

Thousands of Styles and Additiona Made to the Variety Vearly.

Picture frame moidings, such as are manufac ared and sold by wholesale in strips to be cut up as may be required in the making of picture frames, are produced in leagths of 12 feet. They are produced in leagths of 12 feet, They are produced in preity nearly all natural woods. There are also produced cheaper picture frame moidings in imitation of some of these woods as of oal. These various mollings are made in many widths and many thicknesses and in great variety of form, great numbers of them with no ornamentation whatever and many of them ornamented with a beading or other design, which may be carved in the wood by the machine in which the moiding is made or pressed or stamped in the wood. Sometimes this beading is gilded or so treated as to look like exidized metal, and sometimes a straight, smooth line or division of a wood molding is finished in the same manner.

Many picture frame moidings are fulabed in white, some in white with another color, some are made in combinations of colors and some are mide in singic colors, and these last may be made
in many shades. Then there is a variety
of moidings in black. Many of these
colored moidings are plain in design, and
there are among them many that are

Of gilded picture frame moldings the variety produced is very large. Some are gilded with gold, some with a lacquer laid on over sliver leaf and some are gilded with a cheaper material.

Picture frame moldings, taking them altogether, are produced in thousands of styles, and new styles are constantly being added, these being put on the market twice a year, for the spring and fall trade. A picture frame molding manufacturer producing moldings in literally hundreds of styles would still produce more or less new styles, 20, perhaps, or 40 each acason. But for all file great variety offered there are certain kinds and styles of picture frame moldings that are staple goods and that sell steadily, just as there are staple lines in all kinds of merchandise.

In course of time a caper manufacturer bit up the idea of taking such oil papers to mill under assurances of privacy and chemically removing all traces of writing. Market price being allowed for the papers thus gathered, what was before merely a waste and a source of trouble besides became productive of a revenue worsty of consideration, and the plan grew in favor. At first houses would send employees with the stuff to the mills to be sure that no scattering occurred, but gradually this precaution came to be discontinued.

A large paper concern, with mills in Cannecticut, has for years made a specialty of collecting such papers from bankers, insurance companies and large mercantile bouses and shipping tham directly to the mills, where by the use of strong chemicals all traces of writing are dearroyed before the material is worked over into paper pulp. This feature of the economics of a great city's affairs has grown to great proportions, and somethies single loads contain as much as 20 or 50 tons of paper, all marked with writing.
