ANOTHER EXODUS

Predicted That 30,000 Negroes
Will Leave the State.

More Cars for the A. & N. C. Railroad. Killed by Lightning. Improvements Near Raleigh. Catholic Orphanage The Cattle Fever.

RALEIGH, July 11.—The negro organ here makes the assertion that the negro exodus from North Carolina will continue and that by the first of August, 1900, at least 30,000 negroes will have left the State.

The negroes are mainly going North and will locate in the larger cities. If the number leaving the State proves as large as is predicted, it will equal the migration in 1898, which was managed by Peg Leg Williams, and which was brought to a stop by the action of the Legislature at that time.

Chairman Armistead Jones, of the board of Internal Improvements, says regarding the Atlantic & North Carolina Railroad, that more engines and cars and also more machinery will have to be bought.

Labor Commissioner Lacy says replies to inquiries are coming in very rapidly and that mill owners are answering more promptly and freely than ever before. They have learned that the labor bureau does not propose to interfere in their affairs, or to in any way disturb the pleasant relations between capital and labor, employer and employee, which are so marked in North Carolina.

Mr. Mueloch, 115 wife and four other persons took refuge, from a rainstorm under a large cherry tree in Cumberland county Saturday. Lightning struck the tree, killed Mueloch and fatally injured two others. Mrs. Mueloch was stunned. Two miles were killed. The person struck who escaped serious injury says they suffer intensely internally, as if fire were pouring them in the stomach.

James W. Tufts will build a 350 room hotel at Pinehurst, to cost \$125,000. Wood will be the material used. The hotel now there is the Holly Inn, with only 125 rooms. All of Pinehurst is owned by Mr. Tufts. It is the greatest enterprise of the kind between St. Augustine and New York. The contract for the lumber for the new hotel is awarded to W. C. Bain, of Greensboro, and 1,500,000 feet are required.

Rapid progress is being made in the work of adding another story to the Institution for the Blind here. The brick work will be completed next week and the roof is half on. The institution thus enlarged will be prepared to accommodate all blind children in the State up to the very limit of the appropriation.

The Thomasville Orphanage sustained a loss of some \$750 by the hall storm six weeks ago. Its appeals for help have been promptly answered and the contributions aggregate some \$1,800. In a double sense therefore the hall storm was a windfall. Now, for the first time in its history, the orphanage is out of debt.

Work begins on the Roman Catholic Orphanage and Training School, 14 miles southwest of Raleigh, and adjoining Pullen Park property and the grounds of the Agricultural and Mechanical College. The Catholics have purchased 200 acres of land there, since last April, adding tract after tract. The school will be on one of the most commanding sites in this section. There is also to be a convent and a home for the aged and infirm.

The reports of the 70 State banks are now being received by the corporation commission. With them are also sent certified lists of the officers and directors.

The State Auditor is sending out to the various sheriffs lists of the stockholders of banks in their respective counties. He has sent out the lists so far as obtained, of the stockholders of other corporations, and if more come in will supplement these with another list.

The MacMackin gold mine, about two miles from Gold Hill, and between the Union and Lenoir mines, in Cabarrus county, was the scene of a fire night before last, between 10 and 11 o'clock, in which its office, engine house, tool house hoister and some of the timber in one of the shafts were destroyed. The fire is thought to have originated from a lamp left in the tool house, or it may have been incendiary. The mine was being actively operated by its owners, the Wallace Reduction Company. There was no insurance on the property destroyed.

Cards are issued to out-of-town friends to the marriage of Miss Annie Barber, daughter of Mr. F. H. Barber, and Mr. Robert L. Thompson, both of this city, for July 13th. Mr. Thompson is a son of Mr. A. A. Thompson, of the big cotton firm of Johnson & Thompson, and he will take his bride to Bremen, Germany, where he represents his father's firm.

ceived letters from the Northwest asking for information as to the establishment of four sheep farms. Dr. Cooper Curlice, State veterinarian has returned from his visit of inspection to the herd of cattle at Saxapahaw, Alamance county, owned by the Messrs. Long, of Elm College. He found that of the herd of 23 eight have died of splenic fever, and eight are now sick. Most of the sick are young cattle and he thinks most of these will recover. It was found that the disease had been introduced by young cattle driven from Chatham county. Dr. Curlice inspected the herd of Richard H. Battle, Esq., near Raleigh, in which there were nine grown animals and six yearlings. The latter were sent to the place by a butcher and infected the other cattle. One has died and four are sick, of which two will die.

Late News Items.
Captain Watkins, in his report upon the wreck of the steamer Paris, says that he misjudged his distances. He assumes all responsibility for the accident and his license has been suspended for two years by the United States local inspectors.

Grand Duke George, heir to the throne of Russia, is dead from consumption. The United States has declined to submit to arbitration the Austro-Hungarian claims growing out of the riots at Lattimer, Pa., in 1897.

The steamer P. Maria was wrecked 15 miles east of Halifax, N. S., and 115 persons who were on board of her were rescued.

Preparations for the return of the volunteers are reported to be active at Manila.

General Wood returned to Santiago and began vigorous action to stamp out the yellow fever.

CHERBOURG, France, July 10.—The North German Lloyd steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse arrived at Cherbourg from New York at 2.45 o'clock this afternoon, in the record-breaking time of 5 days 20 hours and 55 minutes. The average time was 22.62 knots an hour as against her best previous record of 22.56 knots.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Forty-two men answered an advertisement today asking for skin for grafting 11 inches of cuticle over the back of Richard Gray, 17 years old. The wound in Gray's back, which is now nearly well, was caused by a swiftly moving belt in the suspender factory where he worked. The flesh was torn from the back and the bones were exposed. If a new skin could not have been grafted on Gray would have died.

The issue of the newspaper containing the advertisement was hardly on the street before men and boys began flocking toward Dr. E. E. Prescott's private hospital. Some were hard up and wanted the money; some were moved by curiosity; some were influenced by a desire to help the sufferer.

After an examination Dr. Prescott selected four whom he thought would do. The rest were told they were not needed. "I cannot even sell my flesh for food," muttered one old man, the oldest of the throng, when he was told the doctor would not need him. The operation was entirely successful and the wounded boy will live.
