HARD ON RUSSELL.

"Kicked and Cuffed by Everybody," Says Avery.

Big Demand for Appropriations for Institutions: Plenty of New Bills. The Anti-Trust Bill. Day Hangs on.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., February 11. Judge Avery and Judge Bynum concluded the Wilson hearing before the committee last night. The prominence of the attorneys and their arguments are what have kept up the interest in this case. The Senate chamber was crowded, including the galleries, until nearly 11 o'clock when Chairman Osborne announced that the committee would go over the evidence today and probably give their decision today, giving their reasons later in writing. Certainly the committee has as yet given no intimation of their probable decision, it is all guess work until it is announced. Lieut. Gov. Reynolds and Private Secretary Cade were listening so that Russell's case posted on what is said. Russell's own attorney, Judge Avery, referred to the Governor in his speech as "the man kicked and cuffed by everybody, a man without a party." The case was at the close narrowed down to the Round Knob Hotel, and upon the actions of Maj. Wilson in regard to it, the case will be decided.

There has been such a demand for appropriations for the different institutions and other needed public matters that some of the members are becoming alarmed that the much desired record in economy will not be obtained. These people are going to try to stem the tide. There are others who are willing to spend the money freely, provided not a dollar goes to any unworthy or unnecessary object. These are in the minority, however. They believe that prosperity is obtained by money spent in the right direction, such as for the Textile School, quite as readily as drawing the line close in strict economy. Such money is raised and spent at home and circulates among the people.

A large number of bills are still being introduced. A new bill was introduced in the Senate to reimburse enrolling clerk Swinson for his salary during last session when he was removed for refusing to employ negro clerks in his office, also a bill to prohibit fishing in the Neuse river with nets over 1/4 mile in length. The report of the judiciary committee in favor of the impeachment of W. L. Norwood as judge, was presented by Foushee, and was made the special order for 11 o'clock today. A resolution was

embodied in the report providing that a committee of 3 from the House impeach Norwood at the bar of the Senate of High crimes and misdemeanors, and declaring that the House would prosecute charges and that Norwood be brought before the Senate to answer the charges made. The final sense of this long discussed affair is likely to be of dramatic interest.

A bill of special interest to those along the A. & N. C. road was introduced by Boushall to authorize the board of internal improvements to sell the Atlantic and North Carolina Railway at a minimum price of not less than \$200,000, and to allow the private stockholders to come in if they desire to 25 to 30, at the same price. The bill was referred to the committee on Railroads.

The committee had amended the anti-trust bill so it did not apply to jobbers, canning, fishing or cotton mill corporations, which are not the agents of any trust. Robinson said the bill was now aimed directly at the trust and did not injure any of the mercantile or manufacturing industries of North Carolina. Williams of Iredell asked if it would interfere with the buying and selling of fertilizers. Stevens said it would depend upon whether the goods were made by a trust or not. He said it would not affect this year's sale of fertilizers, but that it prevented a combination to control prices.

On 3rd reading there was debate. McNeill asked whether section 5 of the bill did not put a premium on dishonesty. Reintree and Stevens had a colloquy as to the Virginia and Fertilizer Company. Stevens said the thing to do was for the North Carolina firms in that trust to get out of it. Patterson, of Robeson said that with section 5 in it the bill was a strong one. He denied that section encouraged dishonesty and contended that it would not encourage dishonesty. Williams offered an amendment to strike out section 5, and said in his opinion it put a premium on dishonesty. The committee on Foushee's motion had decided to strike out the section. This meaning it appears, in consideration of Stevens agreeing to certain amendments of the bill section 5 was allowed to stand. The bill went over before the final reading.

Capt. Day is holding on to the office of Superintendent with might and main. His attorneys present the following as their opinion. It is picturesque: "In the matter of contest over the penitentiary our opinion is that Capt. Day, superintendent of the penitentiary should offer no resistance to the entering of the newly appointed directors upon the premises or to their organization with the present directors of the penitentiary board, but he should say to them: 'Gentlemen, I have been appointed superintendent of the North Carolina penitentiary by the Governor of the State. I have given bond and have in my possession as superintendent property for which I am responsible. I do not recognize the constitutionality of that part of the recent act of the Assembly which abolishes the office of superintendent and attempts to authorize you to take charge of the property now in my hands. I decline, therefore, to surrender the same into your custody and shall continue to exercise the duties of the office of superintendent of the penitentiary until the question is settled by judgment of court.' Our advice to Capt. Day is to offer any facility for the settlement of the question in the courts by controversy without action or otherwise." Suit will be begun by the new Board at once to oust Day.

Mr. Winston introduced a bill today for the Department of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. The bill provides for a Board of Trustees which will have charge of the Department of Agriculture and also of the College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. All powers now conferred by law on the Board of Agriculture and on the trustees of the A. and M. College are conferred on this new board.

This bill provides for nine directors—one from each congressional district, practical farmers, who shall select officers and agents for the work of the Department of Agriculture. The purpose of the bill is to thoroughly reorganize the A. and M. College.

The "North Carolina Bar Association" was formed last night. The meeting was in the Supreme Court room and the lawyers present were from all parts of the State. Prof. J. Crawford Biggs called the meeting to order and J. B. Bachelor was made temporary chairman. Platt D. Walker of Charlotte was elected President of the Association and a vice-president was selected from each of the twelve judicial districts. The by-laws will not be formally adopted until the first annual meeting next summer.

There is a case of smallpox in Raleigh. The man came here a few days ago from near Tarboro and was taken sick. The most stringent regulations were promptly adopted to isolate the case. Some of the Legislators became worried over the matter. Patterson in the House said he favored adjourning today until fall and would advocate doing so if anyone would back him up. It is not likely that any panic will be created by one case of the disease.

The substitute bill on separate cars for the roads was drafted late yesterday. It is probably as good as can be obtained. It is the consolidation of many bills and opinions and will likely become the law without further change. It is not long and is as follows:

That all railroad companies engaged in common carriers in the transportation within the limits of the State of

North Carolina of passengers for hire other than street railways, shall provide separate but equal accommodations on their passenger trains for the white and colored races. Such railroad companies shall provide one coach for first-class passengers of the white race and one coach for first-class passengers of the colored race, and one coach which shall be divided by a partition, and one part assigned to second-class passengers of the white race and the other assigned to second-class passengers of the colored race.

It shall be the duty of such companies to place said second class car between the two first-class cars, with the second-class compartment for the white race next to the first-class coach for the white race. Provided, that the conductor of any train shall have power in case there is an excess of passengers of either race, that no coach be foreseen to assign. This section not completed.

Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall apply to freight trains with passenger car attached and relief trains operated in case of accident, and Pullman cars, and through express trains that do not usually stop at all stations, and negro servants traveling in attendance upon their employers, and officers of guards transporting prisoners, nor to prisoners being so transported.

The railway commission shall have discretion as to exempting the provisions of this act from railways whose gross earnings do not exceed \$2,000 per mile. The failure of a conductor to carry out the provisions of this act shall be a misdemeanor punishable within the discretion of the court.

MAJOR WILSON CLEARED.
Judge Norwood to be Impeached. Money Happily Cut Off from Old Penitentiary Board.

Special to Journal. HALTOM, Feb'y 11—The decision of the Wilson case was unanimously in favor of Major Wilson.

The House debated three hours over the impeachment matter of Judge Norwood, and finally voted in favor of impeachment by a vote of 61 to 31.

Speaker Connor named a committee of Allen, Craig and Foushee to present the articles of impeachment at the Bar. The Senate bill was introduced in the House, which is intended to cut off all money from the old Penitentiary Board and thus cause the Board and Superintendent Day to surrender.
