### TRUST BUYING.

Negotiations To Purchase Tobacco  
Warehouses At Winston.

The Railroad Appeal Case. Allieft Still in Johnston. Raleigh Fire Department Test. State Board Issues. Splenic Fever. Disease Spreading.

RALEIGH, July 10.—Mr. George Lee, of Danville, Va., has been in Winston interviewing the tobacco warehousemen with a view to buying their business. He was not given any encouragement.

He called on the proprietors of the four warehouses, all of whom told him that they did not have any proposition to make him, in fact, they did not care to sell. Mr. Lee asked one firm to make a price on its business and then give him an option on the same. This was promptly declined.

Representatives of the four houses say that they do not wish to sell, and that no definite bid was made them. One warehouseman said Mr. Lee was rather uncommunicative, especially when asked when he represented.

Judge Brown will hear at chambers at Oxford July 28 the interesting case growing out of the judgment of the Superior Court in the suit of an ice company against the Seaboard Air Line for the alleged burning of its factory. It will be remembered that a verdict for \$70,000 damages was given in the Superior Court here and that the railroad appealed, but its attorney did not file the appeal papers in time, according to the claim of the attorneys on the other side. One of the railroad attorneys says he has entire confidence that he will get the case before the Supreme Court. The attorneys on the other side say they think the case is decided and that it cannot be revived.

Deputy Revenue Collector Adams made a lively raid in Johnston county last Saturday and bagged no less than three illicit distilleries. Johnston is getting to be a top notch moonshine county and during the past twelve months as many as 25 of such stills have been destroyed.

A fire department test here showed the promptness of the firemen. An alarm was sent in from a new box without any hint in advance, the box being seven blocks from an engine house and in three minutes the hose wagon had made the hydrant and had water on a hook and ladder truck from the same house being also on the spot. The department is cheap as well as effective. Its cost this year is only \$6,500, this including enlargement of buildings.

The Executive Board of the penitentiary has requested State Treasurer Worth to issue at once \$50,000 of 4 per cent bonds to raise \$43,165, with which to buy the two "Caledonia" farms on the Roanoke river, near Weldon. These farms were first leased 10 years ago. The State has ever since had an option on them, at the price above named. There are 7,300 acres in these farms. There are few as fine farms in the south. The State has expended many thousands of dollars upon them and they are worth at the very least \$125,000 including the improvements.

The stone for the pedestal of the Vance statue was selected yesterday and is pink granite, North Carolina stone, from one of the Piedmont counties.

It is said that a French artist is to make the bronze statue of Ensign Worth Bayley, which is to stand in the capital square here.

Next Saturday the Parins Flouring Mill Company here will invite proposals for building a 25,000 bushel elevator.

Dr. George T. Winston, now in Texas, is telegraphing his acceptance of the election to the presidency of the Agricultural and Mechanical College here pledges his best efforts to advance all its best interests.

Much rain has fallen and the drought has ended in all parts of the State.

Effective work is being done here in both road and street improvements. The supply of granite is unlimited. The city gets granite from the quarry where the stone used in building the capital was taken. The deeper the quarry the better the stone. The stone in the capital is blotted. It was in no case taken from a greater depth than 15 feet. The quarry has now a depth of nearly 50 feet.

Dr. Cooper Currier, State veterinarian in Alamance county examining the herd of 51 cattle on the farm of J. A. and W. S. Long. Eight of the cattle have died, it is believed of splenic fever.

State Geologist Holmes says that he is in fear of the development of this dread disease in various parts of the State, owing to the constant driving of cattle from one section to another; from the woods to the pastures and from the "range" to the town.

The Commissioner of Agriculture was today also notified of sickness among the cattle at the farm of Richard H. Battle, Esq., six miles from Raleigh. A fine bull and cow are very sick and the others are "drooping."

Commissioner Patterson has gone to Charlotte to attend the rail convention. He requests that information be sent here immediately of any sickness among
