THE ATLANTIC HOTEL. Improvement, Done by the New York and New Jersey. For This Season. The Atlantic Hotel was incorporated yesterday with a capital stock of \$45,000, and E. B. Barbee, Charles H. Barber, Ed. Chambers, Smith, John Gatling and Frank Simmons as incorporators.

Mr. C. H. Barbee is president and Mr. John Gatling secretary and treasurer. The incorporators are the directors.

Mr. Barbee said to The Post yesterday that the prospects for the most successful season ever known, at the hotel were very bright. That Mr. O. H. Foster, who has leased the hotel for the season is very popular with guests, and that he is now having the entire hotel property thoroughly overhauled. Everything that will add to the convenience of guests is being looked after.

The hotel has been thoroughly fitted out with handsome Welsbach lights, and arrangements are now being made to put in hot and cold water baths, so that they will be available on every floor. Everything that will add to the convenience of guests is being looked after.

Already more rooms have been engaged for the coming season than has been booked before up to the first of June.

INFORMATION FOR REGISTRARS. Concerning City Election on First Tuesday in May, 1899.

For the new registration the registration books shall be opened at some convenient place in the Ward, and the registrar of the Ward shall give ten days notice prior to opening the books of the time and place of registration.

The registration books shall be opened on the second Monday before the first Tuesday in May, 1899, and shall be kept open from and including the second Monday preceding the first Tuesday in May, 1899, to and including the following Saturday between the hours of eight o'clock a. m. and six o'clock p. m. each day.

All vacancies caused by registrar failing or refusing to act shall be filled by the other registrar. If any person appointed a poll holder shall fail to act the registrar for the Ward shall fill the vacancy by appointing another person.

Registrars before entering on their duties shall qualify before a Justice of the Peace or other officers qualified to administer oaths by taking the oath prescribed for Registrars for the City of New Bern.

Registrars before registering a voter shall administer the prescribed oath to the voter.

The registrars and poll holders shall meet at the polling places in their respective wards on the Monday preceding the election to hear and determine challenges.

The party challenged must be notified in writing. This notice may be served by any one.
