MUST GO.

Many Negro Delegates Will Attend Republican State Convention.

Lindsay to Be Put Up For Governor. Attacking Simmons, Old Fellow Calhoun, DeWolf Hopper May 9th.

HAZLETON, April 27.—The Republican Convention will have 240 delegates and an equal number of alternates. A special effort has been made to prevent negroes being sent as delegates, but it could not be helped as Wednesday's variegated gathering will show. In some counties white delegates and negro alternates were elected. This to pacify the "brother in black." Congressman Lindsay who has made such a black record for himself in Congress along with the negro Congressman Wells, will be the nominee for Governor. Most of the other places on the ticket are not settled upon. Z. V. Waiser will have the attorney general's place without doubt. He could have had that place on the Populist ticket if he would have accepted it. It is suggested that Lieutenant Governor Reynolds will be nominated for chairman of the Corporation Commission. Nobody wants State Chairman Holtons place so he will be re-elected.

Insurance Commissioner Young, has since January 1st collected \$95,000 from the insurance companies and has carefully examined the reports of 160 companies.

The Christian Endeavor Union held three sessions today. The opening subject was "Individual Faithfulness," by Rev. M. A. Kelley of High Point.

The Southern Railroad telegraph wires here say they still receive help from the strikers' hand, but don't know how long it will continue. They seem to think the strike a failure.

Senator Butler announces that J. F. Clegg is now the editor of his paper here The Caucasian. The paper this week is full of threats at State Chairman Simmons, whose name appears at least two more times in the editorial, and who appears to be the special object of wrath.

There are 300 cadets enrolled at the Agricultural and Mechanical College. This breaks the record.

Cotton is reported to be coming up rapidly in the Goldsboro section and eastward. A gentleman says he saw cotton coming up a week ago in the Kinston section.

Not many colleges were represented at the inter-collegiate athletic contests at Oxford yesterday. It is thought to be a good idea to have these contests at Raleigh during the State Fair and have all the colleges represented. Good prizes and prizes will bring them out.

The sale of seats for DeWolf Hopper's "The Christian" here May 2d, is great. The company makes a long jump here by special train from Augusta, and goes from here to Norfolk on another special.

A charter is granted the Klanton Telephone Company, capital \$10,000; H. C. Hayatt and others, stockholders.

The local Odd Fellows celebrated in handsome style this evening the 31st anniversary of the founding of their order. Among the speakers were Past Grand Masters Charles F. Lomaden and W. C. Douglas, Grand Secretary B. H. Woodell and Secretary of State Cyrus Thompson.

The auditorium stockholders met last evening, appointed a committee to prepare by laws and another committee to get options on shares.

The Bell telephone rate case for some time on the Superior Court docket has been sent off by consent. This is the case in which the company appealed from the order of the railroad equal money fixing rates.

There are rumors that possibly some sort of settlement of the tax assessment case, which involves an increase of the taxable value of railroads of some \$10,000,000 is near at hand. The collection of Judge Munton this week that the opening of the books of private corporations not parties to the case might not be forced, destroyed a strong point in the case of the road's side. The railroad this week asked for a delay and did not come any day certain. The railroad have until June 28th to submit their evidence before the standing master. One kind of the case has gone and not a witness has been examined. ROBERTS PURSUING.

Boers Retreat With French After Their Making "Oh There" Explosions At Johannesburg.

LONDON, April 28.—It looks now as if the four or five thousand Boers who hurriedly raised the siege of Wepener and left General Buller and Hart free passage into the town, stand little risk of being caught.

They have a clear road open to them, as long as they skirt the Beantland boundary toward Ladybrand, for the whole of that section of the Free State remains in their hands. It will soon pass into the possession of the British.

General Buller has a strong force of mounted troops at his command. These are likely to co-operate with Generals French and Buller in seeking to intercept the Boers who have left De Wet's camp Tuesday night. According to reports, French and Buller joined hands east of De Wet's camp Wednesday morning and Randle is now pursuing the Boers by forced marches in a northeasterly direction. Gen. Fole-Carow is near them.

The Boers are said to be hampered by wagons and guns and to be unable to move swiftly, but on the other hand, the character of the ground, which is exceedingly broken and hilly, makes the use of cavalry exceedingly difficult and favors the rear guard tactics of the Boers, at which they have previously proved themselves adepts.

LONDON, April 28.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts, dated at Bloemfontein yesterday:

"Good news from Baden Powell up to April 16. All the wounded doing well. The Boers captured several native women who were trying to escape from Mafeking, but these were turned back after being stripped and flogged."

PHOENIX, April 25.—An explosion took place yesterday in Begbie's foundry Johannesburg, the Government arsenal. Thirteen men were killed and 50 injured.

The result of a Government inquiry into the cause of the disaster suggests that it was planned as an outrage. The explosion occurred in a house separate from the works and is believed to have required 300 pounds of nitroglycerin, while the quantity of nitroglycerin and powder on the premises did not exceed 200 pounds.
