THE LAST MAN.

A. H. Boyden named the Board of Internal Improvements.

RALEIGH, February 8.—The Seventh District man, and the last one to be named to fill the Board of Internal Improvement was selected today. He is Mr. A. H. Boyden.

The Vance Textile school bill passed the House by a vote of 57 to 45, after three hours debate.

In caucus, tonight, the suffrage bill will be discussed.

DRIVEN INLAND.

Philippine Bill Being Forwarded, Will Be Cracked At Once.

The latest advice from Manila are that the American troops continue to drive the Filipinos inland.

General Ota's soldiers have attacked Santol, eleven miles northeast of the city. A brigade also captured the Manila water works, which had previously been held by the Filipinos.

Some of the natives are making a determined resistance, but are poor marksmen. The remainder of the Filipino army's survivors are retreating.

It has been decided to begin a vigorous and aggressive campaign against the Filipinos. General Ota is to move at once on Malolos, the capital of the native republic, and General Miller is to attack Iloilo. The cabinet at Washington has reached the conclusion that Aguinaldo's men be forced to lay down their arms if order is to be maintained in the Philippines.

Aguinaldo has issued a proclamation of war against the Americans.

General Ota, in a cablegram to Washington, estimates that the Filipinos have lost 4,000 killed, wounded or captured. This is believed to be below the correct figures.

The General has sent additional cablegrams giving the names of the Americans killed and wounded, bringing the killed up to 49 and the wounded up to 148. He estimates that the American's total loss is 230.

It is reported that one of the leading causes which precipitated the outbreak at Manila was the seizure by Admiral Dewey of the schooner Tanang, laden with arms for the Filipinos.

Admiral Dewey's Strategy.

The Olympia, Admiral Dewey's flagship, took no part in the bombardment. With the fine strategy for which the American naval commander is noted, he placed his vessel in a position directly in front of the city, between the Spanish gunboat General Alava and the German cruiser and the troops ashore.

The significance of this move will be readily grasped. This was a fight between Americans and Filipinos, and no outsiders could be permitted to enter the ring, so Admiral Dewey constituted himself a sort of referee to say "hands off" if it became necessary.

The enemy were totally unprepared for the vigorous punishment that was administered to them, and from which they will require a long time to recover. The moral effect of the drubbing given to them will be great.

The Filipinos apparently thought they could massacre the Americans in a night attack, as they easily and frequently did the Spanish troops sent against them, making the fatal error of not weighing the difference between the morale and discipline of the American and Spanish troops. This difference resulted in thousands of them losing their lives in a hopeless case.

Aguinaldo, so far as can be learned, did not risk his precious skin with his troops and is still able and willing to make further trouble.—N. Y. Sun.

THE LEGISLATURE.

Committee Tangled Up On Jim Crow Car Matter.

A Muddy Capital. Craven County Bills, Cumberland County Dispensary, Taxing Railroads, Merchants Purchase Tax, The Wilson Force Case.

The members of the General Assembly will remember the session for one cause if no other, the rain and the mud. Raleighites claim that it is years since the streets have been so bad, in spite of the improvement, but probably they are not so bad or the mud so deep as when Legislators have been known to be carried across the street on strong men's shoulders at one dollar apiece. But this was in the long ago.

There was no night session last night, out of compliment to the filled Institution. An entertainment was given in the new building to which the members were invited. Many accepted and enjoyed the program of music, drills and band playing. The big hall 150 by 85 feet is at the top of the building and contains 1,000 chairs. The building is fire proof and a fine structure.

The attendance at both House and Senate was very fair yesterday. Numbers of new bills were introduced. In the Senate, to give additional Justices of the Peace to Craven introduced by Senator Brown in the absence of Senator Bryan, who is still confined to his rooms in the House, a bill to provide for the appointment of directors and State proxy for the A. & N. C. Railroad by Leak.

The bill regarding directors of the N. C. R. R. provides that they shall be elected by the State board of Internal Improvements and that that board shall also have power to remove them and fill the vacancies.

The reply of the State treasurer to the resolution of inquiry as to what sums of money he had paid out to the penitentiary, &c., was received and placed in the hands of the finance committee.

The reply of the Governor was read to the inquiry as to what vacancies there are on the board of directors of the penitentiary. The reply said there were two—from the 7th and 9th districts. Winston said one of these had occurred within the past 48 hours. He then placed in nomination William C. Newland from the 7th and Marion L. Bryan from the 9th. Newland and Bryan were elected.

The bill to regulate the bonds of officers in Craven county passed the House on a final reading. A bill was introduced by McNeill to reduce the rates on the ferry at Wilmington across the Cape Fear river 25 per cent, to take the place of a former bill calling for a 50 per cent reduction in certain cases.

Under the head of unfinished business in the Senate the bill to repeal section 3113 of the Code again came up. This bill provides that a local option election shall be held once in 5 years on the petition of one-third of the qualified voters of a county, and in any month of the year instead of June, as formerly.

The majority of the Senate seemed to be opposed to the measure, and amendments, excepting county after county was read by the clerk.

Finally Senator Glenn asked permission to withdraw the bill he had introduced it and was allowed to do so.

A bill was introduced in the Senate to amend chapter 145 of the Public Laws relating to fishing in the Neuse river. It is to prohibit the setting of nets within a mile of the Neuse river bridge. It is said that by taking advantage of the new bridge these nets are set entirely across so as to almost entirely prevent the run of fish.

Another old legislative snag was removed yesterday by the hearing before the committee in the Senate chamber of the dispensary law of Cumberland county. The big delegation from Fayetteville was present and the chamber was crowded. The discussion was warm and did not fall to be personal at times.

There was more wrangling than a little and, preachers and prohibitionists (by some other name) were strictly attending to business. Finally about dark the committee asked the audience to retire, and shortly after voted to sustain the dispensary. The people will have no opportunity to vote on the question, by the decision of the committee.

The joint finance committee gave a hearing yesterday to the railroad people regarding the proposed tax on the gross earnings of the roads, varying from 1 to 2 1/2 per cent. All the large railroads of the State were represented. President Elliott of the A. O. Line spoke and Col. Andrews of the Southern gave his reasons against the tax. There was much complaint that this tax was being brought forward each year, and that while efforts were being made to cut

down rates their taxes were being raised at the same time. The committee has taken the arguments under consideration.

The merchants are still putting forward their best efforts to secure the repeal of the Purchase Tax and the committee seems to be weakening under their attacks. There is talk of a license tax taking its place. It is generally called and considered an "unjust" tax, but the revenue derived from it is so tempting to throw away without something to take its place. The railroad gross income tax was supposed to supply the deficiency, but a big stir is being caused by that proposed taxation.

A small meeting was held by the Wilson Railroad Commission committee. It seems as if it was about time to close that farce. The trivial style of testimony brought forward, and the big talk of the lawyers are both tiresome. Meantime the commissioners appointed for securing fresh testimony are scouring the mountain country so that a fresh lot of rubbish will be dragged down to the capital in a few days to wrangle over.

A small but slowly increasing howl is beginning over the delay in providing a Jim Crow law. There are so many propositions on the matter that the committee has become tangled up. If something is not done this week, the question "what are you here for?" will be spoken loud enough to stir up some of the dry bones.
