken any active part in this campaign, and my intention was to refrain from doing so, until I read today's dispatches from Washington to the effect that the President and his cabinet are being importuned by men in high official position to send federal soldiers to North Carolina to interfere with our local affairs, and to uphold by the aid of Federal bayonets those who would perpetuate, if they could, the present disgraceful condition of our local State Government.

The time was, thirty years ago, at the end of the civil war, when such things had to be tolerated, but no true-hearted Southern man, who lived through the reconstruction period, can wish to see a repetition of those dark and stormy days, when civil law was dominated by military strength to uphold partisan local government.

It is high time now for all true North Carolinians to arouse themselves from their lethargy, and come together as one man, with one mind, determined that our Anglo-Saxon civilization shall be preserved.

The true white men of North Carolina, who love our State, should come together regardless of past party affiliations, and go to the polls on the 8th day of November, with the fixed resolution that the present condition of public affairs in our State shall be changed, so that men whose chief business in life has been demonstrated to be that of trading on party fealty as the means of getting for themselves personal gain, shall be driven from power and place, and that those who succeed them shall be worthy and competent to guide the future destiny of our good old State.

Maj. W. H. Bernard, member of the State Democratic Executive Committee, received the following telegram from Chairman Simmons:

RALEIGH, N. C., October 25.

Wm. H. Bernard, Wilmington, N. C.

Nothing has happened or is likely to happen in North Carolina to justify calling for Federal troops. If they are asked it will be for the purpose of intimidating the whites, emboldening the negroes, and aiding and protecting the desperate and panic-stricken Fusionists in carrying out the schemes they are known to be hatching for stealing the election. These politicians the wrath of the people when their desperate methods of fraud are exposed, and they cry out for the army to awe them into submission. We are going to carry this election by peaceable methods, and we are not going to be intimidated by the threat of the bayonet. Ask nothing of McKinley. Send no committee to Washington. We need have no fears. The aroused and outraged mass of the State will bury those who seek by intimidation and fraud to carry the State, under a majority of 30,000 votes, bayonets or no bayonets.

RALEIGH, N. C., October 25.—Governor Russell issues a proclamation reciting that "whereas, the Federal constitution secures to the States a republican form of government, protection from invasion and freedom from domestic violence, and the State constitution guarantees the inherent right to regulate internal affairs, to hold peaceful elections, and forbids that citizens be deprived or restrained of liberty, except upon indictment; and, whereas, it has been made known by the public press, by numerous letters, and by oral statements, that the political canvass has been made the occasion for bringing about lawlessness in certain counties, such, for example, as Highwood and Robeson; and, whereas, it has been made known to me, that certain counties lying along the southern border of the State have been invaded by certain lawless men from another State; that several political meetings in Richmond and Halifax counties have been broken up by armed men using intimidation, and in some cases actual violence, and citizens fired on from ambush; that several citizens have been taken from their homes at night and whipped; peaceful citizens have been intimidated and
