Memorial Day.

The following is the order of exercises to be observed on Wednesday next, Memorial Day, May 10, 1899.

At 10 o'clock the members of the Confederacy, New Bern Chapter.

All persons desiring to render a tribute to the memory of the Confederate dead are cordially invited to participate at the Academy Ground at 10:30 a.m. where a procession will be formed under the direction of the Chief Marshal, S. R. Ball, as follows:

1. New Bern City Band.

2. Chief Marshal, S. R. Ball.

3. Confederate Veterans, New Bern Camp No. 1162, soldiers and sailors.

4. Chaplain, Rev. T. M. H. George, and Reader, Rev. G. L. LeBaron, D. D.

5. Matt Manly, C. V., and all ex-chaplains and speakers.

6. Naval Reserves as escort.

7. Daughters of the Confederacy.

8. State and City officials.

9. Citizens generally, children with flowers, etc.

The procession will move promptly at 5 o'clock to Cedar Grove Cemetery, whereupon arrival it will halt and open ranks, allowing the Daughters of the Confederacy to pass first to the Confederate Monument, the other divisions following in order as above.

The ceremonies observed will be as follows:

1. Prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. T. M. H. George.

2. Music by the Choir, "The Guard Around the Tomb."

3. Reading of original poems by Rev. G. L. LeBaron, D. D.

4. Music by the choir, "Auld Lang Syne."

5. Reading letters from Gen. J. H. Gordon and Adj. Gen. G. M. Thomas by Matt M. Manly, C. V., New Bern Camp No. 1162.

6. Music by the choir, "Tenting To-night."

7. Roll of Honor read by S. R. Ball, Chief Marshal.

8. Benediction by Chaplain, followed by decoration of all graves of Confederate soldiers.

Citizens and all organizations on arrival at Academy Ground will please report to Chief Marshal (S. R. Ball) for proper positions and all Daughters of the Confederacy and Confederate Veterans are earnestly requested to wear their badges.
