SIMONTON DECIDES.

In regard to a Corporation Producing its Books.

Simmons Reply to Butler. The Deal in Progress. Insurance Revaluations, New Cotton Mills. Another Ice Factory.

RALPH, April 24.—The decision of Judge Simonton as to the production of books of a corporation for undervaluing property is as follows: "I am of the opinion that the agent of a private corporation, not a party to the proceeding, cannot be compelled to open for examination, the books of the company and expose them to the scrutiny of third persons."

Chairman Simmons' reply to Senator Butler is greatly enjoyed here. The current comment is that it is very apt indeed. A Republican state official says he expected the reply, and added that now Senator Butler will challenge Chairman Simmons to a joint discussion of the amendment with him. Butler regards himself as the Populist nominee for the senate, his party having endorsed him. He also puts himself forward as the champion of the anti-amendment Populist machine, in accordance with the terms of the deal the machine has made with the Republicans. Revenue Collector Duncan says he considers that the Populist convention threw itself against the amendment. That was the Populist trick—to fight the amendment while pretending to take neither side in the matter.

The Southeastern Fire Insurance Tariff Association at its meeting at Washington last Friday adopted a resolution declaring that where states enacted laws similar to the North Carolina law, tending to reduce fire waste and levying equitable taxation rates shall be reduced. Another resolution was adopted providing that the insurance companies shall inspect the water supply and fire appliances in cities and towns and if these are not up to the standard at the time when rates are given such cities or towns their rates shall be increased.

The farmers are very much behind hand with their work in this section. The rains which have fallen on an average of twice a week for six weeks or more have been the main cause of the delay.

At the Academy of Music last evening the election class of the Baptist female university presented Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream." It was the most ambitious piece of theatrical work ever undertaken in this state by amateurs. The costumes came from Boston.

The cotton mill development continues steadily. The Alpine mill at Morganton has been so successful that it has awarded the contract for another mill, to be known as Alpine No. 2, with 7500 spindles. The cost will be \$100,000.

Raleigh is to have another ice factory, with \$25,000 capital. Home capital is invested in it, Charles E. Johnson and others being the stockholders. A Richmond firm has made arrangements to build an ice factory and cold storage plant here also.

SIEGE OF WEPENER.

SUM CONTINUES. Indecisive Fighting between Forces.

London, April 23.—Interest in the war continues centered in the southeastern corner of the Orange Free State, where Colonel Dalgry's Colonials are making such a spirited defense against the Boer commandos as to win from them the tribute that they are the best fighters the Boers have hitherto encountered.

General Ruddle's troops for the relief of Wepener remain near De Wet's Dorp, where they are intrenching and apparently working on the south of the Boers. On Sunday the forces were still confronting each other after indecisive engagements on the two previous days.

In the night of all a mishap occurred at one of Ruddle's outposts. According to Lord Roberts' official message, 48 of the Worcestershire Regiment were placed in a detached position and only 18 returned, 30 being missing.

Lord Roberts, however, is supporting Ruddle's advance with a strong force. General Pole-Carew, with one division of infantry, and General French, with two brigades of cavalry, have been dispatched along the De Wet's Dorp road and already have covered a distance of 18 miles from Bloemfontein with little fighting.

After a long pause the two cavalry brigades are evidently again in condition to operate a move which should have stirring results.

Bill For Courts Pass House.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Mr. Thomas successfully engineered through the House today the two bills which provide for the holding of District and Circuit Courts at New Bern and Elizabeth City, which will give these cities long desired local facilities. There is no doubt that both bills will pass the Senate and become laws this session of Congress—Raleigh Post.




