**TWO SESSIONS DAILY.**

Edits Flying Through Both Houses.

Typing Railroads. No Negro Justices of Peace. Populists Get Public Printing. Oyster Claims Cases Allowed.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., February 28.

Bills are going through the Legislature like they were on a toboggan slide. Two sessions of the House and Senate each day is going a long way towards clearing the calendar and leaving time for the discussion of the troublesome affairs yet to be decided on.

Seventy bills have been passed by the Legislature yesterday by being ratified and so many today. The number of new industrial corporations, banks, mills, etc., being chartered is gratifying. These all require \$50 to be paid into the State treasury and the revenues is considerable.

In spite of the hopes of the best informed members of the House, the Overman resolution was defeated by a close vote of 45 to 50, when the revenue bill came up. Therefore the double tax on railroads embodied in the bill stands so far as the House is concerned for the revenue bill this passed its third reading, several members saying they voted for the bill under protest. The resolution voted down by which the graduated tax on the gross income of the railroads was left in the bill was as follows: It didn't suit the extremists.

"That for the purpose of raising revenue and equalizing taxation the railway commission or any other body succeeding to its powers is hereby required to and directed as soon as practicable, and in time for the levy of 1899, to raise the assessments for taxation of the entire railway property of the State and in doing so it should take into consideration the value of the franchise, the gross earnings and net income of each road. That said assessments that so increase the assessments when such increase is justified as will make each part and parcel of railway property bear its fair proportion of the burdens of taxation."

When the Senate takes hold of the bill, there is going to be something said about this matter.

During the consideration of the bill Nicholson offered an amendment to put building and loan associations on the same footing as individuals in the matter of taxation on mortgages.

Stevens of the anti-trust bill offered an amendment, which was voted down amid great laughter, and which got only his vote. Its text was as follows: "That the railway commission is hereby directed to so raise the valuation of railway property in this State that the additional taxes paid by said railroads in the future shall not be less annually than \$60,000 in excess of the amount received from the same source in 1898."

Russell made a motion to recall the bill ordered enrolled in regard to fishing with Dutch nets in Neuse river, saying it was unjust to the people of Carteret county. The motion prevailed. This bill has twice passed and each time has been recalled and each time would have been a law within an hour but for its recall.

Under a suspension of the rules in the House, the Senate bill appropriating \$5,000 for use by the new executive board in making the immediate necessary incidental expenses of the State's prison was passed. The Republicans voted against the bill.

The insurance bill was made a special order for today.

As a special order the House took up the bill to appoint for a term of 6 years justices of the peace in various townships in the State. The list is of great length.

Noble in charge of the bill, said there was no negro among the appointees this being in reply to an inquiry made. The bill passed its several readings, the Republicans all voting no which was greeted with laughter by the Democrats.

A bill also passed to change the mode of selecting justices of the peace lists number of counties, returning to the old system, by which the legislature appoints the justices and the latter elect the county commissioners. It applies to Washington, Granville, Vance, Warren, Forsyth, Caswell, Pasquotank, Harnett, Edgecombe, Chowan, Montgomery and Bertie. Another bill along the same line then passed. It is for the further appointment of additional justices in Granville, Washington, Caswell, Warren and Vance counties. The names of the persons appointed are named in this bill.

In the Senate, Senator Jerome, by leave, introduced a bill to provide \$5,000 for the immediate and incidental expenses of the State prison, which he asked to be put upon its immediate passage. He explained that the State prison was without funds, and was even unable to raise sufficient money to pay for the expenses of the removal of escaped convicts, some of whom were in Washington City. It passed both readings.

The bill to reduce the salaries of State officials came up and Senator Franks offered the following substitute: "Resolved, That the State of North Carolina go into bankruptcy." This caused some amusement and soon motion the bill

was referred to the committee on salaries and fees.

"Jim Crow" will be in all its glory tonight in the Senate. Separate cars seem to be a long time coming just what the result will be when the bill is seized upon by the Senators is uncertain. Senator Ward has a stuffed cloth for what he dislikes in the proposed law passed by the House and wants a law that will accomplish the business.

The caucus last night decided to take up the Wilson matter in joint session at 4 o'clock this afternoon and to nominate three Railroad Commissioners, an insurance and a labor commissioner. It also decided to leave the public printing to the committee to decide on.

The public printing caused quite a sensation yesterday. The committee some days ago reported in favor of having a State printer, but the committee was turned down hard and their report picked all to pieces. The work was decided to be given to the lowest bidder. This was considered by many a severe blow at organized labor and bad politics. However when the bids were opened it was found that Barnes Bros. were the lowest.

This firm are Populists and a great hue and cry was raised at the Democratic legislature letting out the printing to Populists. The committee that had been treated so unceremoniously smiled at the outcome. It was fun for them. The whole thing will not be left to the committee again by the caucus decision.

It is about decided that there will be change in the school books used. The report of the committee was adopted.

The oyster claim bill, to pay some \$2,000 for clerk's fees in the Pamlico oyster cases came up in the House. Roundtree offered a substitute, which provides that Thomas Cowper be paid \$254; that the speaker of the House and the chairman of the finance committee appoint commissioners to see what is due Festus Miller, clerk of Pamlico court on such oyster claims the Governor to pay expenses of counsel to represent the State.

Justice said the committee had devoted 30 hours to the matter and had decided that these oyster claims should be reduced from \$1,950 to \$1,950; that some of the summonses had been written out and never served.

Allen of Wayne, said that he had stated to the Superior Court that if there was any claim of fraud that part of the money would not be taken. He said there was no question that the clerk had issued all the summonses; that perhaps the sheriff had not served them all. He said the matter ought to be looked into; that the State Treasurer had been sued for libel and the State had sent two lawyers to Pamlico mainly to get up evidence to sustain the treasurer in his libel suit. He said there was only the unsupported statements of these lawyers as to one side of the case, and that they had been paid \$1,600 while one of them had not even appeared in the Superior Court in the case, but was in Washington, D. C. when the matter came up.

Council said that the clerk of Pamlico was entitled to fees in contingencies in only 13 of the 603 cases, and 253 cases docketed.

Winston said the clerk of Pamlico has a \$3,800 judgment against the State and that the committee cuts this down to \$1,450.

Justice said the court had never passed upon the question whether the summonses had been issued or not.

Winston urged the reference to the commission.

The vote was taken. The substitute was lost 15 to 48.

Then the bill was taken up, to pay to Mollie A. Miller, executrix of Thomas Cowper \$1,450 and Thomas A. Cowper \$254, in the same cases. This passed its readings. The next bill was for oyster claims of L. A. Garner, for fees in Carteret \$324. It passed.
