PARIS CALM AGAIN.

Police and Municipal Guards Prevent Crowds From Assembling.

Paris, October 26.—This city was calm all day. Although there was evidence of suppressed excitement on all sides, there was no new disturbance of public order. The police and municipal guards were out in strong force, and they would not permit large crowds to assemble. But the situation was eagerly discussed by excited groups in the main streets.

It is the intention of M. Faure to form a new cabinet as rapidly as possible, and the names of M. Ribot and M. de Freycinet are the most prominently mentioned in connection with the premiership.

M. Faure also, consulted M. Leygues, Vice-President of the Chamber of Deputies, who advised the formation of a concentration cabinet, to include among its members M. Ribot and M. Dupuy as the Principal ministers.

In the lobbies of the Chamber Deputies of all shades of opinion expressed the conviction that M. Delcasse should remain at the head of the foreign office, in order to assure the continuity of the Fashoda negotiations.

The Petit Journal publishes and interviews with the former minister of war, General Chanoinne, who says he resigned on account of his difference of opinion with Premier Brisson about the Picquet case.

The radical and revisionist organs express belief in the existence of a military plot. They urge a union of all republicans as the only means of giving stability to the future ministry.

CRIMINAL DEMOCRATS

So Holton and Thompson Allege in Joint Address.

Russell too Indisposed (?) to Speak at Wilmington. Fair News Items. No Federal Troops for Raleigh. Insurance Agents Meet.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., October 27.

The State Association of Insurance Agents was formed last night, and Mr. Alex Webb of Asheville, was elected president. The North Carolina Home Insurance company's officers gave an elegant banquet to the different insurance men here. Covers were laid for 125. Mr. W. S. Primrose, president of the company, presided, and acted as toast master.

The reception tendered the Maids of Honor, by Col. and Mrs. J. S. Cunningham last night was the social event of the week. The reception, and supper were at the Yarboro, and hundreds of friends of the host and hostess were there, everything was all that could be asked. Mrs. Cunningham was beautifully dressed in a Parisian gown of white silk, and her ornaments were pearls and diamonds.

Governor Russell on yesterday was visited by a delegation from Wilmington requesting him to cancel his engagement to speak in Wilmington with Senators Butler and Pritchard on Saturday. They laid the matter before him showing that if he did speak, there would undoubtedly be trouble. Today he telegraphed that it would be impossible for him to come.

The street car company is being severely criticized because they have doubled their rates to and from the Fair grounds. 10 cents is too much especially when it is remembered how the people have to be crowded because of too few cars, and then too it so often happens that the cars break down under the heavy loads on them. The Railroad Commission say they will look into this rate question, and hereafter regulate it.

The city pretty generally observed holiday today, and went to the Fair. The parade with the many marshals and floats was a fine one, and the weather lovely.

At the Confederate Veterans' meeting last night a committee was appointed to present the needs of the Soldiers' Home to the next legislature, and ask for a larger appropriation. Colonel Carr of Durham was elected president, and Capt. Ramsey of Salisbury vice president.

Pick pockets are at work among the immense crowd that is here to see the Fair.

This evening Capt. C. B. Denton delivered an address before the State Agricultural Society and many others on the life of the late Governor Thos. M. Holt.

Holton and Thompson, Republicans and Populist chairmen have issued a joint address to the people of the state. It is the first joint address issued this campaign. It is on the order of the proclamation of Governor Russell and charges all crimes committed to the Democrats.

Issue of War Bonds completed.

WASHINGTON, October 26.—The Treasury Department has practically completed the issue of the \$200,000,000 of 4 per cent. bonds authorized at the last session of Congress, and the last of the temporary force of clerks appointed for duty in that connection will be dismissed next Saturday. Whatever else remains to be done will be handled by the permanent treasury force. The highest allotment of bonds to any one subscriber will be \$4,480. Subscribers for \$4,500 will receive \$1,800 each, and possibly a few hundred dollars in addition. The amount will depend upon the result of a suit, now pending, to compel the Secretary to issue to subscribers about \$500,000 on subscriptions rejected by the department on the ground that they were irregular.

PHILIPPINE NEXT.

Peace Commissioners Nearly Conclude With Cuba and Porto Rico. News's Views.

WASHINGTON, October 26.—There are indications that the Peace Commissioners in Paris are approaching the end of the consideration of the subject of Cuba and Porto Rico, and officials here would not be surprised if to-day's session of the commission concluded those subjects, leaving the commission free to take up the most important matter in the protocol, namely, the disposition of the Philippines. The Spanish case has been presented with all facility and simplicity that commends the attention of diplomats without regard to nationality, and even our own officials have been compelled to yield a tribute of respect to the arguments produced, notwithstanding they have been of no avail in effecting any substantial change in the first attitude of the American commissioners, who are holding firmly to the line of procedure nominally outlined. It is expected here that henceforth, after the courteous intimation that has been conveyed to the Spanish commissioners that if it is time to regard the Cuban and Porto Rican matters as settled, better progress will be made toward the final consummation of a treaty of peace.

No one knows officially just what the extent of the United States claim will be as to the Philippines. Admiral Dewey has a much higher opinion of the Philippine people and their capacity for self government than is generally supposed. He has represented to the American commissioners that the Philippines of the northern group, meaning by that first the people on the island of Luzon, and after that, in order, Cebu, Panay, Iloilo, Mindoro, and Samar, are as a rule intelligent, practical, and (as a most surprising statement) far better qualified for self government than the inhabitants of Cuba.

Admiral Dewey is as familiar with the qualifications of the Cubans in this respect as almost any naval officer, having had personal experience with the people so that his statement is bound to have weight with the American commissioners. But with all this he has made no recommendation as to what should constitute the maximum or minimum demand of the Americans, and their demands are consequently likely to be based upon their original instructions, qualified by any changes of opinion the President may have experienced as a result of his western trip.

Some apprehension has been manifested in certain quarters as to the possible adverse effect upon the peace commission of an upheaval in France. It has suggested that the Spanish cause is in such shape that the Spanish government has nothing to lose and everything to gain by any change that can be brought about. However, it may be stated that, in the opinion of the State Department officials here, there is little danger of the situation in France becoming so acute as to justify the abandonment of the work of the commission on the ground that the commissioners themselves are in physical danger.
