**HOW MR. BUCK GOT THE FLEECE.**

There has been a desire on the part of many to know how Mr. Geo. H. Buck, of Beaufort, came into the possession of the Second North Carolina regimental battle flag which he recently received.

Yesterday Major Chas. L. Davis, acting Adjutant General, received a letter from Mr. Buck, who tells how he got it. He says:

"On the morning of April 2, 1865, as soon as I could, after my regiment entered Richmond (and we were very close to the head of the column) I quietly slipped away to have a good look at the city which had been so successfully defeated for nearly four years. Naturally I secured a great day to my comrades and myself, and to say that we were elated would be putting it very mild, and we traveled over as much of it as possible in the short time at our disposal. One of the first things to attract my attention was a view of grating darkies who were gazing out of a hotel (the Union House) loaded with plunder of various kinds, among which I noticed the commissary and quartermaster's stores, and which apparently was not a regular issue. I entered the building and found that it had been used in part as a store house by the Confederate troops. In the dining room I noticed what seemed to be a large amount of regimental baggage, which some of the boys were examining with a great deal of interest, and with a total disregard of the rights of private ownership. There were quite a number of officers' valises, which, as the officers had failed to leave the keys, were violently opened and apparently some articles of value obtained.

"While I was there I saw some very fine revolvers of English make transferred to the Northern side of the difficulty, and in one valise out of which one of my comrades removed a revolver, I saw this flag and appropriated it at once as a memento of almost priceless value. Wrapping it about me under my blouse, I kept it safely for a few weeks until I secured a chance to send it to my home, where it has remained all these years, carefully watched and guarded against moth. This was the extent of my plundering, and now that I have had the pleasure of returning it to the original owners, I am not sorry I plundered."

Mr. Buck has received an invitation to attend the meeting of the surviving veterans of the Second regiment, which will be held shortly in New Bern. He says he may possibly be there.—News-Observer, Feb. 7th.

**An Immense Apiary.**

Baxter, the Jeweler, is an enthusiast apiarist, and has given a good deal of time to the study of the ways of the little busy bee, and for several years has kept colonies of bees in his yard in this city, where he each season gathered in a goodly supply of very choice honey.

This season Mr. Baxter has gone into a more extensive business, and has established an apiary of sixty colonies at the head of Vandemere cr. on Pamlico county.

The colonies are located in a cleared field, on high ground, and besides the fields, from which the pine trees have been cleared, there is a peach of swamp of thirty miles in extent.

Mr. Baxter who has just returned from his apiary, says the location is an unusually fine one, rich in a varied flora, and that the bees had already commenced gathering their bread.

The colonies are placed six feet apart, thus giving each plenty of room.

Mr. Baxter says he expects to get from two to three tons during the coming season from his colonies. The bees are all of the Italian variety.
