MORE COMPANIES LEAVE.

Will Represent Big Revenue Loss to State.

The Counterfeiters Case. Bell Telephone Case. Lumber Lands Bought. Purchases for Regiment Encampment. Truck Items.

RALPH, N. C., May 25.—The secret service people appear to have made some interesting discoveries in connection with the counterfeiters under arrest at Wilmington. The bond of one counterfeiter was fixed at \$2,000, but it is now increased to \$5,000. This is because of the discovery, it is claimed, of a plan to raise the first amount and let the prisoner jump the bail. It is further asserted that some other people of rather more importance were associated with the counterfeiter in his work and plans.

The State has granted a charter to the Salisbury Light, Heat and Power Company, capital \$10,000.

The corporation commission's hearing was mainly devoted to the exceptions of the Bell Telephone Company to the commission's order reducing rentals of phones. It was contended by the company that the act creating the commission does not give any power over telephone rates, and also that the law provides no means of appeal from decisions of the commission so far as telephone companies are concerned. The latter statement is correct. By the careless drawing of a section of the law the power of appeal appears to be left only to railroads.

The Branning Lumber Company has bought from the State 10,000 acres of land for the timber, the price being 50 cents an acre. It is what is known as swamp land, but is heavily timbered with cypress. Last year the company bought 80,000 acres.

It is said that the strawberry growers, by reason of the quick slump in prices, have in many cases lost heavily, and it is certain that they are disgusted with the low prices. As a result a great many of them in Duplin and Pender counties are plowing up their strawberry beds and planting cotton.

The prospect for a fine Irish potato crop is excellent. The acreage is large. One syndicate of farmers in Camden county is said to have 2,000 acres in potatoes.

It is learned that the Atlantic Life Insurance Company will withdraw from North Carolina on account of the Craig law, just as such great companies as Mutual Reserve Fund, the Connecticut Mutual and the Mutual Benefit have already done. State Agent John C. Drewery, of the Mutual Benefit, goes to Richmond to establish an agency there. Twenty years ago the Mutual Benefit withdrew from that State because of unfriendly legislation, and more than 100 business men of Virginia have since been to Newark to induce the company to re-establish the agency. Now the unfriendly legislation is repealed, while North Carolina has enacted very unfriendly legislation.

The Prudential Life Insurance Company has given notice that it will withdraw from this State. Here is another result of the Craig bill. It is an object lesson, that a Legislature which is enacting a law about something about which it knows nothing ought always to listen with heed to men in that particular line.

Corporations will not be fooled with. To them North Carolina is but a part of a great country, and they will not stand unfriendly legislation. John C. Drewery is well known in North Carolina as a conservative man, and he says: "I will not be the least surprised to see all the life companies withdraw from North Carolina by June 1st. The promoters of the Craig bill threw a brick at the Southern Railway, but hit other people. The result is going to be a big loss of revenue to North Carolina and a loss besides of business men and business interests. The insurance companies yield the State a revenue of \$120,000 a year."

A denial comes from Granville that there was ever real danger of the lynching of Joyner and Langley, the negroes who were brought here for safe keeping. There was talk of lynching. The officer who brought the men here considered the danger grave.

A suspected case of smallpox is quarantined at Hickory, and the State smallpox inspector has gone there.

Colonel Wharton Green of Fayetteville, will deliver here next Monday an address on the life and character and public services of General Robert Ransom.

The Penitentiary Board calls on the State Treasurer for the issue of the \$90,000 of bonds for the purchase of farms. One farm will be on the Roanoke river and another near Wadesboro.

It has cost nearly \$5,000 to meet the

For the posthouses, \$1,500, \$1,000 for vaccination.

The State has bought from a Toledo firm one hospital, 25 wall and 216 common tents, costing \$2,212, this being testage for a regiment. The encampment will be at Morehead City, probably from July 10th to 20th. Seven Buzzsaw field ovens are also ordered. Requisition is made on the government for 300 complete uniforms and for 200 rifles and sets of equipments.

Thomas L. Snyder, of Swain county, who was in the Twenty-fifth Regiment, North Carolina State Troops, died at the Soldiers' Home and was buried in the Confederate Cemetery. A veteran named Oathin is very sick at the home.

NEGROES MUST GO.

As Organized Band in Griffin, Ga., to Drive Them Out. May Be Trouble.

GRiffin, Ga., May 24.—The flogging of three colored operatives of the Kincaid Mills, on Monday night by White Caps, has led to sensational developments.

Last night another negro was taken from his house and severely beaten and out. These negroes are law abiding citizens. Today the superintendents and others at the Kincaid Mills were notified to leave at once or they would be "dealt with."

It now transpires that there has been a club formed here known as the "Laborers' Union Band," with the purpose of driving the negroes out of the county.

The information is good to the effect that this band was formed in connection with others in the State and the rules and oaths followed by these men are more rigid than those enforced by Jesse James. The Griffin "Laborers' Union Band" has about five hundred members, a large number of whom are boys under age. At a recent meeting of this mob, it was suggested that the boys be turned out, as they knew no better than to sell out for money. At this the boys threatened their fathers and promised to reveal everything. These young criminals by reason of their courage remained within the ranks.

These facts have come to light today, and when the superintendent, A. G. Martin, was threatened, a petition signed by President W. J. Kincaid, Vice-President S. Grantland and Secretary and Treasurer J. M. Branner, of the Kincaid Mills was sent to Governor Candler through Judge E. W. Hammond, asking that whereas a mob had on two nights previous forcibly, beaten and mistreated men not guilty of any crime, and said mob had threatened other lives at the mill, that he order out the militia to protect lives.

The Governor responded promptly and in an hour's time the Griffin Rifles were in their armor awaiting orders from Judge Hammond to proceed to the factory.

The mayor has been reliably informed that if the men go to the factory tonight, he has ordered all the police force on duty throughout the night.

GEORGIA'S NAVY.

Their Record Was a Good One for Dry Land Seamen.

WASHINGTON, May 24.—Lieutenant Southerland, in charge of the Naval Militia has received a preliminary report on the work done by the Georgia Naval Militia during the recent cruise of the Prairie which inaugurated the scheme of summer cruises along the coast. It shows that the work of the reserves was particularly good, in view of the fact that they had never before been to sea or had the use of a government ship. That their gunnery was good is shown by their snuffing one of the targets. The technical report of the board of officers appointed to pass on the work is so full that it is "fair," which is said to be a good showing for a first cruise.

SHARP FIGHT AT LEZON.

MacArthur's And Fenton's Men Kill Thirty Filipinos And Wound Sixty.

MANILA, May 24.—The Filipinos attacked an outpost one mile from San Fernando at 6 o'clock this morning.

General MacArthur, with two battalions of Montana men, two of Kansas men under General Fenton and two guns of the Utah battery, moved against the natives occupying trenches which had been vacated at the fall of San Fernando. The Kansas volunteers deployed to the right, with the Montana men on the extreme left and the artillery in the center.

After an obstinate resistance the natives retreated, having been flanked by the Kansas companies and driven toward the Montana men. Most of the Filipinos escaped, leaving their dead and wounded behind.

The American loss was one killed, twelve wounded. The Filipinos loss was thirty killed, sixty wounded, ninety prisoners and 100 stands of arms captured.

The Third and Twenty-second Infantry, escorting the Signal Corps, which was picking up a wire from San Miguel to Balisag, had a running fight the whole distance, losing one killed and fifteen wounded. They finally reached Balisag.

General Lawton has arrived at Malolos with practically his entire command. The roads will be impassable in a few days. As supply bases small garrisons will control navigation at points on the rivers Rio Grande, Bagbag and San Fernando.

SPLENDID CLOSING

Of Salem Female Academy. Sixty Seven Graduates.

Winstons, May 25.—Salem Female College Commencement closed today. A cable message and letters of greeting were read from Principal Clewell and Bishop Hoadthaler, who are in Herrnhut, Germany, attending the General Moravian Synod.

The literary address by Rev. Dr. Stagg of Charlotte, was one of the most beautiful orations ever heard in the Twin City. It glowed and sparkled throughout with bright and happy illusions with good and timely advice and not infrequently with flashes of classical oratorical eloquence. His subject was "The conquest of fear is the basis of all scientific progress and the cultivation of love is the emancipation of man."

Diplomas were presented to 67 graduates as follows: Forty in academic department, three post graduates, eight in book keeping, seven in stenography, two in instrumental music, one in vocal music and seven in elocution.
