TRIED TO KILL CEAR.

Obstruction Put On A Bridge Over Which His Train Had To Pass, Switchman Saved His Life.

BENLIX, Nov. 23.—A dispatch from Ebbing, a seaport of West Prussia, states that an attempt was made upon the life of Nicholas II of Russia while he was returning from Copenhagen recently.

Just before the czar's special train crossed the bridge between Boemerhofen and Legers a switchman found that the bridge had been obstructed. By almost superhuman efforts, as a result of which he is now in a hospital, the switchman succeeded in removing the obstacle sufficiently to permit the passage of the Imperial train.

An investigation of the circumstances is conducted in secret.

A correspondent of the London Telegraph, who was recently in St. Petersburg, writes as follows about the czar: "I have seen this young autocrat many times, and in close proximity. Never was power so stupendous embodied in form so simple, gentle and prepossessing. Everybody is familiar, by pictures at least, with the appearance of Nicholas II, who inherits, by his mother, Dagmar of Denmark, the type of princely grace to which English people have grown accustomed by the comely offspring of Dagmar's illustrious sister, Alexandra. It is a face which, whether you admire it or not, you must love, you must trust, you must even pity, so clear and plain it grows on you while you gaze that the mind behind it and the heart beating in that exalted breast feel the responsibilities of tremendous power a hundred times more than its pleasure or glories."

"I saw the young czar crowned in the ancient chapel of the Kremlin. I was almost within reach of him at that supreme moment, when, after the holy anointing, and the solemn ceremonies of the confessions of faith, and the proclamation of his titles, the youthful autocrat—he is but thirty years old today—placed on the brow of his beautiful, sad consort the diamond crown just removed from his own. She, on her knees, buried her sobbing face in her mighty lord's mantle and rose the greatest lady of two continents. I knew then that from nature so obviously noble, noble deeds and thoughts would spring—if the awful world of splendor and necessity in which the pair must live did not hinder."

A PEANUT TRUST.

Formed at Norfolk to Control Nearly The Entire Product.

NORFOLK, Va., Nov. 23.—A peanut trust which will control practically the entire product of the United States is in process of formation and promises to be thoroughly organized within the next month. W. E. Wetherly, formerly of Norfolk, but now of New York, and Mr. Dresser, also of New York, are the representatives of capitalists possessing it is stated three million dollars.

These propose to take over all the factories in this country, buying the stock and machinery of these and leasing the buildings. The attorney for the trust is former Governor Wm E. Campbell, of Ohio.

It is understood that thirty day options upon all the peanut-cleaning plants in Virginia, with the exception of that of the Gwaltney-Bunkley Peanut Company, the largest in the world, and two smaller factories, were secured by Mr. Wetherly upon his visit here last Monday. The assent of the Western concerns is understood to have been first secured. The value of the annual American crop is about four million dollars. Seventeen factories prepare it for market.

There are at Cincinnati, two at St. Louis, one at Evansville, Indiana, four at Norfolk, two at Suffolk, one at Franklin, one at Wakefield, and two at Smithfield, Va. The bulk of the crop are produced in Virginia and Norfolk is the largest distributing point in the world.

The Paris Commission.

PARIS, Nov. 23.—At the request of the Spanish Peace Commission, there will be no joint session today pending the instructions from Madrid. The date of the next meeting is not fixed.

The postponement of the day is regarded as a hopeful sign that the treaty will be signed. While the Madrid government has not yet received the text of the American ultimatum the Spanish ministers required quite enough by telegraph on Monday night to enable them to instruct their commissioners to retire, were such their intentions.

The belief was confidentially expressed by several of the American commissioners, in conversation with the correspondent of The Associated Press today that before the time fixed by the Americans, namely, Monday next, the Spaniards will acquiesce in the United States' ultimatum offer and that ultimately the treaty will be signed by all the Spanish commissioners.

North Carolina University the Victor at Richmond.

The Great Annual Contest of Football Between Universities of North Carolina and Virginia in Chapel Hill Jubilant.

RICHMOND, Va., November 24.—The great Thanksgiving football contest of 1898 between the football teams of the University of North Carolina and the University of Virginia, is now a thing of the past, but the glory of it will last many days and weeks, and the mere mention of the game will provoke wild cheers at Chapel Hill, whenever it is referred to.

And North Carolina Won!

And President Alderman of the University was there to see the game, and rejoice at the result when at its close the score showed:

University of North Carolina, 6.
University of Virginia, 2.

The day, in point of weather, was strictly football weather, with a temperature which made the contest fall of glory to the contestants, while the cold wind found the marrow of the spectators.

An immense crowd witnessed the game, which was hard fought from start to finish.

When the result was known and flashed over the wires to North Carolina, the wildest excitement prevailed, especially at Chapel Hill.

Hawaii's Admission.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—The commission appointed by the President to recommend a form of government for the Hawaiian Islands as a part of the United States met in Senator Cullom's committee room at the Capitol today for the first time since leaving Honolulu. Senators Cullom and Morgan, Representative Hitt and Judge Frear being present.

The meeting was devoted to discussing details of the bill and report, which the commission will present to Congress, which had not been decided upon at the last meeting. The legislation which will be recommended by the commission will be included in a bill which, to all intents and purposes, will be an enabling act and very much like the bill providing for the admission of new States into the Union, except in the one important detail that it provides for the admission of a territory and not a State. The bill has been completed, but probably will be amended somewhat in detail.

RALEIGH NEWS.

Raleigh, N. C., November 24.—It is quite evident that an election law or the constitutional amendment regulating the franchise by an educational or property qualification, or both, will be the great question before the Legislature.

Many Republicans and Populists stand by their voluntary statements pledged to support a constitutional amendment "eliminating the negro."

The discussion of the question in the State press is beginning to be general. The Biblical Recorder, the organ of the Baptists in North Carolina, says today: "We hope North Carolina will be given an election law modeled upon the Australian ballot idea. It is absolutely fair, and the only objection that can be made to it is that it requires decent intelligence of the voter, and that is its greatest virtue."

The other day a correspondent asked Democratic State Chairman Simmons his views of the matter, and he thought a well-prepared election law would answer the purpose.

The State labor commissioner says he is surprised at the discovery that fewer hogs, by 150,000, are now raised in North Carolina than were raised in 1890. Cotton, the crop mortgage system and the consequent purchase of food supplies, such as meat, from the West, have caused this state of affairs.

Governor Russell does not like the publication in the New York Herald last Sunday of the statement that at Laurinburg the night of election day he was mobbed. He says it is false. His statement made the next day was sent, in which he said nothing unpleasant occurred.
