A motion was passed requesting Ex-treasurer Glas B. Hill to turn over to Mr. Daniels all the books, papers, etc., belonging to the office.

The treasurer's bond for the safe keeping of the county school funds is eleven thousand dollars. Mr. Daniels gave bond through a security company. This sort of bond is considered the best form of bond which can be given.
Mr. H. C. Whitenour was elected to fill the vacancy on the school committee of the eighth district, which vacancy was caused by the resignation of Robert Hancock.

Death of J. A. Cunningham.
Mrs. Kate Richardson of this city received a telegram Sunday morning from Greensboro, N. C. Conveying the sad intelligence of the death of her brother, the Rev. Jesse A. Cunningham, which occurred Saturday night.
He had been ill for some time, but the immediate cause of his death was heart failure.
Rev. Mr. Cunningham was one of the oldest members of the North Carolina Conference, M. E. Church, South. After long and successful service in the pastoral relation he was called to the responsible work of presiding elder. In that capacity he served the Raleigh district 4 years, and with the close of the last conference year completed his time limit on the Durham district. Admonished by failing health and the infirmities of age, he realized that his work in the ministry was finished. He was too feeble to attend the conference at Elizabeth City, and wrote a letter to his fellow laborers in the ministry, asking to be placed on the superannuated list. His request was granted.

REPELLED FROM GAUCOS.
Isaac H. Smith 227 East by Republicanism in Legislature.
"Whereas it appears from the recent acts, speeches, utterances and votes of Isaac H. Smith, the Representative from Craven county, that the said Smith is not in true sympathy and good accord with the Republican party and its principles, therefore:
"Resolved, first, that the said Isaac H. Smith be and he is hereby excluded from participating with the Republican members in their caucuses.
"Resolved, second, that the Republican party will in no way be responsible for the acts and speeches and votes of the said Isaac H. Smith."
The above resolution was adopted last night by the Republican caucus held in the State Library building.
The Isaac Smith referred to is the negro Representative from Craven county, and a banker at Newbern.
His offices consist, it is stated, in the following:
Act—Refusing to be bound by the action of the Republican caucus.
Speeches—His speech in the House Friday on the "Peg-Leg Williams" Bill.
Utterances—His letter published in this paper Thursday morning.
Votes—His vote for the Democratic Speaker and other officers and votes on certain measures in the House since.
The speech was in part as follows:
"When I hear the harsh things said by the white man about my race, I can only ask, 'Is Memory Dead, is Memory Dead?' I'm told that this very State House was built by colored hands and paid for by money dug from Mother Earth by colored slaves. Are these things forgotten? When the war cloud rose and darkened the S. others sky for four years, did we not serve you most faithfully? When your young men went out to battle did we not remain and toil for and care for your women and children? We are friends of good government, did we not know how to be. All we want is good opportunity to show what we can do. We want good hands to protect and guide us aright. Too long we have been led by false friends. We want good and true friends, and when I hear it said that this General Assembly will legislate to the hurt of my race, I can but ask, 'Is Memory dead, is Memory dead?'
In his letter published Thursday Smith denounces a circular sent out by certain leaders advising the colored people to emigrate out of the State, the representatives of the race to meet in Raleigh on an early date and organize to this end and while there assembled to memorialize and dictate to the present Legislature what kind of laws to be passed for the colored people.
Among other things Smith says in this letter:
"My colored friends, this present Legislature is ruder as the wisest and most brainy of any since the Civil War. Then again this Legislature is constituted of Carolina's most honorable sons in principle, learning and are versed in the law of right to man and to races. I have never believed that the Democratic party was a self constituted enemy to my race."—News and Observer, 8th.
