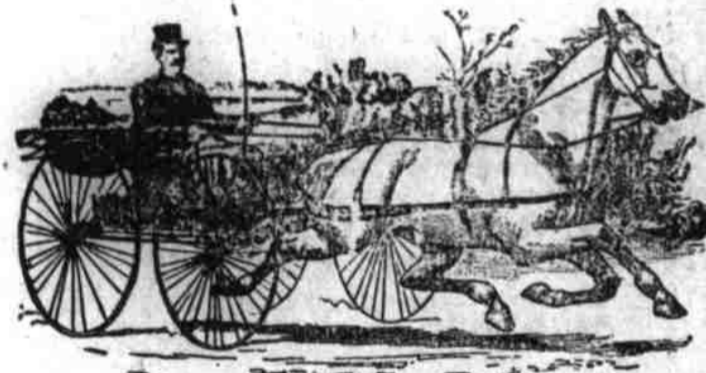

### THE DISPENSARY LAW.

A Great Issue to Legislators. How it is Working.

Raleigh, Feb. 20.

There is something going on in this State, that except in those localities immediately affected, is not attracting much attention. This is the spread of the dispensary law, fashioned much like the one in force in South Carolina where it is a main law. Here it is a local measure, confined to the counties interested. But the number of these counties has greatly increased by the applications to the Legislature. Some of the laws have passed. Others such as Charlotte are being argued before the committee and later will be before the Assembly.

In their main features the dispensary laws are much alike. The prohibition people generally favor them. They think many of them, that it is "the solution of the liquor question". On the other side are many equally as good people who are fighting the bills from disinterested motives. Huge petitions are brought to the Capital, containing thousands of names, for or against the dispensary, and delegations come by the car load to influence the passage of the law.

The dispensary law just passed for Smithfield, Johnston county, can be taken as an example of these laws. Many people do not know the features of this law and may be interested in the main facts. It provides in the first place that it shall be unlawful for anyone to sell liquor of any kind in the county except by the dispensary. Three commissioners are appointed for the dispensary by the law for the town of Smithfield. They hold their offices for one, two and three years and nominate their successors who however must be approved by the town commissioners.

The dispensary commissioners are required to furnish a suitable place for the sale of spirits, vinous, malt and other liquors, not within 300 feet of any church.

The commissioners choose a manager for the dispensary who must give a bond for \$500. His pay is fixed by the commissioners, not to exceed \$50 per month. It is the duty of the manager to keep a register in which shall be kept a record of the names of persons to whom any liquors are sold, the quantity, price and date of sale. His books and records are open at all times to the inspection of citizens and officers of the law.

The quantity of liquor to be sold to any one person is to be determined by the commissioners, but in no case shall wine or liquor be sold in quantity less than one half pint, and none shall be drunk in the building or on the premises. The dispensary shall open at sunrise and close at sunset.

The price of liquors shall be fixed by the commissioners and "shall not be sold at a profit exceeding 80 per centum above the actual cost." No "broken packages" shall be kept in the Dispensary.

An analysis of the liquor on hand shall be made from time to time and any condemned as impure shall not be sold, and payment refused to the parties purchased from, no liquor shall be sold to any one for the selling agent, or they will be guilty of a misdemeanor.

The board of commissioners of the town shall appropriate a sufficient sum of money from the town treasury to establish the Dispensary, which amount shall be repaid by the profits arising from sales, and thereafter the Dispensary shall be supported by profits from the sales.

The Dispensary commissioners shall pay the regular license to the sheriff of the county. The commissioners shall be paid for their services the sum of \$25 per annum.

Every six months the profits of the Dispensary shall be divided, one half going to the town treasurer. The part going to the town treasurer shall go for the improvement of the town, the part going to the county shall be placed to the credit of the school fund and applied to the support of the free public schools in the districts in which the town is situated.

Such in brief are the main points of the Dispensary Law. From the provisions of the law it can be easily seen that there is room for a difference of opinion. No other questions before the legislature have excited more heated talk, or greater efforts for and against. Fayetteville has had the law and made a great effort to have it repealed but without avail. The opponents of repeal refused to allow it to be voted on again by the people, and fought it out on that line and succeeded.

Charlotte is now in the midst of the agony and there are others, many of these.

### LONG DISCUSSIONS

On Ryvane and Jim Crow Car Bills Very Probable.

Two Great Days in Legislature. Insurance Gets Along Slowly. A Hit at Organized Labor. No Repudiation.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., February 20.

The great days of the present Legislature were last Friday and Saturday, when the constitutional amendment was passed in the House and Senate by more than the necessary two fifths vote. It is not likely that such a scene will be enacted again this session and perhaps not for years to come.

When the time came to vote on the amendment in the Senate Saturday, it found the chamber crowded with spectators. It was necessary to refuse further admission on the floor. Every seat in the gallery was occupied by ladies and many besides were standing up. In the part reserved for the colored race were probably a dozen spectators of the eventful scene.

Nearly all the Senators were in their seats. Glenn, Osborne, Skinner, Justice, Bryan and other leaders were awaiting the casting of the vote, not anxious for its safe carrying, but anxious to have the important question disposed of. Representative Rountree who had helped so greatly in the House, was seated near to Senator Glenn, and other Representatives gathered around.

Each Senator was handed a printed copy of the bill. The first point of interest was when Goodwin, Populist, offered an amendment to the bill, that all persons who were disfranchised upon the adoption of the amendment should be exempt from all military and other duties and from paying a poll tax. "This was promptly voted down, 43 to 6 on a roll call. Then the amendment bill itself came up. Those intending to vote against the bill gave notice that they would explain their vote when their names were called. Several for the bill also did the same.

In the House, speeches during the roll call were limited to one minute and time was promptly called by the Speaker or some member. In the Senate there was no limit and some of the speeches were too long. Especially so that of the negro Senator Fuller from Warren. He received great attention, but there was too much quotation from books, poetry, etc., to be appropriate and his plain talk was wide of the mark. Senators Travis and Fields, Democrats, made speeches, but the outbreak that aroused the audience until cheers rang through the Chamber was from Senator Glenn. Crisp Republican, interrupted him with questions, until thoroughly aroused, his face flushed, his words echoed through the Hall, "I thank God who has enabled me to be here to record my vote in favor of the grand old Anglo-Saxon race, the virtue and welfare of the white women of the State. It is the proudest moment of my life."

The final vote on the third reading was 43 to 6 and by that record of 7 to 1, the amendment goes to the decision of the people in 1900.

A contest is taking place in the Senate over Madison county bonds. A bill is before the Legislature to validate the bonds. They were issued in 1889 to pay county debts and to build bridges, etc., and amounted to \$21,000. There was some irregularity in the passage and there is an attempt to throw them over. It is claimed that the bonds were sold at a big discount to speculators. The committee reported unfavorably on the bill, but there was a minority report with Osborne, Skinner, Daniels and Glenn signing it, and these are among the weightiest men in the Senate, hence the sharp fight over the bill. The amendment question came up and caused the matter to be postponed. There is much interest in the question, for this Legislature is clearly against repudiation in any form.

The insurance bill is having a hard road to travel and was made a special order for Thursday at noon.

The revenue bill, naturally of leading importance will be considered in a committee of the whole on Tuesday. There is no telling how long the discussion on this bill may last, perhaps all the week and it may crowd to the wall both the insurance and the separate cars bills. The "Jim Crow" bill is such a weakling that it mustn't be crowded too hard or it will be smothered. Enquiries in regard to "Jim Crow" bring the reply that it will surely be treated fairly.

Trailing behind the Revenue bill is the Machinery bill which may make the Revenue bill operative. The Finance Committee is nursing these lusty infants and they are being fed on strong food. The "local option bill" which provides for elections on liquor questions to be held in "off" years had a bad fall. It was amended to death and was only saved from being finally withdrawn by

being referred back to the committee. The report of the committee on public printing also got hit very hard. It was finally voted to let the printing to the lowest bidder in the State. There is a great howl raised at this by "organized labor" and it may block the matter in the Senate. It will take the printing away from the "unions" and allow the work to be done by the so called "scabs" it is claimed that organized labor of all kinds will protest, as it is this class in the cities that has always stayed close to the Democratic party and they will regard it as a slap at them, only 18 votes were cast in favor of "labor". Among those against was the author of the anti-trust bill and he opposed limiting the work to be done in North Carolina, and got off the following, which means nothing, "I believe unorganized labor needs protection more than organized labor."

The bill for graded school at New Bern was reported favorably. The bill "for the government of Beaufort, Carteret county, was ordered enrolled. This bill provides for the election of commissioners and other matters at the next election. Wards one and two each elect two commissioners, wards three, four and five elect one commissioner each, and wards one and two elect one commissioner at large. It also provides that registrars and poll holders "must be able to read and write", and everybody is to vote at the Town Hall.

There is a suggestion made that bonds be issued to pay the penitentiary debt of \$110,000, buy two of the State farms for \$77,000 and have enough besides to provide for work on the farms the coming year. The bonds in amount are to be \$250,000, to cover the different needs.

Speaker Connor has been presented with a handsome gold pen holder and pen from Scotland county, and promises to have it handy to sign the bill when it reaches him creating the new county.

A dispensary bill passed for Clayton, Johnston county. Charlotte people are watching their dispensary law bill. It passed the House unanimously and now comes before the Senate. It is for all of Mecklenburg county.

Twenty six new bills were introduced in the House on Saturday.
