NOT TO RETURN.

French of Wilmington Likely to Keep Away. White Families Are Returning The Next Legislature.

WILMINGTON, N. C., Nov. 17.—The situation here is one of remarkable quiet after a week of tragedy. Mayor Waddell and the new city government are bringing order out of chaos and everything possible is being done to restore confidence.

In anticipation of trouble the women and children of many white families left the city before the election, but they are now returning. For two weeks a number of residences in the city were not inhabited, but there are few closed now.

One week ago G. Z. French, the acting sheriff, left Wilmington under threats that if he came back it would not be healthy for him. He was followed to the railway station by an indignant crowd, and violence would have been done had it not been for a prominent democrat, who went so far as to draw a pistol and order the crowd to stay out of the car. French has a plantation at Rocky Point, fourteen miles from Wilmington, and since his banishment he has been at his country place. He stated that as soon as everything got quiet here he intended to return, but was warned not to do so. French intended to come here this evening to straighten up some of his affairs, and the mayor ordered a squad of police to the depot to protect him, but he failed to put in an appearance. He got a friend to have his baggage shipped from a hotel to him, and it is, therefore, presumed that his absence will be prolonged.

Among other important legislation to be enacted will be an election bill which will protect the ballot and preserve white supremacy. The feature of the bill which will get rid of a large part of the negro vote in the eastern counties is being considered by the leading Democrats of the State.

The new Legislature will meet in January and the session will be an eventful one. Much legislation of the fusionists will be repealed, and especially the chapters under which many cities in eastern North Carolina have been negroized.

Many white Republican and Populist leaders are coming forward and expressing their eagerness to have the negroes disfranchised. Republicans particularly are open in their declarations on this question. They say that with the negro out of the question a strong white Republican party can be built up in North Carolina.

SPANISH STATEMENTS.

San United States Will Make Only One Reply.

PARIS, November 17.—The clerical force of the American Peace Commission was busy nearly all last night in translating the Spanish memorandum presented at yesterday's joint session. While the translators and typewriters were rendering the Spanish argument into printed English, counsel for the American commission studied it sheet by sheet, making notes of records to be examined and of law points bearing on the matter in hand. As a result, when the Americans gathered for their daily session today the Spanish presentation lay before them in English ready for consideration and accompanied by data bearing upon it.

No unofficial person knows the contents of the documents presented by the Spanish Commissioners yesterday, but it is safe to assume that, added to her insistence on the reservation of her Philippine sovereignty and her proposition to arbitrate the construction of the third article of the protocol, Spain has made two other important statements:

First—That on the high ground of financial propriety she cannot allow any discussion here of the validity of her action in pledging the resources of the Philippines for the payment of the Philippine debt.

Second—That, in connection with the American proposition to reimburse Spain for her Pacific expenditures in the Philippines, she cannot admit of an inquiry as to how she has spent the proceeds of the loan based on the Philippine pledges.

If Spain has assumed this attitude, and it is believed she has done so, she practically compels the American Commissioners to consider at least the entire Philippine debt and its assumption by the United States or the Philippines as a condition to Spain's antedated surrender of her sovereignty over those islands.

It is difficult to understand how the Americans can reply to this in any other manner than by strictly outlining their position and giving the Spaniards the time limit in which they may accept the proposition of the United States. But the American Commissioners may presently continue their endeavors to arrive at an amicable understanding on the subject.

A Great Warship.

POKESQUOIE, Eng., Nov. 17.—Thousands of people today witnessed the launch of the new battleship, Formidable, at the dock yard here. She is said to be the largest battleship in the world, being of 12,000 tons displacement. She is 260 feet long, 35 feet beam, and draws 28 feet 5 inches of water. She has 21,000 horsepower and is estimated to reach 20 knots, a notable feature of the launch of the battleship was the witnessing of the British and American flags on the launch.

THE STATE CAPITAL.

Another "Trusty" Convict Makes His Exit.

Gift of Punch Cups to Cruiser Raleigh. Dr. Koonce Resigns. Person County's Great School Benefits. Negro Left by His Friends.

JOURNAL BUREAU, RALEIGH, N. C., November 18.—President Cunningham of the State Fair is here winding up the business of this Fair. It is pretty certain that the receipts will pay all the Fair expenses, the premiums in full and one year's interest on the bonds. This is a splendid outcome, and leaves the officers of the Fair less hampered than they have been for many years.

The gift of 13 punch cups for the U. S. Cruiser Raleigh from Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Haywood of this city have just been completed by Messrs. Jacobs and Jenkins of Baltimore. The cups are silver, gold lined, and match the design of the elegant punch bowl given the cruiser two years ago by citizens of North Carolina. Mrs. Haywood christened the Raleigh and has always taken the greatest interest in the vessel. The cups are four inches high and rest on four dolphins.

U. S. Inspector Chalmers is here to inspect the office of U. S. marshal Henry Dockery.

At a meeting of the directors of the North Carolina Insane Asylum here last night, Dr. Koonce the assistant physician tendered his resignation. It was accepted, and Dr. E. L. Jenkins of Edgecombe county appointed to succeed him. Charges of incompetency and neglect of duty had been made against him some time ago.

The colored fair is having a bad time on account of the weather. Tuesday was the only good day this week, and as the Governor was not here to open the fair they waited for him. He has not come yet, so yesterday the fair was opened in spite of all things against it.

A wealthy man John C. Terrell who lately died in Philadelphia, left Col. J. S. Cunningham executor of his will. In this will he left money to build 38 public school houses in Person county, with permanent endowment of \$40,000 besides. This will put Person county ahead of all counties in the State as to public schools.

There is one less convict at the penitentiary today. Robert Johnson, colored "a trusty" concluded he had served sufficient time on his 3 years sentence, so shortened it by about 12 months by leaving.

The last legislature repealed the law requiring candidates for office to file their election expenses with the Secretary of State. Judge Hoke has however, filed his, and so has State Senator Thos. G. Skinner. Skinner's expenses were \$51,791.

The Republican organ in this State, The Winston Republican, says editorially that the negro as a race has never really benefited the Republican party.

The Democrats will no doubt succeed in making State Chairman Simmons the successor of Marion Butler in the U. S. Senate, and Chas. B. Aycock governor to succeed Russell in 1903.

Senator Butler in The Caucasian today says he favors a constitutional convention. The Morning Post of this city advocates calling on Congress to place negroes in the same class as Chinese, thus repealing the amendment to the constitution allowing negroes to vote.

There are now 5,440 State pensioners, 59 over last year. The increase in the number of soldier pensioners is 117, and a decrease of 59 widows. The 131 1st class pensioners will this year get \$79 each. The 272 2nd class ones will be paid \$54. The 353 3rd class \$36, the 1903 4th class \$17, and the 2681 widows \$15.

Blasphemy to End.

MADRID, November 17.—Captain General Blasco, in a letter to Senator Tlados, says: "The keenest sorrow of my life is surrendering Cuba, with an army of 150,000 men and two hundred guns, to an enemy which claims to have conquered Cuba while we are possessed of such resources."

MORE WARSHIPS.

Board of Bureau Chiefs Want a Large Increase of the Navy.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—Should Secretary LONG approve the recommendations of the board of bureau chiefs for an increase of the navy more formidable vessels will be asked for this session than ever before in the development of the establishment. The Secretary is not inclined, however, to accept this report in all respects, and will unquestionably make a considerable reduction in the extent of the program presented for his action.

The recommendations for this year's increase, as submitted by the special board, provide for three battle ships of over twelve thousand tons displacement, three highly protected armored cruisers of 22 knots speed and protection by at least twelve inches of armor, and three 3,500 ton cruisers. Mr. Long's report to the President has now been completed and will be of more than usual importance this year. It is understood that, while the Secretary will not specifically ask for a certain number of ships, he will present a programme, showing that the navy should have additional ships of certain classes, but leaving to Congress the decision determining how many should be authorized this session.

The bureau chiefs are strongly in favor of the heavily armored cruiser of extended steaming radius and capable of a large coal-carrying capacity, and of about fourteen thousand tons displacement. The secretary is said also to favor this type of vessel, and whatever increase is secured from Congress it is predicted that a number of armored cruisers at least will be secured.

TOAST QUEEN FIRST.

Strange Branch of Etiquette at the New York Dinner.

New York, Nov. 17.—There has been very wide comment upon the toasting of the Queen of Great Britain before drinking to the President of the United States at the New York Chamber of Commerce dinner on Tuesday evening. The chairman on that occasion violated all the rules of diplomatic and official etiquette. It has been the occasion of much gossip among the diplomatic corps and the question is frequently asked, "What will the Americans do next?" Severe criticism was passed at the State Department today, and it was said Lord Herschell, who was the guest of honor, was most probably embarrassed more than ever before in his life. He must have thought what a hubbub would have been raised in any British Assembly had the chairman been guilty of such an unpardonable breach as to propose to toast any one's advance of the Queen. In all countries in the world it is the invariable and inflexible rule to honor first the ruler of the nation, and the president of the New York Chamber of Commerce has the unenviable distinction of setting a precedent which he may be very sure will not be followed.
