RALEIGH.

Will Governor Russell Defend Governor Taylor at Tennessee.

Nominations For Wednesday's Convention. Increase in Cotton Acreage. Athletic Association to be Formed. Commencement at A. & M.

Raleigh, April 23.—J. C. L. Harris makes the statement that Governor Taylor, of Kentucky, has been specially advised by leading Republicans to have Governor Russell defend him in his suit.

Chairman Bolton will call the Republican convention to order. Republicans say there will be a big attendance, not so much of delegates, as there are only 240 of the latter, but of outsiders. No man except Holton is talked about for chairman and he will be re-elected, Republicans say. Linger's nomination for Governor is certain. A letter from a prominent Republican says it is probable that Prof. Hodgkiss, of Guilford College, will be nominated for Superintendent of Public Instruction. Chas. Reynolds for chairman of the corporation commission, Z. V. Walker for attorney General and Daniel W. Patrick (now census superintendent of the second district) for Commissioner of Agriculture. As to the remainder of the tickets, guessing seems to be wild.

The first returns for use in making up the May crop report of the State Agricultural Department's crop report have come in. Some of those noticed say that in the matter of farm preparation only two-thirds as much work has been done as was done last year up to this date, but the increase in cotton acreage will be about 50 per cent, perhaps 25; that there will be a sharp reduction in tobacco acreage, and that there is a considerable increase in the number of horses and mules.

The Agricultural and Mechanical College baseball team defeated Bingham College here yesterday by a score of 19 to 9 in an eleven inning game, characterized by heavy batting and many errors on both sides.

The Raleigh citizens Thursday evening at Durham presented the play, "The Fisherman's Luck," which made such a hit here. They had the largest audience ever in the Durham theatre.

Governor and Mrs. Russell last evening, at the executive mansion, gave a reception to the Obolonia Endeavorers who attended in a body.

Insurance Commissioner Young says that since January 1 he has collected from the companies \$35,000, in amounting all the way from 50 cents to \$500, and that he has carefully examined the reports from 100 companies.

Mrs. Baker, the woman who was shot here, is at the hospital and may recover, though the chance is slight one. George Hunt, the man with whom she came here, can't be found. It was not the first time she had left home, but her husband had condoned the former offense. He was given a hearing. His story is that the woman shot herself because he would not take her back to his home.

President George T. Winston of the Agricultural and Mechanical College, has given the following notice: "All colleges and schools in North Carolina interested in the proper management and development of athletic sports are earnestly invited to send representatives to a meeting in Durham on Saturday, May 5th, prox., 10 o'clock a. m., at the Hotel Carolina. The purpose of this meeting is to form an Athletic Association of North Carolina Colleges and Schools, with such constitution and by laws as will remove professionalism from college athletes and place the physical training of our young men upon the best basis. The preliminary conference on this subject, held some time ago in session here, was attended by representatives of the University, the A. & M. College, Wake Forest, Trinity, Guilford, Gardner, Oak Ridge and Bingham (Mebane). As chairman of this meeting and by authority of the same, I hereby invite all other colleges and schools in the state to attend the next meeting in Durham."

The commencement exercises of the Agricultural and Mechanical College promise to be exceedingly interesting this year. The commencement exercises will be held on Sunday, May 27th, by Dr. Charles E. Taylor, president of Wake Forest College. On Monday there will be dress parade by the battalion and an exhibition of work in the various college shops. On Tuesday there will be a meeting of the Alumni Association, followed by the annual alumni banquet. Tuesday night the president and faculty will give a steeple chase to the graduating class, the alumni and friends of the college. Wednesday evening the graduating exercises will take place. THE REAR GUARD.

British Come in Contact With Retreating Boers. Getting Short of Ammunition.

London, April 22.—Generals Hamilton and French, with mounted men, met today at Tshab Naha, in the Free State and attacked the Boers, who were still holding a portion of the town. Generals Hamilton and his division and General Smith-Dorrien and his brigade were following hard on the heels of the mounted men.

Most of their wagons the Boers sent north many days ago. No doubt their guns were drawn by fresh oxen, relays waiting on the road. Undoubtedly the "alien" Boers have escaped once again, leaving probably a small force to dispute the possession of Ladybrand for a time with the British mounted men.

Cape Town, April 22.—The explosion in Johannesburg was a serious thing for the Government, which has found it impossible to get more men for work in the arsenal. Lately the Boer authorities have been unable to obtain old carriage cases to refill. It is impossible to tell how far the shortage extends, but some are of the opinion that the Boers will soon be stripped for want of supplies.

Fugitives from Johannesburg confirm the report that the Boer Government has prepared holes for blowing up the mines but they say that when Commandant Botha went to Pretoria, and threatened to resign immediately Mr. Klinkie, the State Mining Engineer, strongly supported Botha, leaving pledged himself to Europe that nothing of the kind should be done. Eventually President Kruger yielded and the borings were filled with concrete.

The refugees say that lead for bullets has been commandeered from private owners. Even lead-pipe from mineral water and other manufacturers has been requisitioned.
