KILLED BY ICE WATER.

Presidency of the A. & M. College.

The Secret of a Murder Revealed. From a Convention. Insurance Companies Domesticated. Howard Convicted. News Items.

RALEIGH, June 7.—Three years ago a farmer was assassinated one day on his farm near Goldsboro. It was a mysterious crime and all efforts at a clue failed. But a few days ago the farmer's son died and on his death bed revealed the secret. He said that a neighbor of the murdered man was the assassin; that he was so near his father when the neighbor fired the fatal shot that some of his father's blood fell upon him; that the assassin would kill the son also if the latter ever revealed the truth. The assassin eventually died and the boy felt absolved from the terrible oath which the murderer had forced him to take.

The insurance commissioner, James R. Young, says he believes that within 60 days all the insurance companies will have "domesticated" themselves, under the Craig law. But the movement in this direction is slow since June 1, as 13 life insurance companies so far declined to continue business under the law.

The next convention of the North Carolina Press Convention will be held at Wrightsville Beach, near Wilmington, July 12-13.

The last dividend of the defunct First National Bank of Wilmington, which went into receiver's hands November 24, 1891, is 1 per cent, making 56 per cent in all. Miscellaneous assets of the bank aggregating \$197,000, were sold last Saturday and brought only \$75.

At the Agricultural and Mechanical College here last night, S. E. Asbury, of the class of '98, delivered the annual address. The annual banquet followed. Among the guests were 17 of the new board of trustees. This evening President S. H. Hartzog, of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of South Carolina, delivered the annual address before the graduating class of 16.

The commencement of Trinity College Durham, began today with the baccalaureate sermon by Bishop Duncan, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Dr. E. T. White, of Oxford, delivered the alumni address and Bishop John H. Vincent, of Buffalo, N. Y., the literary address before the graduating class of twelve.

Deputy Marshal Watson, of Chicago, has lodged in jail at Greensboro John R. Thompson, of Franklin, Macon county, charged with embezzlement of \$678 several years ago. He was tried at Asheville and pleaded guilty. Judgment was suspended on payment of sum embezzled. He jumped bond and disappeared.

An interesting case at Wilmington resulted in the conviction of Tillman Howard and Mrs. Ida Terry. Mrs. Terry was away from her husband, W. R. Terry, a prominent Republican editor, of Charlotte, and went to Wilmington with Howard. Terry telegraphed and had Howard arrested for abduction. This charge it was impossible to prove and Howard was released. Then Terry went to Wilmington and attempted to shoot Howard. Mr. Howard appeared on the scene and had her husband taken out of Mrs. Terry's apartments by policemen. Howard was convicted of abandonment, and both he and Mrs. Terry were convicted of fornication and adultery. Both their lawyers will appeal the cases to the Supreme court.

Though four ballots were taken by the board of trustees yesterday for a president of the A. & M. College, no one was elected. The matter will be taken up again this morning at 11 o'clock, and fought to a finish. The finish may be anyone of three things: Election of a president of the college. Election of a chairman of the faculty. Postponement of any election for a month. The latter alternative was sprung late last night and found several advocates. The first three ballots for president yesterday were the same, as follows: George T. Winston, S. W. S. Primrose, T. D. H. Hill, J. B. Brewer, 1.

Freight Conductor Thomas Sumner dropped dead in a store at Spencer about 12 o'clock. The cause of his sudden death is not known with certainty, though it may have been due to paralysis from a recent case of which he had apparently recovered. His heart was also weak and Dr. W. W. McKenzie, who examined the body, thinks the immediate cause of his death was drinking three glasses of ice water when greatly overheated. Capt Sumner was originally from Thomasville and was living at Spencer at the time of his death. He was related to the Sumners of this county, being a nephew of the late Col. T. J. Sumner. He leaves a wife and two children.

A cablegram from Auckland states that at the celebration of Queen Victoria's birthday in Samoa it was announced that Great Britain would never recognize Mataafa as King.

Joseph Chamberlain, British Secretary of State for the colonies, says he takes a sanguine view of the Alaska boundary negotiations.

Capt. Alfred Dreyfus showed the greatest joy when officially notified of the court's decision granting him a new trial.

Robert Wallace, Liberal member of Parliament for East Edinburgh, who, while speaking in the debate yesterday on the grant to General Kitchener, was seized with cerebral paralysis, is dead.

Leading supporters of Representative Henderson say that if he is elected Speaker he will preserve the organization of the House, as far as practicable, as it stood at the last session of Congress. He will have the appointment of a considerable number of chairman of committees.

Criticism by Mr. Proctor, of the Civil Service Commission, of President McKinley's order removing 4,000 offices from the classified service are said to have given offense to the Administration and may lead to Mr. Proctor's retirement.

Filipinos annoy the American troops at San Fernando by throwing shells into the town at night.

Lieut. Fred W. Pearce, of the Sixth Artillery, committed suicide at Manila.

General Gomez has issued a farewell manifesto to the people of Cuba, advising them to assist the Americans in preparing the island for independence.
