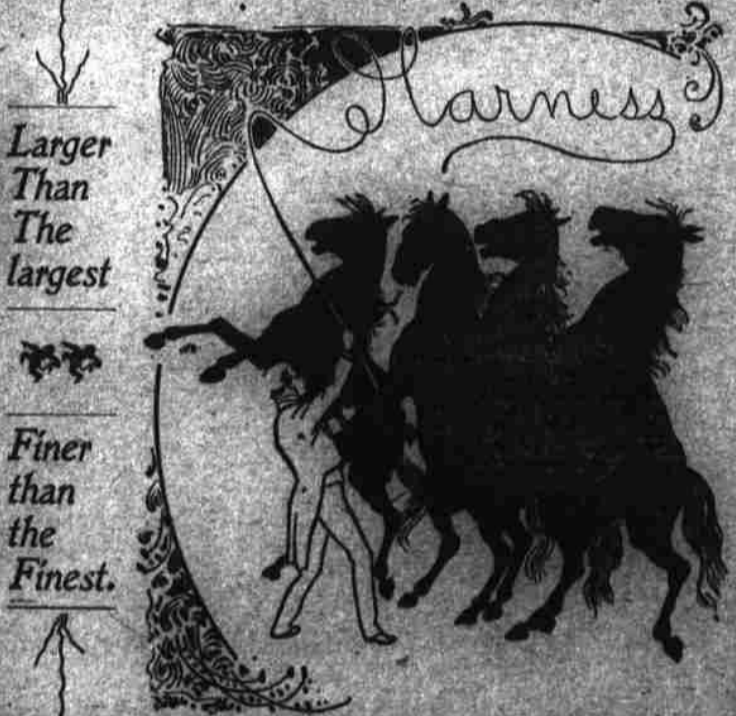

NOT INJURED.

Attempt to Assassinate the Prince of Wales in Brussels.

Due to Hatred of England. The Queen's Visit in Ireland. Fighting Going On Near Bloemfontein.

BRUSSELS, April 4.—The Prince of Wales was shot at while leaving the railroad station in this city. The Prince was not hurt. It is supposed that the attempt on the Prince of Wales' life was the result of anti-British feeling prevalent on the Continent owing to the Boer war.

DUBLIN, April 3.—Queen Victoria arrived this afternoon at Kingston, Ireland, on the yacht Victoria and Albert. She remained on the yacht all day and will come to Dublin tomorrow.

A great crowd went out to Kingston to see the yacht. Commissioner Jones, the chief of Dublin's police, computes the visitors in this city at half a million in addition to the population of 245,000.

A royal residence in Ireland is the latest rumor. The story goes that the Queen on her present visit will purchase one that she will give over to the Duke of York, who will occupy it at least four months in the year.

The Queen's program during her three weeks in Ireland is to do exactly as she does during her visits to Scotland—take a drive each day of at least 20 miles through the country, so as to see the people and how they live and to stop by the way and talk with them.

LONDON, April 3.—Tonight's news from the seat of war is not at all favorable to the British.

No further light is thrown upon the responsibility for the Meule Spring disaster. It now appears that only U Battery and some wagons were caught in the drift by the ambuscaded Boers. U Battery, which was behind, galloped off 1,300 yards and opened fire. The Boer rifle blast finally drove this battery into retreat, leaving two of its guns behind, owing to the slaughter of men and horses. In the meantime the sergeant-major of U Battery, after repeated attempts, rescued one gun out of six.

There are indications that a great battle is impending to the east of Bloemfontein. From Maseru the Boers are reported to be advancing. Firing was heard today near Tlaba Nohu. Apparently the Boers still hold the Bloemfontein water-works or some part of them and have not been dislodged. The Daily Mail's Bloemfontein correspondent states that 1,500 Boers are still on the hills near the water works and that Colville is shelling them from Bushman's kop, while French is maneuvering to ward off their retreat.

RALEIGH.

The Hearing at Charleston. Nominees to Get It Easy. Election Board. Western Union Rate. The Epworth League Meeting.

RALEIGH, April 4.—H. G. Connor and John Kinsdale, attorneys, for this State and its corporation commission, will at Charleston, on Thursday argue before Judge Simonton two important matters which have gone up to that judge in the shape of questions by Standing Master Shepherd, in the tax assessment case. The railroads claim that the commission has no power to look into the question whether their property is assessed at its full value. The other matter is the refusal by the Acme Fertilizer Company, for itself and really for all the other private corporations, to produce its books in court. The contention of this particular company is that to do so would reveal its private business and injure itself.

It is said that at least five of the Democratic nominees on the State ticket will be nominated on the first ballot at the State convention here next week. This will be very remarkable and at the same time very pleasing to the party.

The state board of elections had only a few minutes session yesterday and adjourned until the 12th instant. It was not fully prepared to select the county boards. Not all the lists of recommendations from democratic county chairmen had been received. Time is wanted to investigate all lists and particularly the one submitted by Franks, the republican, and Johnson, the populist, members of the board. These are co-operating and handled in one name for each county. These lists will be carefully scrutinized. The policy may be to have only democrats on the boards. Johnson and Franks had conferences with the populist state chairman, who is recently becoming more active, after a long period of quiescence. The board will have complete lists on the 12th for county boards. The law says the latter must be composed of "three direct persons."

Invitations were received to the marriage at Edenton Street M. E. church here April 18th, of Miss Lena V. Powell, daughter of Major A. M. Powell, of Raleigh, to Mr. Repton H. Merritt, formerly of Wilmington, now of Charlotte.

The matter of the reduction of the rate on 10 word telegrams to 15 cents on the Western Union lines in this state is yet before the federal court. The company is very anxious to have it taken off. The corporation commission is considering what to do in the matter. The order for reduction was made by the now defunct railway commission.

March was 3 degrees colder here than the average for fourteen years past. Rain fell on eleven days of the month. It is no wonder that farmers have been able to do relatively little plowing.

The North Carolina Funeral Directors' Association began its annual session here last evening. Rev. R. T. Adams offered prayer and Charles M. Busbee made the address of welcome.

The fourth annual conference of the Epworth League in this State began here last evening, about 200 delegates being present, all of whom are being entertained by citizens of Raleigh. The services are being held in Edenton Street M. E. church. Presiding Elder J. T. Gibbs made the opening address. Josephus Daniels, Rev. M. M. McFarland and J. G. Brown made speeches of welcome, to which response was made by Rev. R. C. Glennan, of Elizabeth City. There were talks by Mrs. S. T. Beckwith, of Lenoir; J. H. Mixer, of Washington; Rev. J. H. Shore of Burlington; and Rev. J. M. Ramsey, of Tennessee. Rev. R. C. Beaman of Elizabeth City, is president.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.

Kansas City Democratic Auditorium Building.

Less One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars. Subscriptions to Rebuild Quickly Raised. Other Buildings Also Burned.

KANSAS CITY, April 4.—The auditorium in which the National Democratic Convention was to meet, July 4th was totally destroyed by fire this afternoon, only the foundations remaining.

Ten dwellings were gutted, the Central Presbyterian church was ruined. The loss of the auditorium was one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.
