ITINGTON, N. C., May 9.—The rapid fire Nordenfiet gun, taken from the Spanish cruiser Maria Christina at Manila and presented to this city by the officers and crew of the cruiser Raleigh, was placed on view here in a store window and thousands of people looked at it. A committee of the aldermen has been appointed to select a proper location for it.

Next month the United States fish commission will begin the maintenance of a laboratory at Beaufort for the study of fishes and marine zoology. It is a fact well known to the government that at no point on the coast is there such a variety of fish. The water is also very pure. It was used by the government at the World's Fair, and at the Atlanta, Nashville and Omaha Expositions. The laboratory will be open June 1 to October 1, Professor Wilson, of the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, will be in charge.

Fire at Plymouth Sunday night destroyed the Latham Hotel and nearly all its contents.

The Raleigh Camp of Confederate Veterans urges Julian S. Carr, of Durham, as major general of the North Carolina Division, United Confederate Veterans.

New fire escapes, of steel, are being put in at the Latham any day here.

One Wake county farmer, who lives six miles from here, will this season ship over 100 carloads of watermelons. Last season he shipped fifty carloads. There are other grounds in that section and about 500 acres are in melons.
