I took cotton to Arnold's (square bale) gin in North Rome and the same day I carried some of the same lot of cotton to Hancock's Roand'ap gin in Rome. I sold both lots of cotton fo Rome the same day and after every item of expense was charged against each, I cleared one dollar and twenty-five cents a bale more on the Roundlep cotton."

POR OLD VETS.

Them From Wake County. Holly Sprisos, N. C., Nov. 14.

Not long since the writer had occasion to examine the Roster, or list of names of Confederate soldiers, on file in the S. C. Clarks Office at Raisigh. The writer, together with a number of other Wake county boys, enlisted in Captain Alex. C. Latham's battery, of New Bern, shortly before the conscript act was not ortly before the conscript act was pu

Capt Latham was at the time in Ral sigh engaged in recruiting his company which had been greatly weakened at the the battles of of New Bern and Hanover ourt house. We accompanied him to lirginia joining the command a few niles below Richmend. Our first move vas to Gordonville, where we Wake soys first found Branch Brigade to which our command was attached. Our first experience in baltic was at Codar ountain where we were with Jackson A. P. Hill division, all summer and up to the time of entering Maryland on the way to Sharpaburg. At Leesburg our herses were found to be so much broken lows that we had to remain on the Spout Spring on the road from Lecsburg to Winchester that one Martin V, Wil ester that one Martin V. Wil on was taken sick and sent to the hosoital at Winchester. This and some oth-

er things in connection is what I wish Ve heard nothing from Wilson until he following winter while in camp at Millwood station on the Richmond and Fredericksburg Railroad. Capt. Latham received a letter from a doctor then sta tioned at Guinea station, (I do not remember the Dr's, name) saying that Wilson was in his charge at Win while sick, that he died there and that he left some personal effects in the Doctor's charge which he would be pleased to deliver to Capt. Latham or any one whom he would send for them I was ent by the Captain for the articles which were duly received from the Doc tor and by me carried to Capt. Latham, hence they were sent to Wilson's widow in Wake county, 11 miles Southwest of Raleigh—she has the articles now. Now

our Roster does not show the name of said Wilson at all, therefore his widow is deprived of the pension intended for her by the State. (I hear there are many such cases.) Could not the pension law be amended, so that such cases could be reached by proper proof being presented to the proper authorities, I feel sad to think that our records are

n such bad shape. I have seen a list of names of soldiers buried at Winchester but do not find the name of M. V. Wilson among them, though it ought to be there. No doubt the name was destroyed before the "Ludies Association" took the emetery in charge. Ferhaps I should stop, but I find the

Rester" deficient la agother instance. the writer's name is not there. This how ever is of no consequence as there is ne pension. I shall not kick. There are some New Bern boys, if living, who have not forgotton me. Such as Old Bergt, Bryan, Wm. Green, Charlle Green Nath Tisdale, flag bearer Chas. Thomas. Mart Stevenson who used to toot us up at all odd times at night with his old battered horn. We halted one day at Bouthanna river up north of Hanover Court House expecting an attack from and after the Wilderness battle. Our J. W. Grainger, E. W. Smallwood, Goo. N. Ives. the enemy who were advancing on Rich. San horses were detached and sent to the rear for safety. I think Stevenson was in charge, sure enough the attack was made on our force at the bridge and we being in line with the shells which passed over our battery were very much exposed, so much so that we had to change our position, thus interferring

with the writing of a love letter ... Now it was said that our bugler had a weetheart in the neighborhood of outhanns river bridge on the old tele graph road, so walle were waiting for the fight to come on Stephenson seated himself at the root of a very large oak with his face toward the bridge and was usily engaged by writing when the hells commenced to drop among us Stephenson very deliberately changed his position to the opposite side of the tree. Noticing the change I remarked to him that he might state the fact to his lady-love that he was now behind a ree. His only answer to me was:
"Be damfi do."

I could fill many pages with reminis-zaces of the boys of New Bern, Switt reek, Core creek, Beaufort, Hatteras, Wilmington, etc., but few if any of them will ever see this.
