## SHORT SESSION.

### Legislature Not Expected To Consider Private Bills.

#### Water Supply For Elizabeth City.

Vance Statue Date Is July 18th. — Republican Delegates. Welton and Norfolk By Water.

#### Special to Journal.

Raleigh, June 4.—The State charter the Elizabeth City Water Company with \$25,000 capital, E. F. Aydt and others owners. It will probably secure its supply from the Dismal Swamp.

The Welton and Norfolk steamship company, which was today granted a charter, has an authorized capital of \$300,000. It proposes to operate boats of at least 4 feet draft between Welton and Norfolk via the Dismal Swamp canal and thus greatly reduce rates of freight which are now very high. An examination of the river shows that there is an average of 8 feet of water from Welton down the river. James W. Wilson and others are the stockholders of the company.

The legislature meets in adjourned session June 12. The corporation commission and the State board of agriculture meet the same day. It is predicted that the session of the legislature will not extend over a greater period than 7 days, and that it will not transact any business save that of safe-guarding the constitutional amendment.

Capt. C. B. Denson, who will deliver the oration of the unveiling of the monument to the North Carolina soldiers at Winchester, left for there today. He is informed that ten of the camps of veterans from the valley of Virginia will be present.

The reports from the penitentiary, arms on the Roanoke river are that the crops are magnificent.

Today the committee on the Vance monument will call to meet here June 11 with them will meet some citizens. It appears now that July 18 will be the date of the unveiling of the statue. The information now is that the latter will be ready at the foundry June 30, as promised.

The Republican delegates from North Carolina will have their headquarters at the Aldine Hotel, Philadelphia, during the National convention. Senator Fitchard made the selection.

Early this morning revenue officers made a raid near Roanokeville, this county and captured a 125 gallon illicit distillery. Few seizures are now made. The officers are devoting themselves quite largely to political work.

Gen. M. W. Bansom returned today from the Confederate reunion at Louisville. He enjoyed it greatly and looks particularly well.

There is not a bit of news as regards the status of the \$10,000,000 railway tax assessment case. On June 28 the time ends for the railroads to take their evidence in support of their contention that other property is taxed for under its true value.

The trustees of the Baptist female university meet here tomorrow, and it is quite probable will then elect a president. Several are in view, but secrecy is maintained.

A good deposit of iron ore has been found in this county south of here.

The Coffeyville Company of this city has nearly ready its brick making plant, with a capacity of 50,000 a day.

At the Baptist Female University here last evening, Rev. Dr. B. J. Willingham of Richmond preached the commencement sermon.

## THEY LIKE GOLD.

### Transvaal Official Escape With Much Treasure. Pretoria Surrounded By British.

London, June 4.—Great confusion prevails at Pretoria and there is a general exodus from the city. Pretoria is invested by the British troops and all resistance has practically ceased, and the city will be surrendered as soon as a formal demand is made by Lord Roberts.

Secretary Rottz of the Transvaal has fled from Lorenzo Marques for Germany with 94 boxes of bar gold.

Some foreign attaches have arrived at Lorenzo Marques to communicate with their Governments for orders to leave, as they consider that organized war on the Transvaal side is at an end. An Australian who has seen seven months active service in the Transvaal declares that a large proportion of the burghers are deserting to the homes.

Chicago, June 3.—"I have no communications with the Transvaal, and cannot make a statement as to what the Boers propose to do now. They had planned first to defend Pretoria and then to retire to the mountains, or else to give up the capital and take directly to the mountains. It appears as if they are adopting the latter course."

So declared Montagu White, one of the Boer representatives in this country, who came to Chicago today in advance of the Boer envoys. When asked if the Boers would continue the war to the extent of waging a guerrilla conflict, Mr. White replied:

"What else can they do? They can get no terms from the English; Salisbury will not leave them a shred of independence. Mountain warfare is the only alternative. The Boers can keep up some sort of resistance there for a year."

Commenting on the terms the Boer are ready to make with England Mr. White said:

"Independence is indispensable. I know we would give up the dynamite monopoly, give the franchise and education and language reforms. We would disarm also, to a certain extent, but we will not stand suzerainty."

## WE ARE IN CHINA.

### A Fight Between Americans and Chinese. Sixteen Killed.

London, June 4.—American and other troops in China fought with the "Boxers" today and killed sixteen of them and wounded many others. The "Boxers" are killing the missionaries in the interior of the country.

Tientsin, China, June 3.—Six men and two women, French and Belgian refugees from Pao Ting Fu, have arrived here. Nine of the party, which was threatened by the "Boxers" there, are still missing.

A body of mounted Cossacks has gone in search of the missing and to take food to Yan Lu Ching for the relief of the party at that place.

It is reported from Peking that Mr. Stevenson, of the Church of England mission at Yem Ching has been murdered, and that Mr. Norman, of the same mission, is missing.

## ENDING THE SESSION.

### Congress Will Adjourn This Week. Bills Pending. The Clark Case.

Washington, June 4.—Congress is on its last lap, but is not making extraordinary speed. However, there is little occasion for rash. The Senate has agreed that the Nicaragua Canal bill shall be taken up December 10, and have the right of way until voted upon; the bill amending the extradition laws to cover the Neely case has been passed, and all other important pending bills to be disposed of except a few disputed items in appropriation bills. The House resolution for adjournment names the fifth, last. It is not certain at this time that the Senate will adopt that without change, but it is certain that adjournment will take place during the week.

The House passed the Littlefield bill, amending the Sherman anti-trust law, by what would have been a unanimous vote had not Representative Mann, of Ill., cast his vote against it.

The Clark case has by general consent of Senators been allowed to go over to the next session, and Mr. Clark has left Washington. He is either a very good fighter or very easily deceived, as he said before leaving: "I shall be on hand at the beginning of the next session in December, and will be ready to be sworn into office." He admitted, however, that as the vacation will end with the adjournment of the Senate's legislature in January, the real decision as to whether he remains the Senate, will be made by the return of that body in closing members of the legislature.

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## BAD RAILROAD WRECK.

### Atlantic Coast Line Mail Wrecked. Several Killed.

Raleigh, June 4.—The fast mail train on the Atlantic Coast Line ran into an open switch at Garysburg, Northampton county, just north of Weldon.

The mail train struck several box cars standing on the switch; Engineer Chestnut and an unknown white tramp were killed. Postal clerk McGeorge was fatally injured and two negro firemen were seriously hurt. Besides these three other postal clerks were seriously hurt. The baggage and mail cars were wrecked.
