**WILMINGTON VOYAGE.**

Visit South American Waters in Which Our Flag Has Never Been Seen.

WASHINGTON, December 21.—One of the most interesting cruises undertaken by an American warship in years begins with the departure of the Wilmington from the Norfolk navy yard tomorrow. The Wilmington is under orders to explore waters and visit settlements which have never before seen the colors from a United States naval vessel. The object of the voyage is to open up, if possible, closer commercial relations between several South American countries and the United States. The Wilmington will be gone about a year.

She will first visit the important ports of the West Indies, after which she is to proceed directly south to the Orinoco river and go up as far as practicable. This river will admit ships of the Wilmington class several hundred miles, and it is proposed to go just as far as the safety of the vessel will permit. The natives along the shores will be invited to engage in trade with this country, and to look after the diplomatic end United States Minister Loomis will accompany the vessel by order of the State Department.

The voyage completed, the Wilmington will enter far into the interior of South America, proceeding hundreds of miles up the great Amazon. She will go so far, indeed, that she will possibly be nearer the Pacific coast than the Atlantic when she finally turns back. Visits will be made to the seaport cities of Brazil and Uruguay, and then the Rio de la Plata will be entered as far as it is practicable to go.

**Displaced Charity.**

Wednesday, Mr. Eason Daniels, who claims Cedar Point as his home, was in the city and for the night went to the boarding house kept by Mrs. Willis on South Front street.

Later in the night a young man arrived at the same house, and claiming to be without money, asked the assistance of Mr. Daniels to pay for a night's lodging. Mr. Daniels very kindly took the young man for a room mate.

Awakening the next morning Mr. Daniels found himself the sole occupant of the room, and upon examination of his clothes found that the pocket in his pants had been cut out, and his money, estimated from ten to twenty dollars, was gone.

A young man was afterwards arrested on suspicion as being the room mate, but after an examination before S. R. Street, J. P., the man was discharged, there being no evidence against him.

**Negroes Moving Out.**

COLUMBIA, S. C., December 20.—The negroes of Greenwood county have begun to emigrate. It is thought that several hundred will leave in the next few weeks. Several carloads of them have gone since last week. They are moving to the lower part of Mississippi. An immigration agent went into the county some time after the Phoenix race riot.

A Greenwood man says: "There is no denying the fact that the negroes in the populous sections of the county are badly demoralized. They are in some places still panic-stricken on account of the Phoenix troubles. They have not been molested, but have the unreasonable fear so common to ignorance."

The negroes of Saluda and Phoenix will hardly make contracts for another year. Merchants have enforced collections to the detriment of many families. Under the circumstances this exodus is expected to thin out the over-abundant negro population of this county considerably.

The colored renters are leaving. As a consequence some of the best land in the county will be occupied by white renters hereafter.

**Mr. Eason Daniels.**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—The President today named Ethan A. Hitchcock, of Missouri, to be secretary of the Interior, vice Bliss, resigned. Mr. Hitchcock is at present Ambassador to Russia. He was appointed minister more than a year ago and when the rank was raised to an embassy he was reappointed.

Mr. Hitchcock is a business man of St. Louis and was for sometime an extensive plate glass manufacturer. He is a great grandson of Ethan Allen, of Revolutionary fame. His ancestors were from Vermont, but his father moved north and he was born in St. Louis.

Railway Will be Purchaser C. P. & Y. V. Railroad.

Pension Warrants Coming in Rapidly. Report Public Charities. To Examine Condition Penitentiary, Railway Commission Applicants.

Raleigh, N. C., December 21.

It is now said that the sale of the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railroad which takes place December 29, may result in that road going to the Southern Railroad. The minimum price will be \$2,000,000. It was thought once that the Seaboard would be the purchaser, but that road will not buy. The Coast Line also has an eye on the road.

Pension warrants are coming in rapidly for payment. State Treasurer Worth has so far paid out \$10,561. The total amount of pension money to be paid out this year is \$120,000.

The State Board of Public Charities began its annual session today. It will take two days possibly to finish up the business, for the report of the secretary, Capt. Denson, of the condition of every prison in State as well as the asylums, etc., will necessarily be very long, and the report of the board to the General Assembly will be made up from his report.

The special committees appointed by the penitentiary board to examine the conditions of the penitentiary farms left yesterday.

The alliance men are not patronizing the shoe factory at Hillsboro established by the State Alliance, so a meeting of the Farmers State Alliance is called to meet at Hillsboro on the 29th to finally settle whether the factory should continue operations. The Alliance in this State once had 100,000 members, but it has fallen off so that the membership now is only about 5000.

There are many applicants for the Railway Commission. Only the best men ought to be appointed, for it is a very responsible office.

The examinations at the Agricultural and Mechanical College which has been in progress are about completed.

All the post-office employees all over the country will on January 1st have to be bonded direct by the government. The letter carriers have already been so bonded.

Federal court adjourned here yesterday, sending 8 convicts to penitentiary, and 34 to jail.

There is a great demand for good cotton here. Owing to the late picking, there will be a larger quantity of stained cotton here.

The fogs that caused so much disaster in being the cause of rail road disasters north, seem to be prevalent all over the country, for here in Raleigh they are so heavy that the big electric lights twinkle like tiny stars and one cannot see across the streets.

Again the mastering out of the Third North Carolina Regiment (negroes) is talked about. The record of this regiment is such that no plea for its continuance can well be made.

**Weyler Hung in Ediz.**

HAYANA, December 21.—The United States transport Chester, which sailed from Savannah on December 18th, with the Fourth Virginia on board, arrived here yesterday. The regiment marched to Quemas camp today.

Ediges of General Weyler were hung this afternoon in Cerro, the suburb, surrounded by jarring crowds, while small processions marched and counter-marched along the streets, shouting constantly. Business is virtually suspended in consequence over the rejoicings over the evacuation.

In some instances bands of Cubans have visited Spanish shop-keepers and compelled them to about "Viva Cuba Libre" and to wave Cuban flags.

Printed papers insulting to the Spaniards and threatening to kill them after January 1st, continue to be circulated in various parts of the island.

**RISKED THEIR LIVES.**

Naval Officers in Secret Service During Our War with Spain.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—On April 30 Ensign W. H. Buck, who was then at the Naval Academy, and Ensign H. H. Ward, on duty here, volunteered to risk their lives in order to secure information which might be of value to the government. Both of these officers were detailed and, in disguise and under assumed names, traveled abroad.

Ensign Buck remained in Europe, where he followed and reported the movements of Admiral Cervera's squadron, and Ensign Ward, after visiting Cadix and reporting the strength of the Spanish naval forces there, went to the West Indies, where he was employed until July 18, obtaining and reporting in regard to the Spanish forces. He visited San Juan in June and was there seized and detained by the Spanish naval and port authorities. He succeeded, however, in procuring the information which he sought, and in leaving San Juan and cabling his information to the Department. Both officers returned home safely.
