HEINLEY AND ROOSEVELT.

Affraid That the Latter May Rival the President in 1900.

WASHINGTON, October 31.—It is said in political circles that the New York Republican leaders have not abandoned hope of persuading President to make a brief trip to that State in the interest of Colonel Roosevelt. Several of them have been here privately to make personal appeals to him and a number have written urgent letters. It is said to be a fact that the President did partially commit himself, and the Republican management felt justified in quietly passing around word that he was coming. It is not impossible he may finally yield, although such is not the impression of those here who are closest to him.

It is in connection an interesting piece of gossip is floating around, which finds ready believers. It is freely said that should Roosevelt be elected he would instantly forge to the front as a formidable rival of the President for the Republican nomination in 1900, and, therefore, it is not natural the President should be widely anxious for his success. Any one veiled in politics can readily perceive that Roosevelt, with his ambition, his self-confidence, his courage and his vigorous aggressiveness, after having demonstrated his ability to carry the State of New York, would not hesitate to put himself "in the hands of his friends." His military record in the war would also serve him in great stead, as the popular mind always takes more delight in the brave and brilliant soldier than in the mere politician or statesman, no matter how eminent.

THE STATE CAPITAL.

Anxiously Throughout North Carolina Over Election.

Second Regiment Masters Out Today, Sues For Divorce, Auditor Ayer Says Political Trouble Is Artificial.

JOURNAL BERNAU. Raleigh, N. C., November 1. Anxiously all over the State the people are looking to the 8th of November. The condition of affairs in the State is such that trouble is feared at the polls, and if the Democrats should be out numbered then there will be much trouble.

The mustering out of the Second Regiment begins tomorrow at Charlotte. Capt. Todd and the other mustering out officers left this afternoon for Charlotte to begin the work.

Stuart Robson plays "The Meddler" here tomorrow night.

The wife of Dr. A. J. Buffalo of this city has brought suit for divorce on the charge of neglect and cruelty. Mrs. Buffalo is the daughter of Superintendent Hicks of the Oxford Orphan Asylum, and who for so many years was warden at the penitentiary.

Auditor Ayer of the Populist State-committee declares that there is no "crisis" in North Carolina. That the reported race trouble is artificial. Democratic State Chairman Simmons, as well as Col. A. M. Waddell says that the situation is very grave indeed, but that the threatened race trouble may be avoided. They are both confident of Democratic victory. Secretary Hyams of the Republican State Committee is outwardly jubilant over the assured Republican victory.

Senator Butler, who came in today ordered a head for Thursday's paper, "The Caucasian," a double column head, "White Metal and White Supremacy."

Patridge shooting began today, and there were many hunters out. There are a great many birds.

No Work For Americans in Porto Rico.

WASHINGTON, October 31.—Mr. Hanna, American consul at Porto Rico, in a report to the State Department, says: "I am convinced that young men seeking work or positions of any kind should not come to Porto Rico. Such persons as clerks, carpenters, mechanics and laborers of all grades stay away from here. No American should come here expecting to 'strike it rich,' and no person should come here without plenty of money to pay board bills and enough to take him back to his home in the United States. This is a small island, has a population of about a million people, and is the most densely populated country in the world. There are several hundred thousand Porto Ricans ready to supply the demand for labor, and at a low price."

Cuban Affairs.

HAVANA, October 31.—Advises received here from Santa Cruz del Sur state that a majority of the representatives of the Cuban army who are meeting there are in favor of the dissolution of the Cuban insurgent government and the appointment of a commission to go to Washington for the purpose of thanking the American government for its intervention in favor of the Cubans, also to put themselves unconditionally at the disposition of the Washington authorities, so as to enable the latter to develop their programme without hindrance.

MARIA TERESA SAILS.

She Leaves Calmanera For Hampton Roads, Will Be Repaired.

WASHINGTON, October 31.—The Navy Department has received a telegram from Calmanera, announcing the sailing from that place for Hampton Roads of the Maria Teresa, which is up to this time the only one of the Spanish ships sunk at Santiago to be floated. She is under command of Captain Harris, who was detached from command of the Vulcan for that purpose.

The Teresa sailed from Calmanera at 6 o'clock yesterday morning with the Vulcan and the Leonidas. These vessels will escort the Teresa most of the way to Norfolk. It is probable that with fair weather the Teresa will reach Hampton Roads about Tuesday next. There she will be surveyed by the Naval Board, which will report to the Department the probable cost of putting her into condition for naval service.

The advice so far received at the department indicate that this is going to be an expensive undertaking, but nevertheless it will be carried forward as much from sentimental as practical consideration.
