**WALK YOUR AVERNAGE!**  
An Act to prevent fast driving and driving across the public bridges in Craven County.  
The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:  
Section 1. That any person or persons who shall ride or drive, any horses, mules or other animals, over the public bridges of Craven county, faster than a walk, or who shall ride a bicycle over said bridges at a speed greater than five miles per hour shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars, or imprisoned not more than thirty days, in the discretion of the court.

**WALK YOUR AVERNAGE!**  
An Act to prevent fast driving and driving across the public bridges in Craven County.  
The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:  
Section 1. That any person or persons who shall ride or drive, any horses, mules or other animals, over the public bridges of Craven county, faster than a walk, or who shall ride a bicycle over said bridges at a speed greater than five miles per hour shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars, or imprisoned not more than thirty days, in the discretion of the court.

**Section 2.** That the Board of Commissioners of Craven County shall keep posted at each end of the bridges built by the county across the Neuse and Trent rivers at New Bern a notice in large letters embodying the substance of this act.

**Section 3.** That it shall be the duty of the keeper of any of said bridges to report at once to the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners any violations of this act which may come under his observation, and the said chairman shall lay said complaint before the Board of Commissioners at its next ensuing meeting, for such action as said Board may deem necessary to enforce this act.

**Section 4.** That if any of said keepers of said bridges shall fail to report any violations of this act they shall forfeit their positions as keepers and the chairman of the Board of Commissioners of said county shall at once appoint their successors to hold the position until the next meeting of the Board of Commissioners at which time said Board shall hear and determine the matter and either restate said keeper or select others.

**Section 5.** That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.  
In the General Assembly of North Carolina read three times and ratified this 5th day of March, A. D. 1899.
