In spite of the rainy weather last night there was quite a party of New Bernians bound for Morehead and Beaufort on board of the A. & N. C. train.

Rev. R. G. Gross of Statesville will preach at the Middle Street Baptist church this morning at 11 o'clock. The pastor, Rev. Right C. Moore, will conduct the evening service.

The rain of last night was a welcome one to truckers and every one in this vicinity, as vegetation wasted it, and to humanity it brought coolness, which was greatly appreciated and enjoyed.

A carload of Barbours buggies, and a car load of fine driving and farm horses have been received by Mr. J. W. Stewart, and added to his already well equipped stables and warehouses on Broad street.

About five thousand packages of potatoes, beans and squash came over the A. & N. C. from points on that road Friday, and were transferred here to the A. & N. C. railroad for shipment to northern markets.

About six p. m. Saturday, the thunderstorm which had been threatening for hours, burst over this city. Very sharp lightning and heavy thunder prevailed for a few minutes, with a moderately heavy rainfall.

**STARKEY DRAWS COLOR LINE.**

Capt. Starkey of A. & N. C. Road Railroad has noted the drawing of the color line in the passenger coaches, by curbing him upon poles, the said curbs as marking the line between whites and blacks.

Every one who has traveled over the A. & N. C. knows the colored individual who presides on the mail train, his occupation being a varied one, from shouting out the names of stations, in a voice of great power and equally unintelligible, carrying out baskets, filling up the ice water coolers, and dumping wood upon the engine at the "skates" along the road.

This most necessary adjunct to the success of the A. & N. C. is commonly called "Starkey," also "Capt. Tillery," and it is said in private talk among the A. & N. C. stock holders that the A. & N. C. would never declare dividends without Starkey being in the road's service.

Therefore the importance of Captain Tillery who has always been on the line and judging from the past and present will for long years continue to shout "Tus-ka-ro-tee!"

Now that the new pole and curbs law has gone into effect on his road, dividing the Jim Crows from the other birds of passage, Starkey's duties are vastly increased.

But Starkey is strong and he tackles this new duty with calmness and the utmost deliberation, and believing in law and the separation of the races he is successful in his efforts to see that the color line, otherwise the Jim Crow law is literally and fearfully enforced.

At times during the month of this present June, there have been more first class birds than first class Jim Crows on the A. & N. C., therefore at times the part held sacred to the Jim Crows by pole and curbs has been empty while the other side of the p. and c. revealed a crowd of the other kind of birds struggling not only for seats but even seeking perches.

Here is where Capt. Tillery came in, many times, and each time quickly beckoned to the other kind of birds, who had flocked over in the Jim Crow section of the car, to get back into their own yard. Not even have packages and grips been allowed to remain, for Capt. Tillery had his instructions, and the color line must be enforced.

And in this official the A. & N. C. has the right man, and one quite capable of knowing the right side for the other class of birds, besides being rigid in his enforcement of keeping the Jim Crows in their section.

The pole and curbs may seem a slight barrier, an almost imaginary line, but Starkey is not fooled, nor will you be allowed to be if you get on the wrong side of the aforesaid p. and c.

**TAKEN TO CARTERET.**

The negro Hardesty, or Lewis Patrick as he is called by Sheriff Willis of Carteret, was taken down on the A. & N. C. mail train last night to Beaufort.

In addition to the articles already recognized, found in the negro's valise, there was an old time razor, which was identified by several persons as the property of Weeks. Also the alpaca coats and shoes were identified by H. B. Duffy, who sold them to Mr. Weeks.

Sheriff Willis said last night that Patrick would not be given any preliminary hearing at Beaufort, his lawyer R. B. Nixon, of this city, having advised against it, and the negro would be at once committed to Carteret county jail, awaiting trial by court.
