TEXTILE SCHOOL.

Legislature To Be Asked To Establish the Institution.

Adams Will Not Come Down. President of Davidson Resigns. Report of City Officials. Cotton Mill Enlarged.

R. LAMON, May 31.—The Marshall conference has been continued by Judge Farnell until the December term of court. The request for continuance was made on the ground that the government having declined to bear the expense of the witnesses, and the defendant not being able financially to do so as his term, the Judge granted the motion. The Raleigh Cotton Mills of Raleigh is enlarging its plant and increasing its spindles and looms. This will give the mill 400 looms and 10,400 spindles. Arrangements will also be put in.

The Board of Trustees of the A. & M. College have decided to memorialize the legislature in June to enact a Textile School bill carrying an appropriation of \$10,000. There is much interest in this matter, and some of the Trustees are said to favor trying to borrow sufficient money to establish this department if the legislature should fail to act.

A Mechanics' Art Course was added to curriculum of college, this being the beginning of manual training in art work of mechanics and engineering. Steps were taken to increase the facilities for shop instruction. Heretofore courses in Agriculture and Mechanics have been given to students and graduates thereof have received the degree of B. S. Hereafter these courses will be distinct and separate, and graduates will receive the degree of B. A. and B. S. All instructors of high grade of Professor are to be elected annually. Professors Ivry and Mitchell resigned today. The President was instructed to secure regularly an army officer as military instructor. It was also determined to secure instructor of Textile Department from the Philadelphia Textile School.

Ex-Lieut. Spencer B. Adams who is the Republican nominee for governor, has resigned the report that he will come down from the ticket and allow Dr. Cyrus Thompson the Populist candidate to become the Fusion candidate. Dr. J. B. Shearer has resigned the presidency of Davidson college where he has in that capacity for the past 13 years. His resignation does not take place until next June, a year from now. He is to be succeeded by Dr. Henry Louis Smith, vice president of the college.

The annual report of the city officials given to the public. It is a good one. One of the items shows that the cost of its smallpox during the year was \$6,697. The revenues for the city had increased over those of the year before \$11,000. The fire loss was \$30,493 with \$26,022 of insurance. These are a few of the figures given. The Mayor speaks of the splendid work done by the street committee.

AT LOUISVILLE.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 30.—When the United Confederate Veterans met in Union Hall today they were called to order by General Poyntz, commanding the Kentucky Division.

After the doxology had been sung by the assembly Rev. J. William Jones, chaplain-in-chief, made a short prayer. Then Gen. Poyntz introduced Major Weaver, who in a happy speech welcomed the visitors to the city. Next came a series of short welcoming addresses. Col. Thomas W. Bullitt extending a greeting on behalf of the members of the Louisville Board of Trade. Rev. Carter Helm Jones speaking for the Commercial Club, Artilla Cox for the finance committee of the reunion and Judge Hester, of the Supreme Court of Kentucky, on behalf of the Kentucky Division of Confederate Veterans. The last welcoming address was by General Simon B. Buckner, who spoke for the Confederates of Kentucky. Col. Bennett H. Young, of this city, chairman of the union committee, presented the building to the veterans in an eloquent speech.

After the glass club had rendered several selections Gen. John R. Gordon, commander of the United Confederate Veterans, responded to the address of Colonel Young. As General Gordon resumed his seat General Poyntz brought forward Rev. B. M. Palmer, of New Orleans, who delivered the annual address. This was a tribute to the sincerity of the Southern soldiers.

PRETORIA TAKEN.

The Boer War Considered To Be Practically Over.

Kruger Leaves On a Special Train. Great Defense of the Capital. Proven a Myth. The British Prisoners.

Special to Journal. London, May 31.—Lord Roberts has reached Pretoria. The capital was abandoned without any attempt at defense the forts surrounding the city being relieved of their garrisons.

President Kruger has fled from Pretoria on a special train. He is said to be at Watervalboven, 130 miles east of Pretoria.

The Boers may attempt to move the capital to Lydenburg.

There is great rejoicing in London over the taking of Pretoria.

London, May 31.—The Daily Mail publishes the following dispatch from the Earl of Rosalyn, one of its correspondents, who as a civilian, appears to have been released:

"Pretoria, May 30.—11.40 a. m.—Pretoria will be occupied in about two hours without resistance. The President has gone to Watervalboven. Burgomaster de Sousa is authorized to receive the British. He, with an influential committee of citizens, including Chief Justice Gregorowski, has been appointed to preserve life and property during the interregnum.

"Everything is quiet, but crowds are waiting expectantly in the church square for the arrival of the British.

"Fearing a possible disturbance and headshell among the prisoners of war at Waterval, United States Consul Hay and Leigh Wood insisted upon 200 officers being liberated on parole to go to see men. Their action cannot be too highly praised. I was permitted to accompany the officers. Everything was a. s. e."

LONDON, May 31.—Up to this hour the War Office has received no late news from Lord Roberts which the office will make public, but it is believed that the press advices from Pretoria are correct.

Most of the London morning papers, through the courtesy of the Daily Mail, print Lord Rosalyn's dispatch and comment upon it, treating the war as ended, some of the more cautious critics think that guerrilla warfare is likely to be carried on for some time in parts of the Boer territories.

Although the Boer forces are dissolving Lord Roberts, apparently, has not yet taken any considerable quantities of artillery, arms or stores. Large bodies of Boers must still be somewhere in the field.

The Chinese Troubles.

Special to Journal. LONDON, May 31.—There is great consternation in the Orient over the disturbances of the "Boxers." The situation is more serious than when the Emperor was dethroned.

The demand from Yokohama is that Japan shall assert her influence in Corea. The demand for liberals for seats in the cabinet may make the entire ministry resign. The United States battleship Oregon is at Hong Kong.

HONG KONG, May 30.—From all parts of the surrounding country news is constantly arriving of fresh excesses committed by the "Boxers."

Three Christian families were massacred at Shan-Lai-Ying, 80 miles from Peking, on May 25. Only two escaped.

Fang-Tai, where the "Boxers" were recently massed, is now occupied by a battalion of Chinese troops. The railroad station, workshops and locomotive sheds were destroyed and much rolling stock was destroyed, including the Emperor's palace car. Large Chinese warehouses full of valuable merchandise were burned after having been looted by the rioters.

The neighboring villagers seem to have joined in the attack, showing that the movement is not confined to the society of "Boxers." Eight rioters who were captured will be decapitated. The whole country is much excited.
