ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT.

MEX OF THE TREATY ARTICLES SIGNED.
The Remainder Under Discussion.

PARIS, Nov. 30.—The American and Spanish peace commissioners held a joint session today and approved the draft of part of the peace treaty. Thirteen articles, which, it is proposed, shall be incorporated in the treaty, were laid before them, as follows:

First—The relinquishment by Spain of sovereignty over and claim of title to Cuba.

Second—The cession of Porto Rico and other Spanish possessions in the West Indies, together with Guam, in the Ladrones.

Third—The cession of the Philippines.

Fourth—The terms of evacuation of the Philippines.

Fifth—A pledge of the United States to preserve order in the Philippines pending the ratification of the treaty.

Sixth—The mutual release of military prisoners.

Seventh—The cession by Spain of the island of Kosule, or Strong Island, in the Carolines.

Eighth—The mutual relinquishment of indemnity claims.

Ninth—The religious freedom of the Carolines, assuring the rights of American missionaries there.

Tenth—Cable landing rights at places within the Spanish jurisdiction.

Eleventh—The release by Spain of political prisoners, who are being punished for offenses in Cuba and the Philippines.

Twelfth—The pledge of the United States to inaugurate in the Philippines an "open door" policy and to guarantee such a policy to Spain for at least twelve years.

Thirteenth—A revival of the treaties broken by the war.

The first six articles were mutually agreed upon. The terms of evacuation of the Philippines will be practically the same as those for the evacuation of Cuba and Porto Rico. As to the mutual release of military prisoners Spain will liberate her rebel prisoners and the United States will liberate the Manila garrison and the Spaniards held by Aguinaldo.

Only eight of the thirteen proposed were discussed. Four points arose regarding which the Spaniards desired to consult Madrid and two upon which the Americans will consult Washington.

Daily joint sessions will be held hereafter and the work of the joint commission may be concluded this week, although so early an end is not probable.

FIVE MILLIONS INCREASE.

Shown By State Board Of Equalization.

Governor Russell's Appointments Severely Criticized Raleigh's New Mayor. Present From Geo. Vanderbilt. Sheriff Must Requit Taxes.

Raleigh, N. C., December 1.

The State Board of Equalization has completed its report and shows an increase of over \$5,000,000 taxable property.

The twilight wedding yesterday of Mr. Thomas M. Ashe and Miss Nannie Branch Jones at Christ Church was one of the prettiest weddings ever seen in this beautiful church.

There is still the most severe criticism of Governor Russell for his military appointments. Capt. A. D. Cowles and Lt. O. H. Dockery, Jr. Even members of the Third Regiment, (colored), say they would not like to have such incompetent men over them.

Mr. P. C. Ennis who will be a candidate for State Librarian before the legislature, says if he gets the place the library will be kept open at night. This is what ought to have been done all along instead of closing the library before dark, for so many there have been deprived of the privilege of using the library at all. This will be a big argument in favor of Mr. Ennis.

There are all sorts of hitches regarding the settlement of the States claims of \$2,113 against the government for money paid in mobilizing the volunteers. The government met the claims with a counter claim of \$35,000 Indian claim. Mr. J. C. L. Harris so far has been unable to get things settled, so tomorrow Governor Russell proposes to go to Washington in person and see what he can do.

Tomorrow night the Board of Aldermen will elect Mr. A. M. Powell mayor, to succeed Mayor Russ, who on Monday takes his new position of Clerk of Wake county court.

The military that was on duty at Wilmington during the race riot there will be paid the same as soldiers in the regular army. The call on the Treasury for the amount will be considerable.

Mr. George Vanderbilt has presented to the Department of Pharmacy at the University forty (40) specimens of medicinal herbs collected at Biltmore.

The Bobbitt-Wynne Drug Company was organized here last night and chartered by the State. It will conduct a wholesale and retail drug trade in Raleigh. The stockholders are all strong business men. Mr. J. Hal Bobbitt is president of the new company.

Today the State Treasurer issues a letter to every sheriff in the State asking that they remit the State taxes for 1893 as early as possible. That the demands on the Treasury within the next few weeks will be heavy is shown by the fact that State Auditor Ayer today issues pension warrants to the amount of \$120,000, to be paid in the next 60 days. On January 1st, 1899, \$66,000 will have to be paid for interest on the 4% bonded debt of the State. It will take fully \$70,000,000 to meet the expenses of the legislature. These and the running expenses require that all available money be sent in as early as possible.

A white woman 35 years old from Polk county was today placed in the penitentiary for shooting her 9 year old son.

The newly elected Congressman from the 3rd District, Charles R. Thomas, is here.

Victor H. Boyden, one of the clerks in the Revenue office has resigned and is succeeded by I. H. Denton.
