NOT SO BAD.

Legations Reported Safe. Admiral Seymour Reaches Peking. Emperor Gao.

LONDON, June 20.—Hong Kong telegrams that it is reported that the British Admiral Seymour captured Peking with his troops. When they entered the city, the Emperor of China was missing, having been carried to Manchuria by Yang Yi. Shanghai reports from Chinese sources and the reports are credited by the foreign officials, that it was announced from Peking that the foreign legations were safe up to last Sunday, and that Admiral Seymour's international force had reached Peking.

New York, June 20.—News has been received here that the German Ambassador to China, Baron von Kellar was not killed by the Boers. Washington, June 19.—The Russian Charge here, Mr. Wollant, this morning notified Secretary Hay that his government was dispatching 4,000 Russian troops from Port Arthur to Taku. It is known to the officials here that Japan also is sending a corresponding number of troops to the seat of trouble, and that England, Germany and France are doing likewise. It is believed that with the American force, numbering about 9,000, including the Ninth Infantry, the international army will be quite strong enough to relieve the siege of the embassies and legations at Peking. If a large number of American troops were available they would be sent forward at once, according to the officials, but, as it is, the force will be further increased as soon as the troops can be concentrated at Manila from the outlying posts, where there shall be necessity for reinforcement.

Buller's First Train.

LONDON, June 19.—Lord Roberts reports that over two thousand stands of arms have been given up at Pretoria since the occupation. These will be utilized by the rescued British prisoners. General Buller reports that the first train passed through Laing's Nek tunnel Monday, June 18th, and proceeded to Chatterton.

The first batch of Makafika's sick and wounded arrived at the hospital at Delffontein June 15th.

Mrs. Gladstone Buried.

LONDON, June 19.—Mrs. Gladstone, widow of the great English statesman, William E. Gladstone, was buried by the side of her husband in Westminster Abbey this afternoon. The service, which was impressive, closely resembled that of her husband.

KEEP MUM.

Populists at Work but Refuse to Say Anything.

Delegates to Kansas City. Arrangements Made. Contrast in Agricultural Department Management From Fusion Rule.

KANSAS CITY, June 20.—The populists continue to increase their force at headquarters. The latest arrival is Secretary Hoover of Senator Butler's personal force. The Senator will not be much at headquarters, as he leaves the business there mainly in Assistant Chairman Ayr's hands. The populists are very reticent about their campaign. Today, Dr. C. Thompson declined to say a word. The Democratic delegates have made excellent arrangements for going to the national convention at Kansas City. All were one delegate, G. C. Lyon, of Bladen, will go. They will leave here Sunday afternoon July 1 at 3:30 o'clock on a special Pullman buffet car, via Asheville, and Memphis, arriving at Kansas City Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. Their headquarters will be at the Carter house, the best in the place. Quarters were secured for four days, at \$5 a day. National Committeeman Josephus Daniels says that the convention will be in session at least 3 days, possibly 4. The arrangements were all made by him and Julian S. Carr and S. M. Gattis, after consultation with the other delegates. The car will be decorated in such a way as to let the people along the line know that the North Carolina delegation is "tricky in it."

The delegates are J. S. Carr, E. F. Hale, Walter E. Moore, Thomas A. Jones, James Parker, F. G. James, Leslie Harvey, R. H. Speight, E. M. Green, U. O. Lyon, T. M. Arrington, Josephus Daniels, S. M. Gattis, A. W. Graham, W. C. Dowd, J. A. Brown, A. D. Motts, J. R. Blair, A. C. Avery, George W. Flower, P. Walker, S. Gallert. A number of the alternates will go.

The late charter of the Wachovia Flouring Mills, at Winston, N. C., will be recalled that the report of the Legislative Committee which investigated the agricultural department during the year 1899, showed in the report made last week that the expenses of the inspection of fertilizers during the last year were \$15,000. What a change there is now. The cost of such inspection during the regime of commissioner Patterson, for the present year is barely \$6,000, yet a dozen inspectors were used. In other words the cost is only 40 per cent as great as under the outrageous fusion management. There are now 800 brands of fertilizers sold in the State. The July Bulletin will contain a resume of all the analyses made during the year.

NO NOMINATION YET.

Republican Convention Adjourns After Adopting Platform.

PHILADELPHIA, June 20.—The National Republican convention was called to order at 12:25 p. m. by temporary chairman Wolcott.

The party platform was read and adopted. It says in effect that the tariff issue is a dead one and that expansion is the live issue.

The convention adjourned after the adoption of the platform without making any nomination, until 10 o'clock tomorrow.

Roosevelt insists that he does not want the nomination but apparently it will be forced upon him. He has virtually decided that.

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., June 19.—The papers were signed this afternoon and will be sent to the Secretary of State at once for incorporation of Wachovia Mills Company. The flouring mills owned and operated in Salem for many years by F. and H. Pries, will be moved to Winston and greatly enlarged. The capital stock of the new company is to the fifty thousand dollars. The plant will be operated by electricity.
