**JUST THREE DAYS.**

**Shortest Legislative Session on Record.**

All Bills Passed Were Ratified. List of Bills, North Carolina Dead.

**Speaker Connor** said today: "The legislature protected well the election law and the franchise amendment. It met the objections to the amendment, so far as to its standing or falling as a whole, very completely. Many bills were introduced. Very few passed."

In all 23 bills and resolutions were ratified. The bills were as follows:

To repeal Chapter 123 private laws 1899; to print and distribute the amendment and the election law; to constitute a commission to investigate the Olanore Barker memorial hospital of Dispensary at Baltimore; to amend the dispensary question to the voters of Macon and also of Swain counties; to establish stock law in parts of Nash county; to abolish office of county treasurer in Henderson; to regulate manufacture and sale of liquor in Macon; to establish graded schools at Georgetown; to print the special committee report on the penitentiary and the agricultural department; to allow a jury trial to be drawn in Edgecombe; to pay \$2,000 Beddingfield salary for the term he served as corporation commissioner; to take certain counties out of the western criminal circuit court; for relief of certain teachers and the treasurer of Craven; to give the corporation commission full power to assess railway property as private property is assessed; to pay the shall fish commissioner elected in 1899 and others out of the shell fish fund; to amend the oyster law as to ownership of basins and as to dredging with steam dredges, etc; to allow Superior court judges to regulate liquor licenses in Northampton; to allow to use the surplus special tax paid for county purposes.

News reached here today of the death in Colorado, at the age of 23, of H. C. B. Nitz, who was for several years assistant state geologist of North Carolina. He was widely known in this State, and justly esteemed. His work here was of immense value. He prepared the report on the iron ores, that on mountains, and had done a great deal of prospecting in the eastern and western sections. He was a native of Baltimore and died of heart disease.

Many members of the legislature left this morning for Vorehead City, as the special guests of State Senator James A. Bryan of New Bern, the president of the Atlantic & North Carolina railway. Tomorrow evening they will hear the address of Dr. J. L. M. Curry before the North Carolina Teachers' Assembly.

Gov. Russell pardoned George Thompson of Robeson county, who was convicted of rape and sentenced to be hanged but whose sentence was commuted. Warren Green of the penitentiary says there were excellent reasons for the pardon, a negro woman who had sworn against Thompson, confessed to perjury.

Senator Butler arrived here today to look after populist campaign work and also his paper, of the latter J. F. Chick is now editor.

The legislature which meets again July 24, is keeping a keen eye on the election judges.

The Republicans are saying that under the United States revised statutes the constitutional Amendment's legality must be tested in the United States District Court.

**JEALOUS OF ENGLAND.**

Russia and France Think British Has Advantage in China. Communist-ations Cut Off.

London, June 15.—Advices state that Russia and France are jealous of England, and are afraid the latter government has the advantage in China.

Wires to Peking are again cut.

The Chinese government says it will not oppose foreign troops going to Peking.

Times, June 15.—Railroad communication between this place and Admiral Seymour's international force has been cut three miles beyond Yang Tien. The bridges have been destroyed.

It is rumored here that the Boxers are determined to burn Tien Tsin Station tonight.

It is expected that Admiral Seymour has made Lang Fang a secondary base, and that he will advance the remaining forty miles as rapidly as possible.

SHANGHAI, June 14.—A dispatch from Chung King says that a riot has taken place at Yun-Na-Fu. The buildings of the China Inland mission were partially destroyed and those of the Roman Catholic and Bible Christian Missions were utterly demolished. All the missionaries are safe.

LONDON, June 14.—A special despatch from Shanghai says the position of the legation at Peking is most critical. According to this despatch, 30,000 Chinese troops are drawn up outside the gates of the city to oppose the relief force, and the city is in the hands of the British and Japanese legations.

The American, Russian and Japanese ministers have sent a courier to Tien Tsin, asking for 2,000 troops of each nationality.

The United States embassy Yorktown and Caste left yesterday for Tong-Ku. There is no foreign warship now here.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—John Ford, secretary of the American Asiatic Association, today received the following telegram from the Shanghai branch of the association:

"Shanghai, June 15.—Grave danger threatens Americans Yang Tsé Valley. Urgently advise immediate gunnery protection."
