And Now Favor Supporting Constitutional Amendment.

Raleigh, May 6.—The three day session here of the North Carolina Dental Association has ended. It was well attended, 75 members being present. Twenty nine wrote that they did not come because they feared the smallpox.

The association elected the following officers: President, O. A. Livermore, of Scotland Neck; Vice presidents E. J. Tucker, W. D. Ramsey; secretary, J. S. Spurgeon, of Hillsboro; treasurer, D. L. James, examining board to fill vacancies, Thom M. Hunter, S. B. Hilliard; essayist, Frank S. Harris; delegates to national association at Niagara Falls, C. A. Rominger, C. W. Banner, F. S. Harris, H. D. Harper, C. A. Livermore, H. T. Tucker, A. L. Ramsey, J. B. Little, S. B. Hilliard. The State Association meets next May at Greensboro.

There will be a strong movement in a few days for a sale of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railway to a company which will continue its southward from Goldsboro. The State owns three fourths of the road. An effort to get a sale made by the Legislature failed. There will very probably not be much less opposition to the plan.

The republicans are now "changing their vote" on the Constitutional amendment question. Their leaders, and particularly Senator Pritchard, are telling them they must now recant. One of them says that he would withdraw his declaration of support for the amendment, but yet held the view that the elimination of the negro vote was the only salvation of the republican party in North Carolina.

There are to day 41 cases of smallpox in the negro pest house here and 106 negro suspects. There are declared to be only two white cases. A physician and three nurses are in charge of the negroes. The contents of 11 negro houses in the city have been burned and the houses fumigated. It is declared, however, that only by burning the infected houses can the disease be stamped out. The rate of increase seems now to be about two to three cases daily. None of the white cases are in the city or have they been here. The negroes spread the contagion.

The Governor was notified of the capture of the negro who two weeks ago murdered a young white man named Turnage in Pitt county in a store at night and then robbed and burned the store. The pursuit has been incessant.

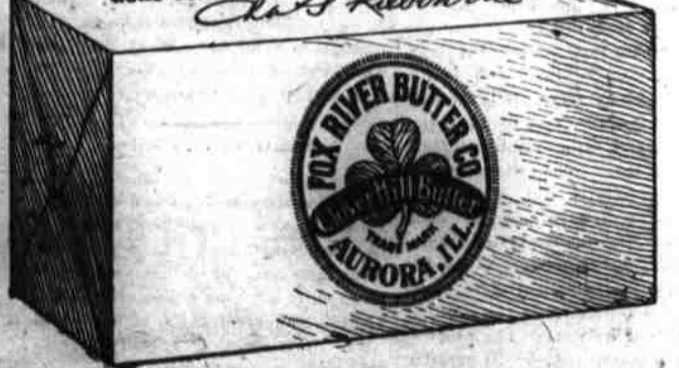
