## RALEIGH.

Twenty-Fifth Anniversary Of the Baptist Tabernacle Celebrated.

Penitentiary Reform. Changes At Soldiers Home, Elizabeth City Knitting Mills Chartered. Hunters Coming From the North.

Raleigh, November 17.—The Baptist Tabernacle here is celebrating its silver jubilee—its 25th anniversary. It was hoped that all its former pastors would be present to participate in the services. Rev. Dr. J. D. Huffman was here and preached yesterday. Other former pastors present are: Rev. Dr. W. A. Nelson and Rev. Dr. W. R. Gresham. Rev. Mr. Williams is expected. Rev. Tom Dixon writes that he cannot be present. The Tabernacle has grown to be a very large church, and has the largest Sunday school in the State.

Rev. Dr. Huffman spoke about the question of penitentiary reform. He says that what is needed is a system which will be just and honorable to the State and humane to the convicts, and declares that the agitation for it shall continue. He agrees fully with the idea that the penitentiary must be taken out of politics.

The Raleigh & Eastern Railroad has applied to the penitentiary for 600 convicts, to begin the work of grading the 24 1/2 miles of the road January 1st. A penitentiary official says 200 convicts will be furnished.

In the rear of the Soldiers Home and occupying about one third of its land have been for 10 years the quarters of the county convict gang. The county paid rent to the home. Now the county has sent, and no fixed habitation for its road force, and has given up the leased ground. The building has been a shed and will be removed and the land will become the garden of the home.

The shuttle block factory which Mr. Elwood Cox will establish here will be on the site of the one burned in 1893, and in a few yards of the North Carolina Railroad.

The State charters the Elizabeth City Knitting Mills, the capital to be not under \$20,000; J. B. Blades and others are the stockholders.

## DISTRESSING ACCIDENT.

Death of Student B. F. Long, of the University. Run Down by a Train.

CHARGE BUILT, November 15.—Mr. B. F. Long, Jr., of Statesville, a member of the freshmen class, was struck by the Chapel Hill train at University station today, and received fatal injuries. An arm and leg were broken and his back injured.

The father of the accident was briefly as follows: Last night Mr. Long received a telegram from his father, telling him to come to Raleigh for a day, where Mr. Long, Sr., was standing the Supreme Court. Young Long left this morning for Raleigh, and it was while awaiting his train at University station that the accident occurred. He was standing on the Chapel Hill track watching the incoming train from Greensboro and did not notice approach of the branch line train, as when that he was standing, the train was stopped by it, and dragged him some distance, through the wheels, ultimately 300 feet from the station. His father related the story. The student was deeply grieved over the accident.

### JOUBERT REPORTED KILLED.

Boers Lose Their Leading General. Still Besieging Ladysmith.

LONDON, November 16.—A dispatch received here today from Pietermaritzburg dated November 11, says: It is rumored here that General Joubert has been killed in action.

General Joubert has been noted for his personal courage and coolness, and may have dangerously exposed himself in a personal reconnaissance of the British position. If he were really killed on the battlefield, it would seem to be the fittest death for such a gallant soldier. It is said that the death of Joubert would be likely to lead to the adoption by the Boers of bolder tactics, as it is well known that he was a cautious and conservative commander, and that he had difficulty in restraining some of his followers.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—The report that the Boers have penetrated southward from Colenso to Obeyev, where they have cut the railroad, shows that they are adopting a proper strategic plan to impede the advances of the British relieving force.

According to the latest advices from British sources, at Eastcourt, the Boers are suffering from lack of supplies, though the large stores the British left when they evacuated Newcastle and Dundee must have been of great assistance to the Boer commissariat. The task of maintaining a complete investment of Ladysmith is probably proving onerous.

Ladysmith seems to be well provisioned, and the intrenchments are daily being strengthened.
