REPUBLICAN MEETING.

Four White Men and Four Hundred Negroes. Think the State is Theirs.
With a brass band in attendance the Court House was filled with voters last night who intend to cast their ballots for negro rule. Not so surprising, except of these, four were sheriff Joe Hahn, E. W. Carpenter, Meyer Hahn and some friend whom he had in tow. A few white men came into the gallery to see what was going on.

The meeting was called to order by Sheriff Hahn who asked W. W. Lawrence to preside. "If it was agreeable to the congregation." It seemed to be agreeable and Lawrence presided, being introduced by the sheriff as "this gentleman."
Lawrence made some extensive remarks and then introduced Sheriff Hahn as the first speaker. Hahn began by saying that he felt highly flattered by the introduction of Chairman Lawrence and after some opening remarks made a complaint that he could not take a white man and a negro to Raleigh chained together without being written up and carted from one end of the State to the other. He then strongly advised the negroes to all vote the straight ticket and told them that they could tell it by "a little bird or something or other being printed on it for a device."
Hahn then confessed that if he had the arrangement of the county ticket it would have been done differently. He was willing to admit it, he said. No applause followed from the negroes, it was almost like treason as it seemed to hint that there was too much color on the ticket even for him. He advised the negroes to be quiet on election day, but if white men "assaulted" them "to beat them like the devil next day." He told the negroes just what to do on election day, the first thing to do said the sheriff, being "to pray to God to help them and their party."

Hahn's final appeal to the negroes was quite pathetic. It was to vote "in the names of your wives and children." Has any white man in North Carolina ever before called upon negroes "to vote in the names of their wives and children?"
E. W. Carpenter of unpleasant notoriety was the next speaker. It was a pretty big effort on his part. It may be remembered in allusion to himself that he said, "no matter how good a man you put upon your ticket he will be found fault with. If the savior was on your ticket he would be made out a rascal."
Recorder of Deeds Willis and candidate for Representative "Prof." Isaac H. Smith were the final speakers. No one would object to their remarks. As negroes they were addressing a negro audience. The Professor was a circus in himself and was worth the price of admission alone.
The queer part of the affair was the ignorance of the crowd of what was going on in the State. They seemed to think that the State was going for negroes. Even the two white men seemed as stupid about the situation as the negroes themselves.

WORSE NOT TOLD.

Western Republican Victim and New Berns For Himself.
In a recently delivered speech at Elkin N. C. the Hon. Clement Massey said that he would pay the expenses of any Republican who would go to New Bern, and see for himself if the conditions there, negro domination, were not as bad as he said they were.
This proposition was accepted by the Chatham Manufacturing Company, manufacturers of the celebrated woolen blankets, at Elkin, N. C.
The company sent as its representative Mr. David Woodruff, Superintendent in their woolen mills.
Mr. Woodruff is a plain, practical unemotional man. He sees and hears things as they are. He came here quietly and leaves quietly. He has seen New Bern as it really is. He saw its officials, city and county. He has seen the actions of the negroes on the street, in the public building, in the court house.
Last night, Mr. Woodruff visited the JOURNAL office, and quietly and simply told what he had seen here. He had no speech to make, no display of emotions to exhibit, but he was unquestionably impressed, deeply and seriously.
He could only say, "I never thought Republicanism meant such things for North Carolinians. I cannot vote such a ticket. The real conditions are far worse than any newspaper reports we have ever read."

Negro rule in this county has done much injury to property values. It will do more if continued and property owners will find that tenants will be hard to obtain. The truth needs to be told.
Two instances of white workmen deciding to leave New Bern have come to light. They are afraid that under existing conditions they will be thrown more into competition with cheap negro labor. They are intelligent white laborers with families. One of the men owns his home and is trying to sell it. The other is able to leave at once but has decided to remain until after election so as to cast his vote for white rule, being anxious to do his duty towards his fellow workmen who remain.
There are a number of men in this city, who own much property and are interested in various enterprises here who have done little or nothing for the cause. They are strangely indifferent. What they have is here however, and will suffer if their fellow citizens who believe in white government do not succeed, in pulling them as well as themselves out of the slough.
