CITY ALDERMEN.

Proceedings of the Board at the Regular February Session.

City Hall, Feb. 7th 1900.

The Board met in regular session, Mayor Patterson presiding. Present Aldermen Parker, Glover, Watson, Brewer, Davenport, Phillips, McCarthy, and Mosely.

Minutes of the last meeting read and adopted.

On motion of Alderman Watson, a committee of three, consisting of Watson, McCarthy, and Phillips, with the Mayor added, was appointed to confer with the city attorney in relation to the mandamus suit agast the city.

The proposition of O. H. Gidon in reference to extension of Griffith street, was referred to a committee of Aldermen Watson, McCarthy and Bowden, for investigation, with instructions to report at next meeting of the Board.

Foreman Delemar of the Atlantic Fire Co., appeared before the Board and in behalf of said company, asked that the city furnish them a horse other than the one now in use by the company, which was referred to the Fire committee.

The contract for fitting up with pipes and radiators for heating the quarters of the New Bern Fire Co., was, upon motion, awarded to The Ilyan Supply Co., they being the lowest bidder.

On motion, the painting of the building now being fitted up for the use of New Bern Fire Co., was left with Alderman Gerock, chairman Fire committee.

On motion the following report of Alderman McCarthy, chairman of the Cemetery committee, was accepted and ordered spread upon the records.

To the Hon. the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern: Gentlemen:

Under your instructions we have the pleasure to report that we have purchased the lot of land run in to the Cemetery grounds from Banks, for the sum of three hundred and thirty-five dollars and request that the Mayor and City Tax Collector be authorized to issue vouchers for the same, to be paid out of the Cedar Grove Cemetery funds.

On motion a voucher for \$335.00 against the Cemetery fund was ordered issued to pay for the lot of land extending into Cedar Grove Cemetery purchased from one Banks. All the members present voting aye.

The matter of making waikes and setting out trees in Cedar Grove Cemetery being discussed, the Board decided to leave it in the hands of the Chairman of Cemetery Committee.

On motion it was ordered that the sum of \$335.00 from the General fund be added to the Legal fund. All present voting aye.

Alderman Watson, chairman of water works committee reported that in compliance with instructions the committee had employed Mr. Kenneth Allen, an expert to examine and appraise the value of the Water and Sewer plant, and that Mr. Allen was now on the grounds at work.

On motion, a voucher for \$30.00 was ordered issued to Mr. Kenneth Allen in part payment of contract. All present voting aye.

Complaint being made of the condition of pump on Spring street, the matter was referred to the committee on streets and pumps.
