WHITE MAN'S DAY.

The Democratic State Candidates Speak.
 Weather Fine. Hearty Reception to Speakers. Close Attention Given Each Speech. Good Sized Crowd Present.
 Yesterday's weather was clear with a cool wind from the northwest. Shortly after 11 a. m. the parade formed on South Front Street and under the leadership of Chief Marshal T. A. Green, followed the route, as published in the Journal.
 Along the line of march, there were a great many people, and at the Academy Green when the candidates arrived there was a crowd, which cheered them as they ascended the splendidly decorated stand.
 The smallest crowd was at the beginning of the speeches, and when Mr. Aycock closed his grand speech of one hour in length there were one thousand hearers who cheered and applauded his closing sentence.
 The attendance of the county people was very good considering that this is the busy season on the farm, and mid-day is the worst possible time for city people to attend a public speaking.
 A most happy feature of the speaking were the introductions of the candidates and as the several gentlemen, Messrs. D. L. Ward, M. D. W. Stevenson, General C. A. Battle, O. H. Gulon and W. D. McIver, each presented his speaker with a most appropriate introduction to the audience, each candidate could feel at once at home with his listeners. The introductions, like the speeches of the candidates, were of that could be desired.
 Promptly at 12 o'clock, Chairman C. T. Watson, called upon Rev. R. H. John, to open the exercises of the day with prayer.
 Hon. B. R. Lacy, was introduced by D. L. Ward, Esq.
 In part Mr. Lacy said: It was a pleasure to stand before the citizens of Craven county, a county which had so materially assisted in securing for him his nomination in the Raleigh convention. He had no hesitation in saying that he wanted votes in the coming election. He then most felicitously told of his personal qualifications; as banker, farmer, mechanic, and fisherman.
 In speaking of the visit to Western Carolina, Mr. Lacy spoke of the feeling there in regard to the coming election, White Supremacy, and said the West would meet the East half way, with the ballot or the bullet, to secure the rights of the white people.
 Mr. Lacy was frequently cheered, and made a most favorable impression. He is not an orator, but his common, practical talk makes friends of all who hear him.
 Hon. S. L. Patterson, was introduced by M. D. W. Stevenson, Esq.
 Mr. Patterson, made the shortest speech. He first gave a short but clear explanation of the establishment of Department of Agriculture, for which he was nominated, showing how the office was changed from an appointive one, to one under the elective power of the voters. Mr. Patterson, speaking to the farmers and citizens of Craven county wanted all classes to be united on the amendment.
 Hon. B. F. Dixon, was introduced by General Battle.
 Dr. Dixon, has been described as the humorist of the party, and his speech here proved that he merited this distinction. The Doctor was most happy in his anecdotes and kept his listeners alternately laughing at his stories and applauding his remarks.
 His first remark gained every one's attention. "I am glad to say I have learned since I have been here, how to spell New Bern, for I have been thrown with Mr. Oliver."
 Dr. Dixon was especially touching in speaking of the negro, his regard and kindness he had always shown him, and his closing sentence, when speaking of his various life's works, as preacher, teacher and doctor, "I never before in my life have felt that I had done so much for righteousness, as in my present campaign for White Supremacy," was received with applause.
 Hon. W. D. Turner, was introduced by O. H. Gulon, Esq.
 Mr. Turner's speech was largely argumentative, though interspersed with anecdotes, which gave additional strength to the points he made. As it was Mr. Turner's first appearance in this section, he received close attention as being a Western man, and the impression he created here was a most favorable one.
 Which shall rule, white man or negro, the position of the negro in each of the political parties, Populist, Republican and Democratic and what man could vote under the amendment to be passed, were duly presented, clearly and forcibly drawn, and were greeted by frequent applause.
 Hon. O. B. Aycock, was introduced by W. D. McIver, Esq.
 Mr. Aycock was greeted by applause as he came forward, and for one hour, in a speech such as only Charles E. Aycock can make, he moved his hearers by his splendid eloquence.
 It was an Aycock speech, and it seemed to be heard to be fully appreciated.
 During the speaking the New Bern City Band played several pieces.
 After the speaking, the candidates returned to the hotel for dinner, and later many of them were taken out driving by friends. All except Mr. Patterson, left last night, taking the steamer Nouse for Elizabeth City, where they speak to-day.
 A. H. H. Gilman, on account of sudden business matters, will not be speaking, but will be in the city on the 11th inst.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

Thunder Storm Thursday Brings Death to Woman and Child.
 The thunder storm of Thursday evening was a severe one in this section, there being a heavy fall of hail in several places, but the lightning was very destructive, causing two deaths.
 At Balders Creek, the house of George Conner was struck, and his child was killed, and his wife knocked senseless.
 The house of D. Mand, near Newport was also struck. Mrs. Mann, who was standing in the doorway was killed, while Mr. Mann was rendered senseless.
 During the storm the rainfall was nearly an inch and a half.

He was assisted by Brother Barker of Manteo Station, and when Brother Barker, left he secured the services of Brother F. S. Becton, pastor of Onslow Circuit. Seven years ago Brother Becton was pastor of Pamlico circuit, and he endeared himself to this people. God be with him till we meet again.
 Brother Lowder, our dear pastor has labored hard with his people and we hope his incessant labors for and with his people on Pamlico circuit may not be forgotten.
 The health of the community is fairly good.

Reduce Output Not Prices.

The North Carolina Pine Lumber Association held a meeting yesterday at the Atlantic Hotel, Captain John L. Roper presiding, at which there was a large attendance.
 The trade situation was fully discussed and, upon the whole, it was found to be more encouraging than a month ago, there being more inquiries for lumber and more orders, both domestic and foreign, together with a very small increase of stock over that reported at the meeting last month.
 Taking it upon the whole it was not deemed necessary to make the situation still stronger, it was decided to reduce the output for next month 88 per cent.
 This will be done by closing down the mills of Eastern North Carolina and Virginia two days out of each week. This was what gave rise to the rumor that the mills would be closed entirely at present. The lumber dealers resent this publication in Baltimore and New York papers.
 The excessive output of the mills for the past several months is more responsible for the reduction of the output now probably than any other cause.—Norfolk Virginian-Pilot, 4th.

Election of County Superintendents of Health.

We beg leave to call the attention of all Boards of County Commissioners to the fact that they are required by the law as amended by the General Assembly of 1897 to elect a County Superintendent of Health at their meeting in May. The Amended law reads: "From this number (all registered physicians resident in the county) one physician shall be chosen by the Board of Commissioners of each county annually on the first Monday in May of each year to serve with the title of Superintendent of Health." We trust that this important matter will not be overlooked.—N. C. Bulletin.
