A CLEAN SWEEP.

Not a Negro Now Holds Office in Wilmington. Large Police Force.

WILMINGTON, N. C., November 16.—There is now not a negro holding a position under the city administration here.

Under the Republican regime up to a recent date there were fourteen negro policemen, including one sergeant, but when Mayor Waddell and his Democratic board of aldermen went into office by the remarkable turn that affairs took last week the negroes were dropped from the police force and other positions.

Two of the companies of the paid fire department continued to be manned by negroes, but this afternoon the board of aldermen met and discontinued their services. Sixteen negro firemen went overboard and white men were elected in their places.

For the first time since November 6 the saloons opened at noon. On the day of the election and the subsequent days of the race conflict not a drunken man was to be seen in Wilmington, in consequence of the precaution of closing the liquor establishments.

The situation here is quiet. A well organized police force of seventy-five men is keeping excellent order since the withdrawal of the troops. Mayor Waddell and his aldermen are getting things in good condition, and already they are instituting wholesome reforms in all departments.

Mayor Waddell is receiving basketful of letters from all States of the Union. Most of the letters congratulate him, others threaten him, and some are abusive. The mayor throws the ugly letters in the stove and treasures the others.

Negro refugees are returning from the woods more freely. A cold, drizzling rain is forcing many of them to seek shelter in the city, despite their fears of the white man's gun.

A squad of police mounted on horse back is to be put into immediate service.

SPAIN AND AMERICA.

This Country The Only One that Pays For Conqueror's Territory.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—As the peace commission at Paris has adjourned until Saturday the apprehensions of a rupture will remain in abeyance until that date at any rate.

There is still a confident feeling in official circles that Spain will finally give in, but if not the mailed hand of war will not be long in constraining her. It is considered that Spain ought to be only so grateful that the United States is willing to allow any money consideration even if ever so little.

It was recalled today at the State Department as an interesting historical fact that of all nations the United States has been the only one to pay for ceded territory. In all wars ancient or modern, the conquerors have taken everything available without scruple, and all losses or acquisitions of territory have almost without exception been the immediate result of war.

The United States furnishes the most notable exception, as the Louisiana, the Florida and Gadsden purchases were all made in a time of peace. We also have the exceptional distinction of paying for land already won by the right of conquest, as we did with Mexico in the case of California, and as is now proposed in the case of the Philippines.

Spain, of all the nations of Europe, is far in the lead in the possession of territory without compensation as the result of unsuccessful wars. From the time of Philip the Second, or for more than three centuries, Spain has one after the other parted with her valuable possessions without the suggestion of compensation until in the present negotiations with this country.

Raleigh, N. C., November 17.—State Auditor Ayer, says that there will be an increase of about \$18,000 over last year as the money available for pensions, giving about \$195,000 for pensions. This does not mean though that there will be an increase in the individual pensions, for there are many applications on file that will be given pension. During the past year 48 pensioners have died.

The defeated candidate for solicitor in the 1st district, Ike Meekins, is here and has lots to say. Among other wild sayings is the one that Governor Russell will shortly call the last legislature in session to declare that the election of November 8, 1898, is null and void.

This may be a little premature as it is said that Congress may give the seat to Oliver H. Dockery, Sr., instead of J. D. Bellamy the Democrat, who beat Dockery in his district for Congress.

During the last two weeks there has been two lynchings within this State. One was within about 30 miles of Raleigh and the other up in the extreme west.

There remains only three companies of the Second North Carolina regiment to be mustered out of service. These are the Wilmington company, the Tarboro and Greenville companies. This week will finish up these, and then on the 23rd the regimental officers will be mustered out here in Raleigh.

It is said that Dockery, Republican, will contest the seat in Congress with Bellamy, Democrat. That is in the 6th District. Harry Skinner, Populist, will contest the seat from the 1st District, and Richmond Pearson, Republican, from the 9th.

The "Lilly White" Republican party project is growing. A meeting will probably be held in Asheville soon looking to the forming of such a party. It is believed that Senator Pritchard will favor an educational qualification which will eliminate the ignorant negro voter. It is said there is only one State officer who opposes an educational qualification. Some people say a well arranged election law will do as well as submitting the question to the people at the polls next August as a constitutional amendment.
