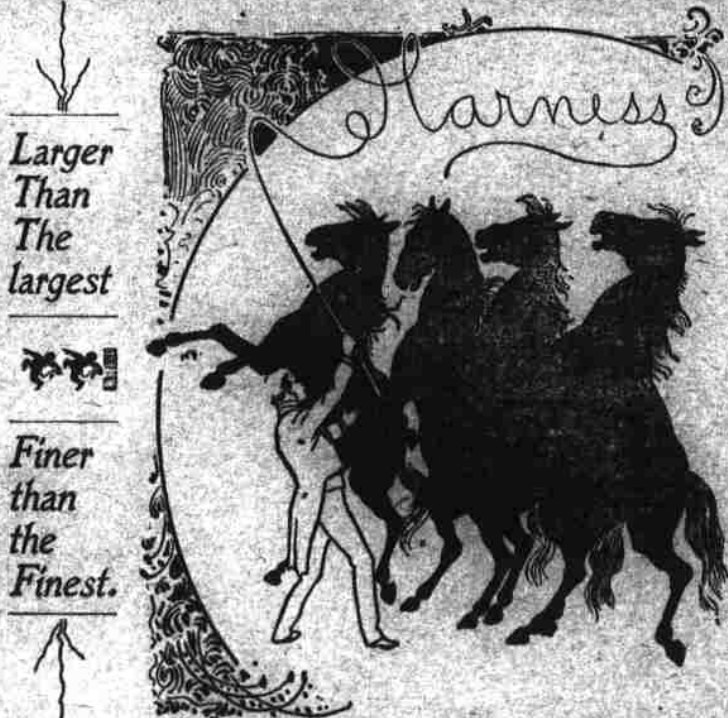

RALEIGH.

Robert L. Holt Will Not Be Candidate For Lieut. Governor.

State Board of Election Meets. Increase of Receipts From Insurance Companies. Justice to Nominate Aycock Next Week. Federal Court.

RALEIGH, April 3.—The State board of elections met Monday. It was its first business meeting and was a stationary one. The board first met last May when it organized by electing Walter B. Neal chairman, and James D. McNeill, secretary. The other members are: Wilson G. Lamb, E. A. Pollard and H. D. Gilmer, these five being Democrats; O. H. Johnson, Populist, and J. A. Frank, Republican. The board today chose the county boards of election, each of three members, who are to serve for two years. Another duty of the State board is to prescribe the kind of tickets to be used. Tickets must be plain; that is, without device, for any and all parties. The persons chosen to compose the county boards are those recommended by the Democratic chairman of the various counties.

W. V. Pollard, of the board, was not present on account of sickness. Probably no appointment of the county boards will be made until after the State convention next week. Frank, the Republican member of the board, says that Johnson, Populist, is co-opting with him. It is said that Johnson now opposes the constitutional amendment. It was reported some time ago that at a conference of Republicans at Statesville it was decided to get some fusion judge to explain the State election board from proceeding. Members of the board laughed at this and said nothing of the kind would be attempted.

This State election board has great power. It is, in fact, far more powerful than the old State board, because it has authority to correct errors. Commissioner of Insurance Young said that during the fiscal year of his department, the receipts were \$93,000. This is \$12,000 more than was ever before received in a year from insurance companies. It is said that M. A. Justice is to place B. Aycock in nomination at the Democratic State convention.

A letter received here from Robert L. Holt says that he will not run for the nomination of Lieutenant-Governor and that this decision is final. Governor Russell has gone to Wilmington. He says it will be several days before he appoints a judge for the Eastern Criminal Circuit. A lot of the Republicans are urging him to appoint Augustus M. Moore, of Greenville. It is said that Collector Duncan, who is one of the Governor's warmest and closest friends and admirers and who confers with him frequently, is urging Moore's appointment. The friends of ex-Judge Thomas H. Burton are urging his appointment.

There are more cases than usual on the criminal docket of the Federal Court, which begins a term here next May. The counterfeiting case against Lawyer A. J. Marshall, of Wilmington, will be called in the regular order, but an official says that he could not say whether the case would be tried, for the reason that some of the government's witnesses may be out of reach at that time.

TO BUILD UP DEFENDERS.

Herreshoff's Ready to Accommodate All Ambitious Yacht Owners.

BATERAV, N. C., April 2.—The story sent out from here stating that the Herreshoffs would build no more cup defenders is the veriest falsehood. Those in position to know say the firm will build all the boats desired so long as the aspirants for international distinction are willing to come up with the price.

John B. Herreshoff recently said it was not only possible but highly probable that a smarter boat than the Columbus could be turned out by the firm, and among his friends he freely expressed his opinion that in case Sir Thomas Lipton should feel like trying for the America's Cup he could furnish an adversary capable of giving that gentleman all the fighting he might desire. While designing the Defender two years ago his health was out of the best, and he suffered somewhat while she was under construction but there was no sign of trouble, mental or physical, during Columbus's construction, or later during testing up and other trials, even when pitted against the Shamrock in the days of Luckie and triumph. Today "Doc" has lost none of his skill and his hand continues many saw works which can be wrought out on the rubbing-board and worked into another shape for British cup applicants. He is willing, he says, to design another defender, it is said, he has not the desire already to wind having observed, as is the worst enemy points in which Columbus could be improved or modified but for expedient reasons.

Fight on Paris Exposition Opening.

Special to Journal. PARIS, April 3.—There was an exciting debate in the Deputies today. M. Chapsus has offered a resolution that the opening of the Exposition be postponed. The Government opposed the resolution, which was lost by a vote of 377 to 57. The Government, on motion, ordered that the decorations be immediately given to the organizers of the Exposition, which was carried by a vote of 277 to 238. This was the real fight, and the Government may now be safely called the Exposition Ministry.

DEWEY ARCH

To Be Reproduced at Richmond, Va., During Free Street Fair Week.

During the week, from Monday, May 14th, to Saturday, May 19th, Richmond, Virginia, will take on an entire new dress Broad Street, 118 feet wide, to be transformed into a World's Fair of attractions, consisting of manufacturers' exhibits, some of the booths to be built of stone. These will occupy two miles of streets, at both ends, for which contracts have been let to erect magnificent arches modeled after the Dewey arch in New York. These will be built of artificial stone, and will give to thousands of people in the South, the first idea of what the Dewey arch is like. The magnitude of this Free Street Fair, undertaken by the combined Business Associations of Richmond, can be estimated when it is known that they are to build an independent electric light plant to supply the thousands of lights necessary to make the night as bright as day. Fifteen bands, including the Stonewall Band of Staunton, one of the most famous in the South, and others from the different cities of North and South Carolina, who will play continuously throughout the day, which will make it one of the grandest collections of bands ever assembled in this section of the country.

The Floral Parade has been taken in hand by the leading society ladies of Richmond, whose magnificent carriages and horses will make one continuous parade of flowers, which will take more than one hour to pass a given point.

Georgia Fruit Crop Damage.

ATLANTA, Ga., April 3.—From information gathered by State Entomologist Scott and the Agricultural Department since the heavy frost last Saturday night, it is believed that the fruit crop has been damaged to some extent throughout the State, but that the proportion of the blossoms or young fruit has been killed cannot be learned.

The complete effect of the frost cannot be learned until warm suns have had a chance at the blossoms on the trees.

State Entomologist Scott said today that fifty per cent of the blossoms now on the trees could be killed without materially affecting the crop in the State.

A telegram from South Georgia states that the crop there is unharmed.
