In a New Field.
The many friends of Rev. John Stanly Thomas in this city, will be greatly interested in learning of his new change of field work, it being the Evangelistic work connected with St. Andrew's Presbyterian church of Wilmington.

In connection with this change, the following of Rev. Mr. Thomas, from the Wilmington Star, of March 1st, will be of interest.

"St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, under the leadership of their beloved pastor, Rev. A. D. McClure, has taken another decided step forward in church work by the inauguration of a home missionary work, having just employed a church missionary who will devote all his time to the work in New Hanover and Onslow counties, preaching at mission points and visiting the people in their homes. He will have regular appointments for the present at the school house on Mr. Oscar Penning's farm at Middle Sound and at the County Home.

Rev. Jno. Stanly Thomas is a son of the late Judge Thomas, who was for many years in public life, serving as Secretary of State during Vance's term as war governor and subsequently as Judge of Superior Court, president of the A. & N. C. railroad and as a member of Congress. He is a brother of Hon. Charles H. Thomas, member elect of Congress from the Third district.

Rev. Mr. Thomas attended the State University, matriculated at Princeton Theological Seminary, was a student of McCormick Theological Seminary and the Moody Bible Institute. He served with especial credit, a term as Secretary of Washington Heights Branch of the Y. M. C. A., was supply at the Park Ridge Congregational Church, Chicago.

In October, 1897, at Littleton, he was licensed to preach by Albemarle Presbytery, and became pastor of several churches in Pender county. These churches are now out of debt, and the attendance largely increased. A new church has been built.
At Burgaw, in April of last year, he was ordained to the full work of the ministry."

Large Crop Irish Potatoes Planted. Health Community Improving. **February 28.**

The weather has gotten the farmers very much behind in their farm work. We learn that our farmers will plant large crops of Irish potatoes this season. The merchants here are concluding receiving and adding new goods in their stores.

All the dwelling houses in Trenton are now occupied, while several have two families. Why not build more houses, plenty of vacant lots. A gentleman was here last week to rent a house and could not get one.

Mr. J. P. Brogden who has been critically ill with gripe and pneumonia for the last four weeks is much better and his many friends entertain the hope that he will soon be out and well again.

There was but a small attendance from this vicinity to New Bern Fair as many families had some member sick with measles and la grippe, but as measles is getting somewhat scarce the measles are now nearly stamped out.

Mr. D. C. Johnston has opened a new store here of dry goods and groceries. What has become of the New river oyster carts, we have not had a visit from them for the last few days.

We are inclined to believe that the morals of our community are improving, as we have not seen a man, white or colored, visitor or citizen, drunk for the last fifteen days.

The last snow caught many of our citizens without any wood and as experience is said to be a dear school many are replenishing their piles with many loads of good wood.

The farmers have commenced every fair day to haul commercial fertilizers, many who last year said no fertilizers next year are now hauling it to plant cotton, tobacco and truck.

We notice that many gardens with collards are nearly all killed where they had been turned down and the stalk buried they are hurt but little. Will you people strive all summer to raise collards and let the cold destroy them when by a little attention they could be saved.

Miss Sue May Kinsey who is teaching school at Tuckahoe spent Sunday in Trenton.

Growing Cost.
How shall the farmer grow cotton for the year 1899? Shall it be by the intensive system of farming or shall it be by the large acreage, and if by the large acreage system will he or can he grow cotton at a profit or at a loss? Every farmer is now talking hard times and declaring that he can't grow cotton at 40 and 50 per pound, and that next season will find their barns and smokehouses well filled, and less cotton will be the go certain.

A wise plan this will be, and glory to our land and country if carried out. To grow cotton now at a profit the farmer must adopt the intensive method of farming, such as making two and three bales of cotton per acre and making grain on this, their lands, because it does not take as much work for grain as it does for cotton. To make two or three bales of cotton per acre the farmer must plow deep in the preparation of land, concentrate manures; good culture and improvement of seeds and implements must not be ignored.
What a pleasure it would be to a farmer, in looking out over his fields of cotton, planted in some heavy fruiting varieties of cotton, that kind of the prolific store that will fruit from the ground up to the top, and knowing that with good seasons he would, under the intensive system of farming, gather two and three bales of cotton from every acre. This would be called good farming and profitable.—B. W. Hawkins, in Cotton Planter's Journal.

The New Bern Academy.

In your issue of January 20th last I printed a valuable and very interesting sketch of our schools in Craven county, written by Prof. Kemp P. Battle of the University at Chapel Hill. It includes an account of the New Bern Academy, an institution so conspicuous in, and identified with, the history of our city and indeed, with the legislation of our early Colonial days. Dr. Battle, however, omits the names of some of the prominent instructors in that ancient seat of learning—at least they do not appear in the extract published by you—and to add to the list it may be well to prefix them too.

Alonso Attmore taught for many years in the academy. His school was conducted on what was called the "Lancasterian" plan, one effect, at least, of which was to make his pupils very accurate in spelling, as some of them, still living in New Bern, can testify. Mr. Attmore had great faith in the text: "He that spareth his rod hateth his son; but he that loveth him chasteneth him with stripes," and lived fully up to it; and of this fact, too, possible some of the said pupils may also have a lively remembrance. There were no extras in the school, it is thought, but it was said of it that "hogging was gratis and regular."

Mr. Attmore was an uncle of our neighbor, Dr. George Attmore of Pamlico county.

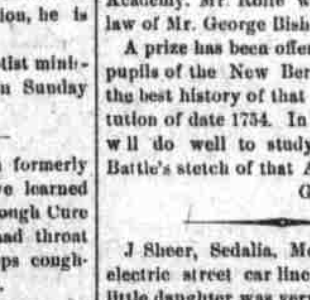
Mr. Attmore was succeeded, in the forties, by the Rev. William N. Hawks as principal, with, at different times, Rev. Fonzyce M. Hubbard and Stephen E. Brewwell as assistants. Mrs. Wallace conducted the primary department, and her daughter, Miss Mary Wallace, the school for girls. Rev. Wm. N. Hawks was a brother of Rev. Dr. Francis L. Hawks, the historian, both natives of New Bern. Mr. Hawks for many years was the rector of Christ Church in this city. Afterwards he settled in Columbus, Georgia, where he died. Like Mr. Attmore he was a firm believer in the efficacy of corporal punishment, as this writer has cause to recollect. His grandfather, John Hawks, was the architect of Governor Tryon's "Palace," having come from England to superintend that work. Later John Hawks was Secretary of the Colonial Assembly. Francis Hawks, son of John and father of Rev. Wm. N. Hawks, was Collector at the port of New Bern, an appointee of President John Adams, and successor of Major John Daves.

Rev. Fonzyce M. Hubbard and Stephen E. Brewwell were of northern birth. Dr. Hubbard was also rector for a long time of Christ Church, was afterwards Professor of Ancient Languages in the University at Chapel Hill. He died a few years ago in Raleigh.

In later days a Dr. Sicker, and Mr. A. F. Neville Rolfe, were teachers at the Academy. Mr. Rolfe was a brother-in-law of Mr. George Bishop of our city. A prize has been offered to the present pupils of the New Bern Academy for the best history of that venerable institution of date 1734. In preparation they will do well to study carefully Prof. Battle's sketch of that Academy.
