OLD NORTH STATE.

Smallpox Cases. Windsor Naval Reserves. Fleety of Moonshiners. First Regiment Band.

Town of Jerome Seeks to Surrender Its Charter.

Over the Craig Bill. Morganton Smallpox Cases. Windsor Naval Reserves. Fleety of Moonshiners. First Regiment Band.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 27.—The last Legislature chartered the town of Jerome. Now the chief of police writes the secretary of State that the mayor and himself desire to surrender the charter. The town government consists of the mayor, one commissioner and the chief of police. Everybody else has resigned.

There is no abatement in the stir among the insurance people by reason of the Craig bill. The Preferred Accident Company, the Pacific Mutual and the New York Life have filed their charters under that law; but the Northwestern withdraws its charter. There is a movement for a State convention of insurance men here June 5, to memorialize the Governor to specially convene the Legislature to repeal or amend the Craig law. It is said that in the past dozen years insurance companies doing business in North Carolina have not transferred half a dozen cases from State to federal courts.

All efforts to capture the Federal convict, McLoughlin, who escaped from the penitentiary brickyard Tuesday, have failed.

The number of true bills found against moonshiners here at this term of the Federal Court is much above the average. The amount of perjury committed this week by the moonshiners and their witnesses is simply appalling. The court is dispatching business with rapidity. So far over forty moonshiners have been convicted.

There are now only six cases of smallpox at Morganton; all in a pest house. Newton will have another cotton mill. Yount & Shrum will build it.

The law requires that the public printers shall deliver all the legislative acts in ninety days after the Legislature adjourns. This year it simply cannot be done, so late were the public printers chosen.

Last year there was a collision of trains between Charlotte and Salisbury. Engineer Kinney got \$30,000 damages for injuries, and W. B. Tunstall, engineer of the other train, got \$2,500.

A survey has begun for a new line of railway from Morganton southward to some point on the Seaboard Air Line.

Officers of the new division of the naval reserves at Windsor were commissioned as follows: Lieutenant, John T. Smithwick; Lieutenant, junior grade, William M. Sutton; ensign, Ernest L. Smith. This division and another formed at Elizabeth City make the total number eight.

Durham is making an earnest effort to have the First Regiment Band locate there, offering its members employment and give \$1,000 a year bonus. Raleigh and Greensboro also desire this very fine band.

A suit is to be brought to test the validity of the Craig act requiring all foreign insurance companies to domesticate themselves upon doing business in North Carolina.

Bishop Nelson, of Georgia delivered a very fine address here at the thirty third commencement of St. Augustine's Colored Normal school.

The State Board of Agriculture is called to meet here June 1st. It is a special meeting and will out all the fastidists save the commissioner, John H. Smith, who holds until June 14th.

The number of students at the State University this year was 644. Of those who attended the summer school alone.

Next Monday nearly all the inmates of the smallpox pesthouse here will be discharged.

Rosa Bonheur, the famous French painter of animals, died at her home near Fontainebleau.

Returns from the Peruvian election indicate the choice of Eduardo Romo to succeed Senhor de Pterola as president.

Ex-Premier Crispi caused a wild scene in the Italian Chamber of Deputies by asking permission to explain the circumstances leading to the Italian defeat in Abyssinia.

The Nicaraguan government has raised the state of siege at Bluefields, and General Torres and his troops have been recalled.

Rioting is in progress at Guadalupe, West Indies, and the French authorities have been unable to suppress it.

An American garrison has occupied Jobo, the capital of the Bulu Islands, a southern group of the Philippines.

The Spaniards have evacuated Zamboanga, island of Mindanao, after a series of fights with the Filipinos.

The Spanish General Montero died of wounds received while fighting the natives at Zamboanga.

Events of the last week have emphasized the need of a larger army at Manila if Luzon is to be conquered.

Distribution of the \$3,000,000 to Cuban troops will commence today in Havana.
