OLD RATES STAND.

In the Telephone Cases, Exceptions Overruled.

Governor Russell Comes Down, To Investigate Insect Pest. Damages for False Arrest. Ample Hotel Facilities for Greensboro.

RALEIGH, June 30.—The corporation commission has heard the argument in the telephone exception cases. Ex-Senator John W. Daniel and H. C. Strong appeared for the Bell Telephone Company, and General Messy, general manager, and A. B. Andrews, Jr., for the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, commonly known as the long distance telephone company. The point in the argument was the old one—that the commission is not clothed with power to make rates for telephones. The commission overruled the exceptions and the present rates stand.

Rev. Dr. J. D. Huffman of Henderson, so well known as a Baptist preacher and writer, is here, making special researches in the newspaper room of the State Library in order to obtain material for a work on Baptists and their connection with the press in North Carolina.

Chief Clerk Denmark, of the State Treasury, says as the penitentiary has drawn \$20,000 out of \$50,000 specially appropriated by the last Legislature, and also all the earnings which were on hand January 1st.

Governor Russell has descended from his "high horse" so far the Atlantic & North Carolina Railroad is concerned. He made the proposition to the board of internal improvements to end the dispute as to control. He has turned over all the books to the board. Next Tuesday the latter will begin an inspection of the road. The question of deciding whether the Governor's or the board's appointees as State proxy shall be recognized is left entirely to the private stockholders.

The trustees of Wake Forest College have filled vacancies in the faculty by electing J. F. Sellers professor of physics and W. B. Daniel assistant professor of Greek and Latin.

The penitentiary executive board has made statement which shows that the debt January 1st was \$121,935, and March 6, was \$117,581.

Two entomologists from Washington will be "lent" to North Carolina by the government to aid the State crop pest commission in exterminating the San Jose scale and other dangerous insect pests.

It is asserted by Vice President St. John that in six months to a day through trains between New York and Tampa will be in operation on the Seaboard Air Line, via Richmond, Ridgeway, Raleigh, Cheraw, Columbia, etc.

Last autumn a white man who owned land on the line of the Raleigh & Cape Fear Railroad stopped the convict force from grading for a day or two. Cases in the court followed. It was during a hot fight between this road and another for right-of-way. The then sheriff arrested the man and now the latter sues for \$5,000 damages for alleged false arrest.

It is decided that the new cotton oil mill here will not be built until next year. The largest stockholder says the delay is due to the fact that machinery cannot be obtained, the manufacturers being overran with orders.

The late Dr. Joyful Laughter Ramsey, of the Agricultural Department, is now traveling in the interest of a very excellent patent medicine which is manufactured by a firm here, of which he is a member. He is a full fledged drummer.

Raleigh's aldermen have issued 30 liquor licenses. This is the same number as last year.

Judge Furgall decides in a bankruptcy case that a revisionary homestead is not exempt from sale.

The State charters the Edgecombe Club, of Tarboro, with about seventy five members.

To the deep regret of the Agricultural Department officers and the public, an order came to continue the removal of exhibits from the south front of the Museum, so the corporation commission can occupy it.

Word comes that the President has granted a pardon to William McDowell, convicted in North Carolina in 1897 of breaking into a postoffice. The pardon was issued because of McDowell's critical illness.

The Rainbow Hotel, Greensboro, recently damaged badly by fire, is to be rebuilt, enlarged and modernized at once. Boston capital is interested in the enterprise. This, with the Southern Loan and Trust Companies new five story building nearing completion which is to be utilized for a hotel, the Normandie, will give Greensboro ample hotel facilities.

ROYAL BAKING POWDER

MAKES THE FOOD MORE DELICIOUS AND WHOLESOME

INCREASED VALUATIONS

On Railways, Steamboats, Telegraphs, Telegraph and Pullman Car Property. Special to Journal.

RALEIGH, June 30.—The Corporation Commission increases the valuation on Railways, Steamboats, Telephone, Telegraph and Pullman Car property, from \$22,819,500 to \$44,114,300.

The total taxes this year will be \$450,000, an increase of \$20,000 over last year. The Atlantic & North Carolina railroad valuation is increased from \$5,000 to \$6,000 per mile.

MAY BOLT FROM GOEBEL.

Kentucky Newspapers Denounce His Nomination For Governor.

LEXINGTON, Ky., June 29.—A general bolt from William Goebel, the Democratic nominee for Governor, is imminent. Leading newspapers which have been loyal to the Democracy and its nominees are today denouncing the nomination of Goebel as unfair and advising Democrats to refuse to support his candidacy.

It is said that few of the friends of Gen. P. Wat Harlin, the leading candidate in the convention before Goebel made his trade with Stone, will support the nominee.

Owen county, hitherto Democratic by 2,000 will, it is predicted by leading men, give a Republican majority, Louisville, Democratic politicians of that city declare, will give the Republicans 20,000 majority.

LYNCHERS ARRESTED.

Two Men in Texas Remanded to Jail Charged With Murder.

HOUSTON, Tex., June 29.—A special from Athens, Ga., says: Walter Wilkinson, Joe Wilkinson, Polk Weeks, William Brooks, John Greenhaw, Arthur Greenhaw, W. E. Johnson, William Gaddis, John Stevens and Samuel Hall were today remanded, to jail without bail, charged with having murdered James, John and George Humphreys by taking them from their homes and hanging them.

The prisoners will institute habeas corpus proceedings.

The case is the most celebrated in Texas criminal history and the State has sent an assistant attorney general, district attorneys and rangers to aid in apprehending the lynchers.

Three of the men have confessed and others have pleaded to be permitted to do so.

Doves Instead of Wine.

BALTIMORE, June 29.—The steamer Queen Anne, of the Princess Anne Railroad Company, was launched here today, a notable feature of the occasion being the omission of the time honored custom of breaking a bottle of wine over the vessel's bow as she glided from the ways. Instead of this two white doves were released as the vessel began to move and her deck was strewn with wreaths and garlands of flowers.

YELLOW FEVER IN NEW YORK.

Rate of a Norwegian Steamship is a Critical Condition.

NEW YORK, June 29.—John Johnson, mate of the Norwegian steamship Krim, was removed to Swinburne Islands Hospital this afternoon suffering from yellow fever, and tonight his condition is serious. The Krim sailed from Havana on June 26th for Matanzas arriving at that port the same day. Mate Johnson, who had been ailing, was taken seriously ill after the arrival at Matanzas. The port physician was called in, but up to the time of sailing for this port on June 28th although the man developed high temperature, no suspicious symptoms appeared.

The steamer was detained at quarantine here for disinfection, which will probably be finished tomorrow.

The crew will be held at Hoffman Island five days, and the steamer will be allowed to proceed to the dock with a new crew.

Mystery About Dreyfus.

RENNES, FRANCE, June 29.—A well-accredited report is in circulation this evening that Captain Dreyfus will arrive here tomorrow night.

The house occupied by Mme. Dreyfus was guarded by gendarmes all last night and at daybreak these policemen were succeeded by others. In addition a giant porter keeps the outer gate locked and barred. No one is allowed to enter without the express permission of Mme. Dreyfus.

PARIS, June 29.—As an example of the Dreyfus rumors current, the Solr this evening states that a high police official, speaking to an intimate friend, said the French Government received information 48 hours ago that Dreyfus committed suicide on board the cruiser Sfal, on which he left Devil's Island for France.

May Not Exceed \$90,000,000.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—The Treasury officials are confident the deficit for the present fiscal year will not exceed \$90,000,000. One week ago the estimate was a little short of \$100,000,000, but during the last few days the receipts have been rather above the estimates, while the expenditures have fallen off.
