FAST WORK

In Both Branches of the Legislature.

Important Bills Introduced. Constitutional Amendment for Suffrage, Jim Young's Name Despoiled, Senator Bryan's Bills.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Jan. 6.—In the House today, Francis D. Winston, President of the White Government Unions during the last campaign, introduced a bill amending the Constitution, regarding suffrage.

The bill provides for a constitutional amendment, to be voted upon in May, 1900, at the General Elections, the time of the State election to be changed to that date.

The new plan of suffrage is planned from the Louisiana Constitution. In it are property and educational qualifications. It admits to registration all who served in the United States Army prior to January first 1867, their sons and grandsons.

A bill was introduced to repeal the act regarding the rates to be charged by five insurance companies.

A bill to repeal the law of 1897, preventing Peg Leg Williams from carrying off colored laborers from the State, carried by vote of 99 to 4.

The Senate.

In the Senate a bill was introduced to regulate the fees of insurance agents.

The purpose of this bill was to cut down the emoluments which Cyrus Thompson, Secretary of State, has been getting.

Bills, by J. A. Bryan, of Craven, to regulate the bonds of the officers of Craven County, to provide for the filling of vacancies in the county office, to provide for a permanent system of government of Craven County.

Mr. Bryan will introduce tomorrow, in the Senate, a bill providing for the increase in the number of the County Commissioners of Craven County.

Bills were introduced in both houses, providing for the removal of James H. Young's (negro) name from the corner stone of the Blind Institution.

The House amendment provides for the removal of the corner stone, this stone to be replaced with another, which shall have the names of those who planned the building.

FULFILLING PROMISES

And the People Are Glad to See It.

Important Legislative Work And No Delay, the Motto. Raleigh in Bad Shape As to Lights. Bills Introduced.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., January 6. "By their fruits ye shall know them," and the Legislature in its first regular business day has started on the road to the fulfilling of the promises upon which it was elected.

Bills for amending Dark Belt city charters, for separate cars for the races called for by definition "Jim Crow Cars," for an amendment to the constitution so that the tax on the white race shall go to white schools and the tax on the negro race shall go to the negro schools, an omnibus bill in each branch to cut down all salaries, these are some of the steps already taken to the fulfilling of pledges given.

That the members of the Senate especially are here for work was shown by the naming of ten o'clock as the hour for meeting each day and the voting down of a resolution to meet at 3 p. m. Mondays. The House will meet at eleven o'clock each day.

The matter of naming the hour for meeting caused the first little discussion of interest in the Senate. The Senators as a rule are not much given to talk. When the question of time came up, Senator R. H. Glenn, arose and said, "this is no child's play that we are engaged in. We have business and lots of work ahead and I am in favor of striking out everything in the resolution except that the Senate shall meet at ten o'clock each day. In its way of work this must be a Farmers Legislature."

A number of resolutions are already introduced in both the Senate and the House and many of them passed to a third reading under a suspension of the rules and sent without engrossing.

The Governor's message was as mild as had been expected and the only spark of fire was at its close on the negro domination question as follows:

"It has been charged in the public press and other States and the impression seems to prevail among many people in various sections of the United States and, perhaps, in foreign countries that North Carolina has been under negro government, and that the Government of the State has appointed large numbers of colored persons to office. It appears from a count made of the commissions issued from the Executive office to persons appointed by the Governor that I have appointed in two years to civil offices eight hundred and eighteen persons, of whom not more than eight were colored."

Five hundred copies of the message were ordered printed. The Governor promises to send to the Assembly his reasons for commuting the sentences of 13 persons and for issuing 107 pardons.

A clause of the message that should be viewed contentedly is the statement that the experiment in shirt making at the penitentiary was not "satisfactory," wherever these shirts go or by whoever they are worn they come into competition with a class of labor that is now the poorest paid of all that earn a precarious livelihood and is the worst form of convict labor competition.

Among the bills introduced in the House were those: To compel railroads to operate air brakes on all trains, to repeal the law giving certain dead bodies to medical colleges, and reduce the fees of registers of deeds.

There was no caucusing last night or this morning which gave the members a chance to discuss measures and the committees to get in some work. One of these results was the passing on the contest in Greene county and the admission of Representative Sugg to the House.

The Penitentiary Board does not seem inclined to resign and there may be war between the Board and the recently appointed officials. The Board met and passed a resolution, as follows:

"Resolved, by the Board of Directors of the State Penitentiary that they will aid in any manner possible in the investigation of the conditions of the institution by any committee appointed for that purpose by the State Legislature; and the services of the board are hereby tendered such committee."

"Resolved further, that when this board adjourns it is subject to the call of the chairman."

Chairman Dockery says that they are willing to be investigated, but willing or not, that will be what the legislative committee will do in the fullest degree.

Dr. E. B. Glenn of Asheville was appointed Assistant Surgeon of the Second Regiment of the State Guard. The positions in this regiment are now all filled with the exception of one Adjutant.

CHICAGO, Ill., January 5.—Mayor Harrison's following has secured control of the Democratic State central committee. This is a hard won victory for former Governor Algeid.

The new executive committee of the State body announced today shows that the leaders have hung aside Algeid sympathizers.

Mr. Algeid now proposes to form a third party. His friends assert that he hopes to draw to his support voters of socialist tendencies. With this following and aided by Senator Jones and other officials of the national Democratic committee who are radical in their views he hopes to write some history in 1900 and prevent any slighting of silver by the act of Mayor Harrison and the dominant crowd in Illinois.
